THE STUMPY TAIL CATTLE DOG

HISTORY

It is generally agreed that, the **Stumpy Tail Cattle Dog** descended from the original cross of a dog known as a Smithfield with the Australian Native dog, the Dingo. This cross is believed to have been made by a drover named Timmins of Bathurst, New South Wales, in about 1830. The progeny, red bobtailed dogs were known as 'Timmins Biters'.

The negatives of the Smithfield in this country were that it could not stand the heat and it barked too much which upset and stampeded the cattle.

The Dingo trait of silently creeping up behind an animal and biting came through in 'Timmins Biters'. The dogs were great workers, however, they proved to be too severe on the stock.

Another cross was needed. A smooth haired Blue Merle Collie was introduced, thus establishing an excellent all round dog - the ancestor of the present day Stumpy Tail Cattle Dog./

PURPOSE

Every dog has a reason for being, and, as the name suggests, they are cattle dogs, used for the purpose of herding and containing cattle, however, they also make excellent family pets and wonderful watch dogs.

DISPOSITION

They are lively and extremely alert, very protective, yet with a soft loving nature which make them excellent with children and very devoted to their owners. They are extremely intelligent and very easy to train, which makes us ideal for obedience and agility work.

EXERCISE

Exercise is essential. They are extremely active and require a goodsize backyard to run around. They also love to be taken for long walks, so take them with you on your daily jog around the park.

ENVIRONMENT


They require a good strong kennel which is warm to provide adequate shelter for all types of weather: Whilst they are mainly outdoor dogs, they also love to come into the house and be part of the family and be pampered on occasion.

MAINTENANCE

We require very little in the way of grooming. A thorough brush once a week with a good bristle or pin brush, or even just a comb, to keep the coats neat, well groomed and healthy. They also require bathing occasionally, this also helps to keep them healthy, clean and conditions us to be socially acceptable.

Whatever your requirements, their purpose of development as a cattle dog, show dog, obedience dog, guard dog or just a lovable family pet, we meet your needs.

THE PET CEMETERY

The first Pet Cemetery originated in France 87 years ago and is the resting place for many of our animal world film stars; one of the 'RIN TIN' dogs being amongst them. Recently pet lovers were seen to take a strong stand on its conservation when the French authorities thought of closing it and using the area and the surrounds for other purposes.

Our own Victorian Pet Memorial Garden is situated at Rowville and has been operated for over 25 years by Mr. John Alexander.

The cemetery is divided into thee categories "FRLINE FAMILY" for cats, "CANINE COURT" for dogs and JJUST US FRIENDS" for a variety of animals. You may have your pet buried or cremated there, and you then order a head-stone to your wording, or you if y elect just to have your pet's name on a communal plaque. The communal plaques are interspersed throughout the garden area. The headstones a e set into the ground, face up, in a river pebble surround.

People may visit these gardens at any time. The double cyclone gate is always shut and it has a chain and lock on it, but despite its looks it is always open (like our own gate to the grounds). If anyone wants more specific directions I can show you where it is in your Melways.

THE ALTERNATIVES

To those people who have v gue ideas or doubts in their minds about these places and whether that's where they want their companions to go to, obviously the decision is yours, and a cemetery is certainly not a choice that appeals to everyone.

If you are able to bury your pet in your own garden and place a plant on the spot in remembrance you are fortunate, but of course this doesn't help flat dwellers or people who move around from address to address.

The other alternative is that your Vet. will offer to dispose of the animal for you to save you further pain: However, the disposal site is the nearest Tip and although this may horrify some people, it is an unemotional task that Vets. perform daily.

I had been personally interested in this cemetery since I first saw an advertisement in the paper about it and had made enquiries as to placing my Dobermann there when it was his time to rest. I really feit I owed my dog "RESCH" this as he had been through some traumatic times in his 13 years of life with me (he was already 2 years old when I met him), plus many new addresses and the Darwin cyclone; and goodness knows what for those first two years before as a 'found dog' he was offered to me:

I'd made up my mind and had saved the money so that when that night finally came and he was put down at 15 years old, I had the vets, wrap him up and then took him straight to Melbourne to the home of Mr. Alexander who was very gentle and kind in his manner, befitting the sadness and personal loss that I felt. I arranged for "RESCH'S" cremation and the headstone and was told that as soon as it was all completed I'd be sent a photograph of it in its resting place.

True to the time set for the stone work to be completed, the photograph came and I subsequently made my first visit to the Cemetery/Memorial Gardens.

