Valerie O'Farrell graduated in psychology from Oxford University in 1963. After training in clinical psychology and obtaining a Ph.D at the Institute of Psychiatry, London, she worked as a lecturer in the Department of Psychology, University College, London and in the Department of Psychiatry, Edinburgh University. She became interested in the application of psychology to problem behaviour in pets and since 1982 has been attached to the Small Animal Practice Teaching Unit of the Royal (Dick) School of Veterinary Studies in Edinburgh. She is engaged in research into dog behaviour problems and provides a consultancy service for the owners of small animals with behavioural problems.

As a household pet, a dog (like a cat) is usually felt to be one of the family, in a way which a gerbil or tortoise is not. One reason for this special relationship is that dogs can normally be allowed to share their owners' living space. This privileged position depends on a dog's ability to learn to deposit its urine and faeces in convenient and designated places; in other words to be house-trained. When house-training breaks down and urine or faeces start to appear on a regular basis in unacceptable places, the dog-owner relationship is seriously threatened. Owners often feely morally outraged, as if some social contract had been broken. Euthanasia may become a real possibility. AND TRADESTORYS ON THE SELECTION OF THE

It is a great pity when this happens because, in the majority of cases, something can be done. Even if the problem cannot be completely eradicated, it can usually be substantially alleviated.

Two steps should be taken before starting to do anything about the problem. The first step is to STOP PUNISHING THE DOG. There are various reasons why hitting or shouting at a dog which has urinated or defaecated in the wrong place is counter-productive. The only benefits of punishment are to the owner, whose feelings may be relieved by this show of indignation.

The next step is to UNDERSTAND THE BEHAVIOUR. There are various reasons why a dog may urinate or defaecate inappropriately.

PHYSICAL CAUSES

A dog may urinate or defaecate in the house because of physical/pathological changes. This should be suspected and veterinary advice sought if urination is abnormally frequent, irrespective of time or place, or if the consistency of the faeces is abnormal.

SUBMISSIVE URINATION

When a dog meets a person or dog which it regards as dominant (i.e. above it in the "pecking order") it will often roll over on its back with one hind leg raised. This posture is known as "passive submission" and is sometimes accompanied by urination. This kind of urination is more common in puppies and often disappears as the dog matures. It it persists, the people who provoke it should try to behave in a less dominant way towards the dog.

Where possible, they should let it approach them, rather than VICE VERSA. If they have to go up to the dog, they should do so with gaze averted, crouching down to the dog's level. Above all, they should not punish the dog, as this will make them seem even more dominant in the dog's eyes.

STRESS AND EXCITEMENT

Dogs may lose control of bladder or bowels when they are extremely excited or more rarely, afraid. This can happen for example when they greet visitors to the house. Again this behaviour is more common in puppies. The problem can be minimised by thinking ahead and trying to avoid the situations which provoke intense excitement or arrange for them to occur where urination does not matter: for example, the dog might greet visitors in the garden rather than in the hall.

SEPARATION FROM OWNER

One form of stress which may provoke urination or defaecation is separation from the owner. This cause should be suspected when a dog fouls the house only when the owner is out or when it is shut in the kitchen for the night. Typically the dog appears restless and upset as the owner prepares to leave and is enormously excited when they are reunited. It may also be active in other problematic ways when the owner is absent; it may chew things, scratch at the door, bark or whine.

The subject of the treatment of separation anxiety is beyond the scope of this article. Basically, however, it involves teaching the dog to remain calm during separations by starting with very short separations and gradually increasing the time the owner is away. Any form of punishment should be avoided, as it tends to Cont...

make the dog more anxious and may induce a state of conflict about the owner.

URINE MARKING

For dogs, urination can be a form of social communication. Dogs are usually interested in one another's urine, the most intense interest being shown by male dogs for the urine of oestrus bitches. The urine certainly conveys general information about a dog's sexual status and probably more specific information, so that one dog can distinguish the urine of another familiar dog from that of a stranger.

Dogs sometimes feel moved to deposit these urine messages in the house, probably as forms of advertisement or self-assertion. They may be triggered by the visit of a strange dog to the house (especially if it also engages in urine marking) or even by the presence of human visitors. Conversely, a dog may leave urine marks when it visits a strange house.

