Man's best friend has been labelled one of his worst enemies by a new study in Britain.

The Times said a Manchester University investigation found dogs were responsible for more than 60,000 infections and 210,000 bites needing hospital treatment in the United Kingdom each year.

The survey found dog-related injuries added up to a 40 million stg.(\$A62 million) health bill.

The university's doctors who conducted the survey slammed what they called "pollution on a scale to impair human health".

They estimated dogs dropped almost a million tonnes of urine and 1000 tonnes of faeces each day in the UK, mainly outdoors.

Illnesses blamed on dogs included about 30,000 infected bite wounds, stomach disorders and skin complaints ranging to worm disorders leading to eye damage, blindness, kidney failure and occasional death.

The survey report said children were particularly at risk from infection by apparently healthy animals sleeping on beds and contaminating soil.