To wander around and read everything that first time is both sad and joyous. It is reassuring to know so many people have been so close to their pet companions be it dog or anything else.

Mr. Alexander has certainly filled a need for many people.

Due to the location of the cemetery I only get to visit once per year and on the last occasion I took my German Shepherd into the gardens with me. I knew roughly where "RESCH'S" headstone lay in the most congested area of the gardens (obviously at the time of his death there were quite a lot of other dogs laid to rest about the same time and this particular section is a bit cramped space wise), but I was getting frustrated because I couldn't locate it, so I told "KING" to sit and stay while I made a further hunt. So up and down the rows again searching.

Suddenly I realized where it was. "KII 3" had found it, and was sitting on it, and that's exactly what did happen! The chance of that occurring was a thousand to one and I truly believe in that instance that the sixth sense attributed to many animals was in strong evidence here. Personally I believe that dogs do have this sixth sense that many of us humans are never able to bring out and develop in ourselves and there have been strongly documented cases to support this.

Within our own Club Library there are tooks that deal with this subject and I am sure Phyl, our Librarian would be delighted to help anyone that would like to learn more about this, yet another facet of understanding the dogs we love and live with.

My beliefs may not be your beliefs, but it is worth the effort to read about these things and then form your own judgement.

FOOTNOTE:

Since writing this article some years ago, "KING" has now passed on and this time as I live in my own home he is buried in my own yard in a special enclosure with four miniature roses planted out.

KENNEL COUGH

Kennel Cough is a highly contagious respiratory disease of dogs. Although rarely life threatening it causes coughing bouts which can persist for a number of weeks, despite treatment, creating significant discomfort for both the dog and its owner. Massive outbreaks can occur in kennels with the vast majority of dogs affected. It is far better to prevent kennel cough rather than try and control the signs of infection once they have occurred.

Affected dogs frequently have been resident in a boarding kennel or training complex, or have been in close contact with other dogs at shows, race tracks, obedience classes or similar assembly, within the previous 5 to 10 days.

Cause

Kennel Cough can be caused by a number of different viruses and bacteria although Bordetella bronchiseptica, canine parainfluenza virus and canine adenovirus type 2 have been most frequently isolated from dogs with kennel cough.

Infection with one of the viruses usually clears up within a week or two, whereas infection with Bordetella may persist for several weeks. If a dog is infected with both Bordetella and a virus, a more severe form of the disease is often seen and coughing may subside during treatment only to return when treatment is finished.

Bordetella can be carried for months by dogs that are not showing any signs of infection. These dogs act as a source of infection for susceptible dogs coming into contact with them.

Signs

The classical sign of kennel cough is a spontaneous, harsh cough that often finishes with gagging. The coughing is usually made worse by exercise, excitement or pressure on the throat region. Severely affected dogs may have a fever, be depressed, not eat and can develop broncho-pneumonia. Clinical signs can persist for several weeks despite treatment.

Treatment

Your veterinarian can provide the best treatment. This may include antibiotics and symptomatic therapy such as cough medicine. Treatment will not only assist in controlling kennel cough in the affected individual but it will also reduce the risk of spread to other susceptible dogs.

Control

For optimal control of kennel cough, pupples should be vaccinated against all of the important viruses and bacteria that can cause kennel cough. Initially dogs and pupples require two injections four weeks apart. Booster doses should be given annually and before exposure to possible sources of infection such as shows, boarding kennels or obedience classes. Your veterinarian can advise you on the best vaccination programme for your particular circumstance.

THE GORDON SETTER

General Appearance: A stylish dog, built on galloping lines, having a thoroughbred appearance consistent with its build which can be compared to a weight carrying hunter. Must have symmetrical conformation throughout, showing true balance. Strong fairly short and level back. Shortish tail. Head fairly long, clearly lined and with intelligent expression, clear colours and long flat coat.

Body: Of moderate length, deep in brisket, with ribs well sprung. Deep in back ribs, i.e. well-ribbed up. Loins wide and slightly arched. Chest not too broad.

Weight and Size: As a guide to size, shoulder height for males 66.04cm (26 inches) and weight about 29.49kg (651b). Females 62.23cm (24½ inches) and weight about 25.40kg (561bs) in show condition.

Origins and Character: The name GORDON SEFTER was given to the breed due to its close links with the fourth buke of Gordon and his ancestral home in Scotland at Gordon Castle. The Duke had a strong kennel of working dogs in the early 1800's and he was known to favour the beautifully marked Black and Tan setters.