Dogs are more prone to urine marking than are bitches and castration has been shown to be helpful in 50% of cases (Hopkins and others, 1976). The likely effectiveness of this operation can be tested by using a chemical equivalent such as delmadinone ('Tardak', Syntex).

Otherwise, the best way to combat urine marking in the house is to be alert to the situations which normally provoke it and to keep the dog under supervision at those times. Care should be taken to remove the smell of previous urine marks, especially those of other dogs, as these will tend to provoke further marking. Bleach or a biological detergent should be used for this purpose; disinfectants with their own strong smell should be avoided.

FAULTY LEARNING

Sometimes dogs urinate or defaecate indoors because house-training has gone wrong. To understand how this happens and how it can be remedied, it is necessary to understand how successful house-training takes place. Urination and defaecation are reflex actions. In the first two to three weeks of life, the stimulus for these actions is the bitch licking the puppy. As soon as the puppy can crawl, it instinctively urinates and defaecates outside the nest and around eight weeks can be seen searching for scent marks of previous urinations; these now provide the stimulus for the reflex. Gradually a learned association is built up between the urination or defaecation and other incidental stimuli which accompany or immediately precede it. Eventually standing on newspaper or grass will act as the stimulus and finally the whole sequence of actions involved in going out of the back door into the garden will tend to provoke it. House-training, therefore, involves arranging that the same combination of desirable stimuli, for example newspaper or grass, are always present when the puppy needs to urinate or defaecate. It also involves ensuring that the puppy is not exposed to undesirable combinations of stimuli, for example scent marks on the carpet, as this can result in it learning the opposite of what is intended. The task is made easier by the fact that urination and defaecation can to some extent be predicted; they usually follow sleep or feed. They also occur at other times, nowever, and there is no substitute for keeping a puppy under constant observation and learning about its individual habits.

In being house-trained the puppy never learns a rule or social convention: it nerely forms a habit. It is therefore quite inappropriate to become morally outraged at a dog which urinates or defaecates in the house, as the dog is incapable of seeing its own action as wicked or dirty. Punishment by the owner,

therefore, has no place in house training. If administered after the 'crime', it has no effect on the learning process, as the dog cannot make the connection between the two events. If the dog is 'caught in the act' and punished, there is a strong possibility that it will learn the wrong thing; it may, for example, learn to inhibit urination in the owner's presence. This can give rise to a situation where the dog does not urinate when the owner takes it out but as soon as they return to the house, it sneaks away to another room and urinates there.

These undesirable habits can be formed in the best regulated households but they are more likely if the dog is left unobserved for long periods or if punishment is used in training. If it is suspected that faulty learning is the cause of the problem, the dog should be house trained again, as if it were a puppy. It should be taken out to relieve itself after sleep and meals and it should not be left for long periods unsupervised. Any scent marks of urine or faeces in the house should as far as possible be eradicated and the dog should be allowed access to parts of the house where these have been found, only under observation. Such a regime requires time and patience but in most cases, eventually proves successful.

MULTIPLE CAUSES

Dogs which foul in the house often do so for a combination of the reasons outlined above. Thus a dog might defaecate when shut in the kitchen partly as a result of separation distress and partly because of faulty learning. The particular factors operating have to be assessed for each individual case.





TRAINING SUPERVISORS REPORT MARCH 1990

To those of you who do not know me; and then I ask why not; as the new Instructors Board (full of lovely photos - not "mug shots"), your Club Newsletter or your class Instructor will tell you; my name is Jan Boeyen, fortunately married to the current President, but not for reasons pertaining to the Club; even though (knowing him as I do) I feel he is a good President because he has the interests of YOU, THE MEMBER foremost in his mind. He does not believe it to be "HIS CLUB" or "HIS MONEY", and will physically match any task requested of or by, you, the member at working bees. Only I know how much time over the summer break he was "down at the Club". I bet you're saying; but he's a fit young man! Young? - Middle of the road; Fit? - If you forget about his back, shoulder and wrist, you could be right. Soooo, when he asks you attend working bees, come along and give a hand? (He's also GROUND MANAGER) Enough of him though, his head will be to big to fit into his "Dicky Knee" cap.

