Firstly, once again welcome to all new members receiving your first Club Newsletter. This is currently produced bi-monthly and attempts to let you know both the results of past activities within the Club, current activities, and of course what we have already scheduled for the future.

Normally the Newsletter would start off with a glowing report of our recent trial and special Agility Display. However, I think there is a matter far more important to get across, hence the following.

If you DON'T listen to talks by Veterinary personnel; if you DON'T come to special Lecture/film nights run specifically foryou; if you DON'T read the K.C.C.Gazette; if you DON'T even like reading the Newsletter night through, DO YOUR DOG A FAVOUR AND READ THIS FIRST ARTICLE THROUGH AT LEAST!!

BEWARE - HEARTWORM HAS BEEN DIAGNOSED WITHIN THE GEELONG VICINITY

At our last General Meeting we had as our guest speaker, Dr.Rod Blake, Veterinarian whose topic was HEARTWORM. At this meeting Dr.Blake clearly demonstrated what happens when a dog is affected with HEARTWORM; the possible treatment if detected when the disease is in its infancy, and generally dispelling the myththat HEARTWORM only affected dogs living in tropical zones. IT IS TRANSMITTED SY MOSQUITOES ONLY. The mosquito bites an infected dog and then bites a proviously unaffected dog and so the disease is perpetuated.

Dr.Blake also explained that although the disease had then reached as close as Melbourne's Eastern suburbs, the chances of dogs in our area getting it were remote as no dogs indigenous to thearea had as yet been detected with Heartworm. There have been positive diagnoses in dogs brought into the area from outside areas. The suggested that for dogs that never leave our area, at this stage, it was not considered to be necessary to blood test these dogs, unless they left our area and went to shows or trials where they may meet a dog from an infected area. So it was up to those people showing and trialling, or travelling with their dogs, to make their own decision as to whether they wanted their dogs blood tested or not.

At the recent special evening that the Club organized, a representative from the Pfizer Pharmaceutical Co. came and gave an interesting talk on the various common forms of worms which are found in puppies and adult dogs and the preventative measures to be taken; and we were also shown an American film on HEARTWORM which showed the means of contracting the disease, the possible cure if found in its infancy, andthe most important thing, PREVENTION.

PREVENTION is by giving your dog a special tablet each day, BUT before this lifetime of pill protection can be implemented, dogs have to have a blood test to determine whether or not thedog has any microfilariae which are the young worms already spreading through the blood supply and making their way up to the heart. Dogs that do have circulating microfilariae and are put onto preventative treatment are likely to have very severe, possibly fatal, reactions. The test cannot determine whether there is already an existing adult worm in the heart.

THE CYCLE OF INFECTION

The adult heartworm lies in the heart and Tays enormous numbers of Tarvae called microfilariae. These microfilariae circulate in the blood stream and are picked up by feeding mosquitoes. The microfilariae continue their development within the mosquito and after about 14-21 days they are ready to

invade a new host dog. When the mosquito bites a dog, the immature heartworms are transferred into the dog and continue their development in this new host.

About three months later, the heartworm larvae have developed to almost maturity and move into the heart where, after another three months or more, they begin to lay microfilariae for mosquitoes to pick up and continue the cycle.

Currently there is a Veterinarian in Queensland working on a vaccine, but of course it may yet take many years for this to be formulated.

It is up to each individual to assess the danger and determine when, and if, they want to act. Any breed whether it be short or long coated is at risk. It's your decision - maybe 12 months will elapse before a truly indigenous case is diagnosed within our area.

Remember though, once you do start your dog on tablets it is a DAILY doseage for the remainder of the dog's life.

A meeting of all the Geelong and surround Veterinarians was held last Tuesday evening to discuss this issue and they subsequently released a PRESS Report (at the time of writing/typing this, the exact day of publication was not known, but it should have appeared by the time you read this).

If you have any doubts about this discusse it is been assective.

HOW TO BE YOUR DOG'S BEST FRIEND--A Training Manual for Dog, Owners "I have ever gained much pleasure from the books that made me think the most."

Such a book was, "How to be your Dog's Best Friend", written by the monks of the New Skete Monastery inll.S.A., who support themselves by breeding, raising and training dogs.

In very readable language, we are given an insight into every phase of dog ownership, the nature of the dog, its psychological and emotional needs, its behaviour patterns and training. Professional tips on problem solving are interesting, e.g. massage for dogs as a calming influence. Throughout the book a tremendous depth of affection for animals is evident.

The complexities of modern life, lack of space and close proximity of others have caused us to cling closer to our canine friends. But, do we realize they are also experiencing the same pressures? Do we listen to what our dogs are saying? On, are we continually talking, shouting and bombarding them with noise. The language of silence is a God given gift to animals for its own sake. Communication from your dog is honest if we only take the time to receive it. Communication from humans is complicated too often by the spoken word, which does not necessarily express what we really feel.

Understanding is the real key to communication if the owner wishes to reach beyond the mechanics of formal obedience, to an appreciation and respect for the animal companion.

Onesmall criticism of the book is that sufficient warning was not given to owners of over possessive or aggressive dogs who allow them to sleep in their bedroom. This can only increase these tendencies particularly if the owner is ill.

Members are advised that the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act 1986 (Assented to 20 May 1986) was gazetted in March 1987.

Section 9 (1) reads:

CRUELTY: Crops the ears of or debarks a dog, except if that operation is done on the advice of a Veterinary Surgeon and for the purpose of having a therapeutic or prophylactic effect on the dog;

commits an act of cruelty upon that animal and is guilty of an offence.

PENALTY: For a first offence - 10 penalty units or imprisonment for three months.

Members may not realise but there are several breeds of dogs that have their ears cropped in overseas standards, i.e. Dobermann, Boxer and Great Dane being three of the more popular breeds. No dog in Australia with cropped ears is permitted to trial for an Obedience Title, nor are most breeds allowed in the Showring.

So if you see a young dog with cropped ears ask the person attached to the lead II hope) where and who cropped the ears as obviously they can be penalized. You are still allowed to import dogs with cropped ears into the country however for breeding purposes.

BUY A BRICK

Mention has been made many times of the Club's need to expand the building to give internal access to the toilets and to enlarge the storeroom facilities. Like most things - it costs! The council has passed a grant to the Club and with our current savings we have \$5,900 - our target is \$9,500.

NEW ZEALAND Annartic Huskies faced the death sentence - now they've been spared and spayed or neutered.

However, the dogs were spared due to much publicity and they will be now weared off their diet of seal meat; all neutered or spayed and allowed to die out naturally so ending years of tradition as the workers of the white lands.

Recently I saw the film ANTARCTICA (on video) and this is a true story of the first Japanese dog team used. The dogs were left chained on their lines when the first Japanese party completed their tour of duty, but due to unfavourable weather conditions and problems with pack ice, the next team of personnel could not be landed and the dogs were left totally alone and chained. The film shows just what confronted those dogs that were left; their hardship and suffering to try and survive and thetorment of the men who left them behind. It was a year before another party was landed at that base and the miracle was that TWO dogs had actually managed to stay alive.

A sad film to watch, but one in which you can learn a lot about the behaviour and instincts of dogs.