"Black and Fallow" dogs were mentioned in early writings from the 17th century and although others were bred along different lines from the Duke of Gordon's dogs the breed has been named in his honour as one of the main founders of the breed.

The Gordon Setter has a character all of his own, he is quick and alert but neither aggressive or shy. Not a dog that adapts well to a life in a kennel but one who needs and demands attention for his proper development. The Gordon returns love and attention with an unwavering loyalty which is rarely found in other breeds. He has a strong protective sense towards members of his family and home but usually will readily adopt his owners attitude to strangers or visitors.

This extreme loyalty and intelligence makes the **Gordon** an excellent pet as well as one who has a record of success in both obedience and field work, his coal black coat set off by rich chestnut markings makes him an eye catching show dog as well.

A co title = big deal?

YOU'RE DARN RIGHT IT IS!

The first obedience title that you earn with your dog is special and very important. The CD (Companion Dog title) is the prerequisite for the more advanced obedience titles. In order to compete in Open and Utility you must first qualify in at least three Novice trials. Novice work is the foundation of all obedience training, so just how important is the CD? Vitally!

It takes a long time to develop a working relationship with your dog. Much more goes into training a dog to the CD level than meets the eye. You do not merely teach your dog to walk nicely by your side, stay still in a stand, sit and down position, and come to you when you call:

You also teach the dog how to learn, how to behave among strangers (both humand canine), how to listen for your instruction, how to tune out instructions and distractions from others, how to understand your language (sounds and body signals), how to control his emotions, how to please you (where his advantage lies through rewards and corrections), how to cope with stress and overcome fears.

You may not even realise how much you have taught your companion bog, or how much you yourself have learned! In order to achieve the results necessary to pass three Novice trials, a long process of learning (on the parts of both handler and dog) must take place. buring this period of development you become aware of your dog's individual temperament, you learn to use a number of different methods and techniques in order to teach your dog the basic skills, and you learn to adapt these methods and techniques to suit the temperament of your own dog.

You have taught your Companion bog to be just that == your companion! You should be very proud of yourself and your dog. If this is the first time you have ever trained a dog, you should take special pride in your C.D., regardless of scores.

Once you have trained your dog in the basics, you have prepared him to learn the more difficult exercises. If you attempted to teach your dog the Utility exercises first, without having taught a proper foundation, your dog would become so confused and stressed out that he would never learn.

All obedience training is based on a series of steps. In Novice, the dog works with you, not independently. He heels by your side, he stays (with you in sight), he comes straight to you when you call. He learns to perform one task on one single command from you. Once he has learned these exercises he can perform them better and better through repetition.

In Open, the dog begins to work more and more independently, and learns to perform a series of tasks on one single command from you. For the 'Retrieve Over High Jump' the dog must, on a single command, leave your side, jump over the high jump, pick up the dumbbell, come back over the jump and sit in front of you. For the 'Broad Jump' the dog must jump over the hurdles without cutting the corners (while you stand two feet to the side of the jump), turn when he lands and come and sit in front of you.

The reason that Open training is more difficult than Novice for many people is that Open exercises must be broken down into a longer series of steps so that the dog learns the individual parts of the exercises, and then the steps have to be put together so that the dog learns to perform all of the steps on a single command. Again, your foundation work is extremely important. If you've taught your dog the basics of learning, teaching the more complicated exercises merely becomes a series of teaching individual steps.

A CD title — big deal? (Cont..)

In Utility, the dog must perform even more difficult tasks with very little instruction from you. In 'scent discrimination' the dog must, on your single command leave your side, go out approximately three metres, find the article that has your scent on it, pick it up (without mouthing or playing with the other articles), and bring it back and sit in front of you. Utility exercises require a lot of concentration and attention on the dog's part; in most cases the dog has to make a choice between doing one thing or another — take the scented article from among the unscented articles, jump over the correct jump with twojumps in sight, etc.

Everyone who owns a dog should obedience train their dog, at least to the Novice level. Most of us want to take our dog for a walk without being dragged down the street. We should be able to take our dog to the vet and get him to stand still while having his ears examined or getting his annual shots. We should be able to have our dog sit still in front of the Christmas tree while we take his picture. We should be able to have our dog lie down and not disturb us when we have company over:

If you have taught your dog the Novice exercises you should be able to put them into practical use. You have trained your dog to be a good canine citizen, one you can be proud of. There are very few of us who need our dogs to select an article for us that bears our scent from a plie of unscented ones! Unless we have laryngitis or want our dogs to be in 'show biz', most of us can get by with a dog who doesn't know hand signals:

Handlers who go beyond the Novice level with their dogs do so for a variety of reasons. They may simply enjoy the sport of obedience and have made training their hobby. They may thrive on the competition and take advantage of the opportunity to continue to enter trials. Some enjoy the challenge of teaching the dogs more complicated exercises which may be a little out of the ordinary. Some seek recognition for their accomplishments.

