Welcome to all the newer members of the Club, may your continued association with us be rewarding both in the further understanding of your dog and in the friendships you make within the Club.

This Newsletter is produced every two months and distributed on the last training day of that month. This one is bulkier due to the reports from the Annual General Meeting but should provide you with some holiday reading.

The statement "Man's best friend is the dog" was coined many years ago but the strength of that statement continues to grow. What our club is essentially about is training our dogs to a behavioural standard that makes them acceptable house mates, play mates and companions. To achieve this both we and the dog must learn about each other and what the expectations of each are. As our knowledge grows, so does our dogs, and together it can be a life long learning experience with each partner of the team going from strength to strength.

Enough of the philosophy. Most of what I could comment on is already more than adequately covered in other sections of this Newsletter.

Containedwithin is a list of the 1988/89 Committee which were elected at our October Annual General Meeting. It would be a good idea to keep it on hand and should you have any queries about the Club or training you can contact the appropriate person direct. A list of Instructors appears also for your benefit.

However, I would remind members that once again snakes are out and about. Early in the season like now, after having slept for the winter their venom is at its highest peak.

Snakebite treatment for dogs is exactly the same treatment as applicable to humans. Should your dog be bitten ring your vet. immediately to ascertain whether they carry antivenin and if necessary, they will advise you as to what clinic to go to if they don't have such stock themselves.

We have had snakes in the outside exercise paddock and on our grounds in the past years so do take care. A good thing to remember from now on if you take your dogs in bushland or in farming areas or near inland waterways, it is best done in the early morning or at dusk when it is not really warm enough for sunbaking snakes.

We have Club members who have lost dogs as a result of snake bites (even with treatment) - SO IT CAN HAPPEN TO YOU.

Do come along on the last training night and stay for the presentations and have a convivial drink with your classmates. Bring along some meat/Lish or whatever and toss it on the Club BBQ and save a snag for Santa on Christmas Eve.

May you all have a merry and safe Christmas and a Happy New Year and may Santa fulfil your wishes. Remember to include your training companion/s in all your festivities and to fill up their stocking too.

Remember too that training shouldn't stop at home during this break, but be sure when you do train that you do it early morning or in the evening and not in the heat of the day.

My special thanks to Anton and Dick who abiy do the printing of this Newsletter each time, and to my various collaters who have helped over the year.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 4TH OCTOBER, 1988

I would like to say that I have been very proud to be President of such a great Club for the past 12 months. I believe we are a very progressive Club and have shown our leadership qualities in many areas, particularly in Agility and Community Service, such as our various programs on Responsible Dog Ownership. It is essential that we continue to grow in all areas, the days of being just a "dog training school" are well behind us. I believe that we have the best facilities of any Obedience Club in Victoria and our wonderful grounds are second to none, and the praise we receive on Trial days are testimony to this.

Our Club is financially sound with total accumulated members funds amounting to \$89,990. This of course is tied up in our various Assets. Our total income for the year amounted to \$16,504 with outgoings (expenditure) totalling \$13,731, leaving us a net profit of \$2,773. In addition to this we received a Capital Grant of \$2,916 from the City of South Barwon to enable the completion of our storeroom extension. (These figures relate to the financial year 1st July, 1987 to 30th June, 1988.)

This success does not just happen, and comes about because of the many dedicated people who make it happen. To be successful all areas must work together as a team and there must be communication between everyone. The most important people in this club are the members who come to train their dogs each week and they are the ones who will suffer if there is a communication breakdown. I believe the last 12 months have seen a close-knit group working together for the betterment of the club.

I must first of all thank the Committee for their support and for their efforts during the year. To our Vice President Graham, thanks for being there when there was a problem to discuss and for supporting me as President; to Anton, who has the most difficult job of all as Secretary, — again a job very well done and who gave me another shoulder to lean on; to Lisa who did a great job as Trial Secretary, thank you also to you and your helpers. Our three trials ran very smoothly thanks to the efficient way they were run.

The loss of Elaine Janes as Treasurer, due to work load, in February left us with a big problem, however we were fortunate to have Ingrid Socterbock step into this position. She has done a terrific job as Treasurer and my thanks go to her for her capable handling of this demanding position.

Thank you also to Brian and Dick, Training Supervisors, Chris as Canteen Manager, Stuart as Publicity Officer, David our Hall Manager and Robert our Social co-ordinator. Thank you all for a job well done.