I have been Training Supervisor for 17 months and feel we have achieved a great deal. (When I say "we", I am referring to "the Club"). Recently, a valued instructor asked me to do a mini survey to find out the Clubs most successful year/s. I based the survey on Basic Obedience Certificate Passes and in 1989 there were 25, this not being the case since 1981. WHY????? There were many changes made in our Club, both Training and Administrative and CHANGES are HARD to ADAPT to once WE ARE SET IN OUR WAYS. Then again, we should never be complacent, we should strive to IMPROVE all the time. Why do YOU attend training??? To strive to improve I hope.

Our methods of training are based on correction and praise (both immediate, not ten minutes later), but if you do not COMMUNICATE with your dog (friend) from the day you bring your puppy/dog home, then I HOUR of training at our Club MAY NOT help you. To me, communication is ASKING QUESTIONS and READING. If I don't know what I'm talking about, I WILL FIND OUT. (Like a Terrier "worrying" a bone is one way I have been described).

I am a forward thinking person, compassionate, ready to listen to your point of view or COMPLAINT, but, should I see someone being cruel to their pet or "thinking of only themselves" (an ego trip), then I am a TOUGH LADY. And LADY I am; I was raised by firm, but loving parents who set values; good manners if you like! My parents used "correction and praise", not BRUTALITY, to raise me, thus in my later years, those value are imprinted on my mind and I SINCERELY HOPE all people can train their "friends" with the same FIRMNESS and LOVE. If they are a MEMBER of your FAMILY, don't they deserve to be treated as you would like to be. UNDERSTAND YOUR DOG/FRIEND. AND YOU WILL SUCCEED!!!!! (we have a GREAT LIBRARY).

Recently, a member of my family accused me of "bashing" may dog. NORMALLY, I respect my elders, BUT THIS WAS TOO MUCH!!!. Bashing, her words, was my SCRUFFING and use of CORRECTION CHAIN after he had GROWLED at a CHILD because he was SCARED by the childs actions. As I told her, if I HAD NOT CORRECTED my dog, and then PRAISED him, HE may have BITTEN a CHILD and she, my accuser, would have been the FIRST one to CRY, "SHOOT THE DOG, IT'S VICIOUS".

A dog must have a PACK LEADER and to my/our dogs, I am "Mum", setting values and raising, a good mannered "child", one of which I am proud and who is rock solid as a Member of our Display Team.

All I can say to you is; if you have a problem, ASK QUESTIONS, LISTEN, READ, find the SOLUTION and ONLY THEN go about correcting to problem! Not in a DAY, not in a MONTH, but SOLVE it you will if YOU have PATIENCE and can ADMIT that perhaps YOU HAVE "CREATED A MONSTER".

I admit openly, I have made mistakes, RAISING Prince, Lara, Gypsy, Jade, Quester, Omen, Jedda, Satan, Rannach, Qaid and Sagan (all G.S.D.'s); plus litters of their pups, but I HAVE LEARNT BY MY (and OTHER PEOPLES) MISTAKES and STRIVE to improve. Johnny, who introduced me to Shepherds, with Prince, some 20 years ago, will also be making mistakes, but then working to correct them.(I trained HIM well!!!)

PLEASE, read all the material given to you by the Club; they have been produced by "ordinary" people, such as yourselves; who in time, could become INSTRUCTORS.

In 1989, new handlers commencing in Class I each month averaged 28, thus two (2) Instructors could quite easily accommodate that amount. BUT... on 7/2/90!!!!! a 3rd class I had to be organised at the last moment (but did I panic? -just a little). The line outside the office just GREW and GREW!! The final count of new class I handlers was **51**. This is FANTASTIC as obviously more people are realising the RESPONSIBILITIES of owning a dog and the need for a WELL BEHAVED one.

Desma Dickeson and the Display Team must be CONGRATULATED on "DISPLAYING" our wares so well. Comments heard after the Queenscliffe Display and Parade were very rewarding. Comments, whether COMPLIMENTS or COMPLAINTS, reflect on our Club and judging by the enormous amount of new members on 7/2/90, our Club can be proud of the Display Team. There was only one NEGATIVE aspect of the day and that was the organisation by our hosts. PRE-ORGANISED plans WERE NOT carried through and Desma had to contend with train rides zipping around, overwhelming noise from a nearby broadcast station and an unroped area — ALL OF WHICH WERE PRE-ORGANIZED. Desma and her Team are extremely well organised: a pity that SOME of our HOSTS are NOT.