If you have a happy working Companion bog you have proven to yourself and the world that you have achieved control over your pet through training with kindness and common sense, so be proud of yourself and your dog. If you have the time and the desire, go for the Excellent and the Utility. You will definitely benefit from the experience and so will your dog.

Remember, if you tell someone that your dog has earned a CD and they say "Big deal!", just say, "You're darn right it is!"

THE BEARDED COLLIE

HISTORY

Like many working breeds, the **Bearded Collie** has evolved over hundreds of years to perform specialised tasks in the service of humans. For the Bearded Collie this evolution continued to be based on their performance as working sheep and cattle dogs until 1949 when a Mrs. Willison searched for and found good examples of the **Bearded Collie** of Scotland and bred the first litter which forms the foundation of the pedigree of all purebred **Bearded Collies** today.

It is possible that the very early origins of the Bearded Collie may be found in the Polish Lowland Sheepdog. This connection is not documented and for centuries the Beardie was bred by the sheepfarmers of Scotland for their agility, stamina, hardiness and sheepherding instinct with no concern for recording their history as long as they were good working dogs. Their thick shaggy coat kept them warm and dry in the harsh winters, while their lithe but strong build enabled them to work easily on the rugged mountain areas of the Scotlish Highlands, using a certain independent style to seek out lost and stray sheep on the craggy hills. While herding they use a distinctive circling technique, barking at the stock to intimidate them into moving along. Some times they were used as drovers dogs with sheep and cattle, taking their charges to market. As you would expect they were also companions for the farmers and it is easy to imagine them sharing the fireside at the end of a hard cold days work.

GLAMOUR

Let's start with the Beardies' most obvious attribute first, the beautiful coat. Most people ask whether the coat takes a lot of work to keep it looking glamourous. The answer to this question is both yes and no. Compared with a smooth coated dog a Beardie does need consistent and frequent grooming, but unlike some long coated breeds a thorough brush and comb through once a week will keep an adult Beardie in pretty good style. However, this does mean once a week, not once a month. Bathing, is a matter of personal preference, brushing removes most dirt and dust from the coat but some people like to bath their dogs and this does not harm the coat even on a weekly basis. Another important aspect to coat care is ensuring your Beardie does not have a flea problem. Naturally fleas cause dogs to scratch and this very quickly spoils the appearance of a Beardies' coat and causes tangles which need to be brushed out. It is therefore, essential for a very strict flea control program to be maintained. This is probably the most important secret to keeping a Beardie looking good.

Of course, if a Bearded Collie is kept as a show dog, a lot of care and attention goes into preparation and grooming for the show ring. But basically the rules are the same, keep your dog flea-free, groom every single week, keep him/her happy and in good health and your Beardie will bloom.

TEMPERAMENT

Initially it was probably the beautiful appearance of the Bearded Collie that attracted you, but once you have met one you will be won over completely. As a breed they are generally happy, lively, energetic, affectionate family dogs. Visit a Beardie at home and you may well find them curled up on the couch or helping out in the kitchen. They love to be where the action is and are easily adaptable to almost any situation. Most of all Beardies love company, and will not be happy locked outside and ignored for weeks. Unless your dog is to be a member of your family, the Bearded Collie is probably not the dog for you.

THE BEARDED COLLIE (Cont.2)

Temperament Cont,.

Some **Beardies** can be easily excited, while others are extremely placid. Typically the breed is very affectionate, and expects a lot of loving attention. There are always some exceptions, but do not expect a **Bearded Collie** to be much of a guard dog, they may bark at the door bell but will probably welcome burglars like your best friends.

Beardies are very sensitive dogs, they will not respond well to harsh treatment, Like sensitive children they need to be understood to be disciplined effectively. Hitting and yelling will achieve nothing with a Beardie, they will simply keep away from you until you come to your senses. When you are calm, firm and persistent you will find they quickly respond to training. At the same time you will find Beardies have a very strong will and soon take advantage of you unless you set the rules clearly. Some are very slow to come to maturity and continue with puppyish behaviour well past one year of age. Most Beardie owners find this part of the charm of the breed but it can be exasperating at times.