There is one person I haven't mentioned and that is our Ground Manager, Len Richards. As I mentioned previously our grounds are second to none and this is due to the hours and hours of work put in by our Ground Managers and of course, their helpers over many years. I know that Len puts in many hours on our grounds when no-one else is around and his efforts, as one of our more senior members who doesn't always enjoy the luxury of good health, is to be applauded. Thank you Lenny.

Thank you also to our Instructors who have one of the more difficult tasks. One of our biggest problems is a shortage of Instructors and these people are often asked to assist at a moments notice. It is good to see a few new assistant instructors coming up, however we must look to building on this if we are to give our members a high standard of training. I trust that all Instructors will get

What a "whirlwind" it's been!!!! (My workload for the first 6 weeks would scare the pants off Superman - whoops - sorry - Superperson). The Geelong Fun Day, October Obedience Trial, Daylight Savings change-over, new 12 weekly training schedule for classes 2 & 3, lots of <u>PASSES</u> at BEGINNERS LEVEL and 2 at BASIC OBEDIENCE LEVEL - CONGRATULATIONS to all - It really is worth the long hard haul??? I too have been coping with a new "Family Member" and 8 - 12 week old puppies need lots of love and attention (lots of guidance & "routine" - it pays off in the long run). Xmas "is coming" too and we all know how hectic that is. I'm not complaining though - I thrive on hard yakka/organised chaos.

I had planned to write a short report(don't want to bore you), but as there is so much to "report", I'll \underline{try} to cover each item briefly.

First of all, I'd like to remind "older" members and inform "newer" members of one of the objectives, some of the rules and the reasons for these rules, that we (Committe/Instructors/Members) abide by — "General" Rules of the "Club".

- To help people train their dogs so that they become <u>HAPPY USEFUL PETS</u>.
- Membership cards must be displayed during "official" training hours if you leave yours at home or lose it please go to the Secretary's office and obtain a "Day Pass" sticker.
- Have the <u>correct</u> training equipment correction chain (not rusty), that fits comfortably over the dogs head (with <u>no more</u> than approx. 2" "play".)
- If you are asked to leave class because your instructor feels your dog is too ill/in pain to train, please do so. A dog associates pain with the activity happening at the same time. On returning to your class after your dogs recouperation, you MUST produce a Vet's certificate stating that "THE DOG IS FIT TO RETURN TO WORK/SCHOOL".

 THIS APPLIES TO ANY DOG ON THE GEELONG OBEDIENCE DOG CLUB Inc. TRAINING GROUND. ANY ELECTED/DESIGNATED, COMMITTEE PERSON OR INSTRUCTOR WILL REPORT TO THE TRAINING SUPERVISOR, WHO CONFERS WITH AN EXECUTIVE MEMBER OF THE COMMITTEE BEFORE ACTUALLY ASKING YOU TO LEAVE, ADVISING YOU TO TAKE YOUR PET FOR VETINARIAN ADVICE.
- Wear correct shoes/clothing when training (how would you like to be trodden on by size ?? hob nail boots or have floppy thongs banging in your ear while you're trying to listen to commands). Flapping coats tend to make a dog heel wide (he/she doesn't want a "slap in the face".)
- UNNECESSARY HITTING OR MANHANDLING OF ANY DOG IS STRICTLY FORBIDDEN.
- You have the right to refuse an instructor taking/teaching your dog if you think his/her methods may intimidate/scare, or even make a placid dog aggressive. We (the instructors) know the right way to correct a problem, but sometimes it does not work in a class situation, so think carefully before turning your "pet" over to some-one else refer to the first item above HAPPY USEFUL PETS. ASK advice and try to correct the problem yourself & never, ever, let frustration over-ride your commonsense while training your dog.
- Dogs are to be ON LEAD ½ an hour before and ½ an hour after training, not TIED TO VERANDAH/OTHER POST & LEFT UNATTENDED. The paddocks to the left and right of the Club-house ARE INCLUDED IN THIS.