Many thanks to Meinhard Breiberg and Dick Wiltink for taking Sunday Classes. Those Sunday classes are for those Members who CANNOT attend Wednesday nights, those who need extra training with "problems" and instructors wishing to train their own dogs. IT IS NOT to be regarded as a "PRIVATE LESSON" session by members.

To assist those Members who fall into the above categories, I will take a class from 6p.m. to 6.30p.m. on Wednesday nights. At this stage it is only for half an hour, but if I receive support from other instructors who can give; and have to spare; half an hour of their time, it may be extended to an hour. Remember though, half an hour of association with other people and dogs is better than none.

TRIAL TRAINING will be available Wednesdays, from 4p.m. on, for those Members who wish to "go further" and start trialling. (Have you got "the bug" yet?) This will be taken by Meinhard Breiberg until mid May, when, lucky devil, he's going overseas. I have promised Meinhard that I will take it on during his absence, but willingly hand back the reins on his return. (Meinhard reminded me of a few errors in my handling when I was in his Trial class last year - Sagan got his Companion Dog Title soon after - thanks Meinhard). If any instructor wishes to assist Meinhard in this area, please let me know. If you wish to attend Trial Training, your name and time of attendance MUST be on

If you wish to attend Trial Training, your name and time of attendance <u>MUST</u> be on the list (on the table, outside the glass door) – it's awfully COLD and MISERABLE waiting for Members who MIGHT show up. A phone call is all it takes to advise of your non-attendance.

In closing (have I waffled on too much?), I would like to say THANK YOU to "MY INSTRUCTORS" - YOU DO A WONDERFUL JOB!!! Until recently when I was speaking to an Instructor, one who I greatly respect and value his ideas, I didn't realise that I HAD NOT BEEN PRAISING enough. All of us, and that includes me, would like to be told "we are doing well" as, although we know it, we (most of us) are humble and do not seek praise, but why do we lavish praise on our dogs and not praise (or otherwise) our fellow man (oops!!! - fellow person).

I can tell by class number attendance records, who is a good person/instructor. Naturally, we "lose" some of you to wrok, family or other committments, but that is gradual, "a tapering off" if you prefer, not a sudden drop. When you do not COMMUNICATE with us to tell us why you are not returning, I question why: are you ill, has your dog been hurt or gone to "Doggy Heaven". Are you bored, unhappy with us?????? Please tell your instructor, OR ME. I am very approachable, and if it is a "personality clash" with your instructor, it can be solved.

If you find YOU are "not getting on" with your Instructor, and CANNOT OVERCOME it, I can place YOU in another class, keeping in mind that should your INSTRUCTOR feel you are wasting your time in their class as THEY FEEL they cannot find a way to communicate with YOU, I would approach you and suggest a change of Class. Perhaps another Instructor can "get the message across", or listen to you if you feel you know more about your dog than he/she does. As Training Supervisor, I guess you can replace the words with "go between" for members, Instructors and Committee!!! - I AM YOUR VOICE, TRYING TO KEEP A HAPPY BALANCE.

To aid Instructors to know and remember all the changes re training and administration of our Club, as from the next Instructors Meeting on 30/4/90, all instructors will receive an agenda prior to the meeting, so you will be able to study them at your leisure; know all the facts and have your say (and I hope, have the conviction to "stick with it" - not "follow the leader").

Some new faces, aspiring Instructors, would be welcomed with open arms as Assistant Instructors. We currently have 34 instructors on our books, but due to other committments at other times, cannot always take a class, so more would be welcome.

Boy, do I waffle on!! I was closing 4 paragraphs ago.

Good luck in 1990, train your dog ONLY WHEN YOU have the time and patience, whether at home or in class. PLEASE COMMUNICATE with us, come to meetings, or if you're not "brave enough", there is a suggestion box, <u>BUT</u> BE PREPARED TO "PUT IN" AS MUCH "AS YOU EXPECT" - I DOI!!!! Look at the way the world has changed in the past 10 YEARS AND BE A "FORWARD THINKER" - I AM!!!