Many Bearded Collies are competing successfully in obedience competition, showing the combination of beauty and brains Beardie owners are proud of. This is an enjoyable option for owners that don't necessarily want to show their dogs but would like to be involved with a dog "hobby". Beardies have a unique style in "Obedience" and the rough handling and bullying methods of training used for German Shepherds for example will not suit a Bearded Collie. It takes committment and persistence but is a lot of fun for both owner and dog.

HEAL/TH

Bearded Collies, as a breed, appear to be free from any major problems caused by inherited diseases. They are a "natural" unexaggerated breed which probably accounts for their robust health and longevity. Many Beardies live well into their teens and maintain excellent health.

AGGRESSIVE BEHAVIOUR IN DOGS

Aggressive behaviour accounts for much of the problems we experience with dogs. Many people think of aggession as a sinister disease, when in fact much of it is a normal way to act in the canine code of ethics.

Aggression Within a Group of Dogs

The dog has assumed many of the aspects of domestication, however there remains a strong "wild" instinct as well. In the wild the most dominant dog wins the first choice of food, mate or whatever else is going. After establishing his credentials as "Top Dog", threats of aggression or play fights are sufficient to maintain his position. When a newer, younger dog comes along then the two dogs must determine which is the "Top Dog". This way in the wild only the strongest and fittest survive. For comparison, we select a dog as a breeding prospect because it has good colour, wins shows etc.

With one dog you have little trouble in your home in regards to aggression, however when you increase the number of dogs, problems can occur. This often manifests itself at feed time. Therefore, you should separate the dogs when feeding or feed them less appetising food. They are less likely to fight over a bowl of dry food, than a chunk of juicy meat.

Aggression Towards Humans

With any large breed, it is essential to establish your position of dominance over your dog. Owners of males take special note of this. From an early age you **must** be the "**Top Dog**". Many problems with aggression towards owners occurs when a dog thinks he is dominant or if there is a doubt as to who is dominant. One step towards establishing dominance is simply to pick the pup up when he starts misbehaving, just like his mother would do.

Breeding and Aggression

Breeding programs can strongly influence the temperament. Fashionable and popular breeds are being bred simply for good looks, or to satisfy a demand, with the breeder knowing he can sell a whole litter and make some money out of it. As a result of this, dogs with suspect temperament are being bred with, which in turn is producing dogs with a completely different nature to that which attracted people to the breed originally.

Prospective owners and breeders must begin to demard excellence in temperament as well as looks if this problem is to be stopped.

With your dogs, try to avoid play fights. Not only can these get out of hand, but those sharp puppy teeth can give very painful nips. Discourage immediately and firmly any characteristics you do not want to develop, such as aggression towards other dogs. Once an aggression problem has been established there are several avenues of treatment. A dog will always show aggression for a reason. Mistrust of people can be important, take your puppy for walks in shopping centres or busy streets so that he becomes used to these strange two legged creatures. Where possible let people pat your puppy, your relaxed and confident nature with people will give the pup confidence.

Can Aggression Be Cured

Training - Some aggressive dogs can be trained out of their problem. This is especially true if the dog has been allowed to become the "Top Dog", it may well be time to instruct the dog who really is the "Top Dog". You must be prepared to spend a considerable amount of time and effort, as results don't come over night. In some cases "some considerable amounts of force need to be applied". Normal obedience training is not what is required, somestimes radical steps need to be taken. Remember if you can't overcome the aggression then the outcome to both dog and owner may be much more painful than a bit of firm correction now.

Drugs - tranquillisers have a temporary effect only. Tranquillisers can be used only for short term problems.

Cont....

AGGRESSIVE BEHAVIOUR IN DOGS(Cont...2/)

Hormones - The male hormone testosterone stimulates aggression. Removal of the source by castration is very effective in many cases for reducing aggression in males. It tends to be more effective when the dog is young. Some hormones can chemically castrate the dog but once the drug is stopped the behaviour returns.

Euthanasia - There is no guaranteed treatment to stop aggression and harmful behaviour. The problem is complicated and while some dogs may be completely controlled by treatment others will never be completely trustworthy. Where there is a danger to the family (not only yours), especially where children are concerned, you must consider having the dog put to sleep. Don't let your decision be made from the heart, you must use logic and sound reason, sometimes it is the only real solution.