Training Supervisor's Report cont'd

- DO NOT TIE your DOG/DOGS TO your CAR or IN YOUR UTE and leave UNATTENDED. We have had several <u>nasty incidents</u> lately where dogs have been attacked. What if a <u>CHILD</u> was leading a <u>PUP</u> around???????? It is a <u>FAMILY CLUBI!</u> Once again, <u>COMMONSENSE</u> should prevail and lets face it, the dogs are only protecting <u>YOUR</u> property HANDS UP those who <u>PRAISED</u> the <u>PUP</u> for doing just that when you used to take him/her on "trips".
- If you are unhappy/aggrieved about <u>any</u> training method, rule or with an Instructor or Committee Person please see either the Training Supervisor (or Assistant Training Supervisor Colin Humphreys), President Lesley Gaylard or one of the Vice Presidents, John Boeyen or Dick Wiltink. We are humanifit and will try to solve your problem/grievence.
- New classes start on the 1st of every month and it is only then that new members or members who have been away for some time may "join in a class". Consideration must be given to the Instructor (who has to repeat his previous week/weeks instructions) and also to the class members (who have to listen to it all over again). Put yourself in either position and you will see it can be confusing and boring repitition something we would really like to avoid for the sake of all members and their dogs. It's very hard for Anton too he has to chase me all over the ground!!! Dick Wiltink is holding a class on Sunday at 9.30 for those who cann't attend Wednesday night training. Perhaps this could help untill a new month/class begins please see Dick though before "joining in".



PART FOUR. HAPPINESS IS AN OBEDIENCE TRAINED DOG

So far we have looked at the Heel on lead - Stand for Examination - Heel off lead - Stand Stay exercises in a Novice trial.

So there is only one individual exercise left and that is the Recall. But before we start let me explain what a Recall is.

Remember when you bought your pet as a puppy? You probably called it to come to you even before it had a name. So if you called out for instance "Here puppy" and if the puppy did come to you, then you and your puppy at that time performed your first recall. However, now that your puppy has grown and has been to Obedience School you would have noticed that the recall has "grown up" too.

We will, therefore, have a look at what is required from the handler and his dog performing a recall in a Novice trial.

You are still in the ring and have just finished the Stand Stay exercise. The Judge has explained to you that the next exercise is the recall and gives you the choice on where to leave your dog. Meaning you may leave your dog at the starting post end or the other end of the ring. Before you make your choice you have to consider several important things, the sun, the wind, and rain are the most important ones. I would never leave my dog facing the sun for instance, but I would leave him facing the wind so when I called him I'd be sure that he would hear me. If it was windy and raining, I'd still leave my dog facing the wind. Something else which I find very interesting is this; not all the grounds are perfectly flat, and if you strike a ground with a definite slope you have to do some quick thinking about the personality of your dog. To explain this, put yourself in the place of the dog. An average dog's eye height measured from the ground is about 18 inches while the average handler is about 5'8". I may have missed a few inches here or there, but let us just stick to these numbers for the sake of the exercise, okay?

Now through your dog's eyes you are "towering" over him, but what happens if you walk away from him? From the dog's point of view you are not only walking away but your stature is getting smaller too, and depending on how far you walk away you could finish up just a dot in the distance. We can notice this on the dog, everytime you walk away from his as his ears come up, that means he is concentrating.

If there is a definite slope on the ground then all of this changes somewhat. If you leave your dog at the bottom and walk away from him up the slope, then your stature stays more or less the same but if you leave your dog at the top end, then when you walk away down the slope your stature may through the dog's eyes, get smaller twice the rate as on level ground. And here is where the dog's personality comes in. If your dog is excitable and nearly runs you off your feet on a flat ground after you have called him, then leave him at the bottom of the "hill" in a recall. If your dog is rather slow in the recall, then leave him at the top. Get the picture?

This was just something I thought to throw in, it is very unlikely that you would strike a ground like the one I described, but this may help you in training your dog for the recall.

There are a lot of things to consider when you are given the choice on where to leave your dog in a recall exercise. There are always people with dogs waiting outside the ring, or you family may be watching you. There may be trees or bushes. I have seen dogs run straight past their handlers in a recall to relieve themselves at a tree. Your ring may be close to a highway, or you may have been able to park your car close to the ring.

These are only some of the things you have to consider when you get the choice on where to leave your dog in this exercise.

The recall is judged over eight points so let's have a look at them.

