(St. Louis, Missouri) -

One morning recently a German shepherd dog lolled contentedly on his side, tail wagging, as a small boy climbed over him and playfully pulled his ears.

That night the same log, a snarling 80 lb. bundle of fury, helped to scatter a threatening mob of 1000 people, and sniffed out a burglar hiding in a dark warehouse.

The dog is one of 19 that went through an intensive 14 week training course based on Scotland Yard methods, which changed them into alert, obedient police dogs in the St. Louis Canine Corps.

The police sent Mr. O'Connell, Major Aylward and Dr Victor Brannon, director of the St. Louis Government Research Institute, to London in 1956 to study the Scotland Yard plan.

They returned enthusiastic over what they had seen. Last year five St. Louis policemen went to London for a 14 veek training session.

Each returned with a trained German Shepherd dog. The group became the nucleus of the Canine Police Corps which has attracted visitors from all parts of the United States, as other police departments look into the advantages of the dogs.

"They have a big psychological effect, too", Major Alyward said.

Recently two patrolmen were trying to flush a burglar they knew was hidden in a warehouse, all the dogs were off duty, but one of the men called "Let's turn the dogs loose". The burglar popped out of his hiding place and surrendered.

- WHAT AILS YOUR DOG -

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This month we will deal with WORMS IN PUPPIES:

Puppies are affected with worms, which may attain a very large size. While it is possible for a puppy to harbour internal parasites and still present a healthy appearance, an affected puppy usually does not thrive or grow well, and generally eats voraciously.

The abdomen is usually distended, later there is poor coat, loss of flesh and appetite becomes irregular. Diarrhoea may occur, and in a number of cases the puppy will vomit worms which may have reached the stomach. In some cases the presence of worms in the bowel may give rise to fits and convulsions.

The addition of about a tablespoonful of finely grated raw carrot mixed with some finely chopped or minced meat as part of the daily ration will often clear a puppy of worms without any medicinal treatment.

Medicinal treatment should only be given on the advice of a Vet. who will perscribe treatment.

The regular dosing of worm remedies on the assumption that "all puppies have worms" can be extremely dangerous, and has been responsible in some cases, for the death of otherwise healthy puppies.