You have decided where you should leave your dog and take that spot. The Judge asks you "Are you ready?" and judging will commence when you answer "yes". So again, be careful and look to see if your dog is in the right position. That is point one. Point two is when the order "Forward" is given. Here the Judge looks for anticipation on the part of the dog as he may get up before you can say "Heel". Then there is the "walk up" that is the few metres that you walk forward before the order "halt" is given. Some dogs lag here because they already know that pretty soon they will stop again. That is point three. Next is the Sit. You'd be surprised how many dogs fail this part of the exercise. That is point 4.

It may be assumed that dogs who lag or fail to sit on this part of the exercise have in many cases been "over trained" on the Stand for Examination and the Stand Stay exercises.

Then comes the part where you leave your dog. At the Judge's orders "Leave your dog" you must give a proper hand signal and command, like "stay or wait", then walk away in a straight line and at a brisk pace until the Judge orders you "About turn". Here is where a lot of handlers go wrong; they do the "about turn" and stand still. For this the Judge will deduct points from the handler for anticipating a command. He should not have stopped and after he turned commenced walking back to his dog until the Judge ordered him to "Halt". That is point five.

In the meantime one can see some dogs getting restless because their masters have left them and some Judges may deduct points for fidgeting. After the Judge has positioned himself at about 45° behind the handler and the dog is watching the handler he will order "Call your dog" and that in many cases is the moment of truth. The "do or die" bit of the recall because a lot of things can go wrong from that moment. And they come all under point six e.g.

1. Dog fails to come at first command. 2. Dog comes at a brisk pace but slows down half way. 3. Dog comes in at a brisk pace but with a bow (on windy days Judges will allow for this to some degree). 4. Dog has come but fails to sit in front of handler. 5. Dog has come but sits crooked in front of handler. 6. Dog has come but sits beside handler (facing him). 7. Dog has come and sits straight in front of handler but just out of reach. 8. Dog has come but runs around the handler and stands at heel position. 9. Dog has come but circles handler and sits in front of him. 10. Dog has come but runs past handler. 11. Dog has come but runs around handler and sits at heel position. 12. Dog has come before handler called. 13. Dog has followed handler when he walked off, etc, etc. There are many more and for most of them you'll get a zero score. I am sure that some of you are very familiar with these faults or some of them.

Now for judging point seven. The dog has come in nice and straight and at a brisk pace; it halts and sits dead straight in front of the handler. From here the dog can: 1. Anticipate the finish by walking around the handler without any command. 2. Fail tomove on the first command to finish. 3. Walk wide around the handler when he gives command to "Heel". 4. Slow response to handlers' command to heel. 5. On the command to "heel" dog circles handler completely. 6. Dog will not sit at the heel position, etc. etc.

Judging point number eight is the anticipation of the order "Exercise finished". So there you are who said that the recall is easy.

It is all very well to write about all the things that can go wrong in a recall exercise. Let us, therefore, now have a look—how to avoid these problems.

The recall in mv book is THE most important exercise to teach a doc and one should teach it to perfection.

So where do we start?

I said that most people will call a purpov to come even before it has a proper name. Unbeknown to most of them, they at that moment perform the <u>most important part</u> of the recall, to get the puppy to come when it was called.

In my earlier reports I have stated that whatever a puppy is taught at about 12 weeks of age, will be with him for the rest of its life. This does not mean that nothing can be taught before that. Just look at house training; this is usually done as soon as the puppy comes to its new home and in most cases this should take no longer than a week or ten days.

It also does not mean that we can teach a puppy of twelve weeks of age anything that comes into ourmind, in other words don't go beserk at it.

However, things like walking on the lead or playing with the toys, YOU want it to play with instead of ripping the good things apart, and of course the recall can be taught. When started at an early age these exercises become a "piece of cake". Many people wait until their pet enters an Obedience school before they start teaching them anything and exercises like the recall have suddenly become an "obstacle".

I have instructed and lectured at different Obedience schools and have always urged them to start the recall exercise in the puppy classes. Those who did, have benefited from this, others have more difficulties in this exercise.

So to be fair, let us now have a look on how to teach a grown up dog the recall. To start one should test the dog on respect; respect for its handler, who in most cases is also the owner. To do this let the dog roam around at the end of a loose lead and give him as much freedom as possible. Suddenly you call the dog's name and command him to come at the same time, like "Fido come". At that very instance the dog should forget whatever he was doing and come to you. If your dog does that for you that means that he respects you and sees you as his packleader. To reward him for this, praise him by softly calling him/her a good boy or girl. If you can accomplish that then are are well on your way to the recall.

From here we need to tidy up a bit. That is, we should now get the dog to sit in front after he has come. To do that we must command the dog to sit and at the same time with the right hand pull the lead up vertically and with the left <u>flat</u> hand push on his hind quarters until the dog sits. Then praise him again. This may have to be repeated a few times, but beware never over train a dog on the same exercise. Dogs get bored easily.

Before you attempt that part of the recall where you have to leave your dog you should make sure that your dog is thoroughly trained on the Sit Stay exercise. You should be able to sit your dog and walk away from him without any movement on the part of the dog. After you have mastered that, start the next step and that is the distance that you walk away from the dog. In any trial this distance is at least 12 metres, but in training I would alter that distance all the time, varying from two to twenty metres all the time. Also the time, from the point that you come to a halt after the about turn and the point that you call thedog should be different all the time. This stops a lot of anticipation on the part of the dog. For

starters I would leave my dog, walk away and do the about turn. Here I would stay and count to myself slowly till three or four and then I would walk back to my dog. If he had not moved then praise him. Then I would go and do some other exercises before I would return to the recall again. Gradually I would then proceed to call the dog to me from a distance, etc. etc. Another point to remember is, when you have left your dog but are still close to him, do not shout for him to come but speak softly. If your dog is naturally excited then go down to a whisper, but no matter how you do it, always make sure that your dog sits straight in front of you after he has come.

The next step in the recall exercise is the "Finish". When your dog has come in and sits straight in front of you, you should praise him "verbally" NO HANDS, then put the lead on him. From here you would step with your RIGHT foot diagonal to the left past your dog and at the same time call your dog to "Heel". As soon as your dog moves you must place your left foot next to your right foot and tell your dog to "sit". This should have to be repeated no more than three or four times and providing you have done this exercise as described above your dog will make a perfect finish 99 out of a 100 times.

I could write another few pages on the recall exercise but I think I have explained the most important parts and this should get you on your way to a near perfect recall. Should you still have problems, then ask your Instructor or come and ask me.

Daylight savings has commenced and that means that we commenced our Wednesday night training sessions. Like last year, I will make myself available to give extra lessons to whoever needs it. In those classes I will look mainly at problems be it the dog or the handler. However, I need to know how many of you are willing to participate well beforehand, so come and talk to me.

BACK to the Novice trial.

The next exercise is a group exercise, the one minute <u>Sit stay</u>. As your catalogue number is called you should proceed into the ring with your dog on the lead and stand in front of a number placed there by the Judge with the help from his Steward. There are never <u>more</u> than 10 dogs in the ring at the same time, and never <u>less</u> than three.

The numbers have been placed by metres apart so you have plenty of room. Next the Judge will tell you to sit your dog and remove your lead, the Steward will walk past to collect these. On orders of the Judge you must leave your dog together with the other competitors. Orders from the Judge "Leave your dog", and from that moment the Steward pushes the button on the stopwatch. From here all sorts of things can go wrong. The competitors are standing in line facing their dogs from at least 12 metres away. But one can see some dogs following their masters when they walked off, or some dogs stay for a little while and then get up to join their masters. Other The "best" ones dogs just lay down or get up to interfere with the dog next door. are those dogs that decide to get up just as the Judge or the Steward is about to order "Return to your dogs". These I call the "time dogs"; one can be assured that these dogs were trained on this exercise for the one minute instead of varying the time. These dogs get to know when that minute is up to the second, and then they just get up because as far as they are concerned, the exercise is finished. As far as the dogs that got up during the exercise or interfered with the other dogs, they need to go back to "Basic Training" for a while. I know that it seems entirely unfair that when a dog gets up because another dog interfered with him, he too looses all the points, but such are the "Rules". To be fair to the other competitors make perfectly sure your dog is ready to do this exercise before you enter a trial.

In the next exercise the three minute <u>Down Stay</u>; and here too we find similar problems, the answers to these are the same as in the Sit Stay exercise.

This then completes our journey through a Novice Trial. I hope I have been able to help at least some of you by explaining these Novice exercises and their "problems".

This is our last Newsletter for this year and with that, I wish all of you a merry and safe holiday.

Look after your pets and remember that this time of the year is dangerous for your pets especially in the car, so leave plenty of water and ventilation for them.
