

THE MANCHESTER TERRIER

Originally bred as a ratting dog the Manchester Terrier is rarely worked and more often found as the ideal family pet. They are fiercely loyal to their owners and family and, therefore, make an ideal guard dog. Often called "the little dog with the big bark" they are easy to live with in the house. I have never yet heard of a stranger capable of slipping unnoticed past a Manchester, but for a dog which has a boisterous nature they are without a doubt a child's dream companion as well as an adults. Many mothers will tell you that if the children and dog give them the slip they will always find them together, and if either are asleep more often than not they are curled up together! A Manchester being intelligent and obedient, make themselves a member of the family and demand they be treated as one.

What should one look for in a Manchester? In general appearance the dog shall becompact in appearance with good bone and free from any resemblance to the Whippet. This is most important as many people mistake the tuck up in the loin in the breed standard to the tuck up which is accompanied with the roach back of the Whippet.

Temperament is always discerning. However, Manchesters mix with other breeds extremely well and normally end up the boss.

The origins of the Manchester are believed to be ancient and was originally known as the Black and Tan Terrier. Various theories have been put forward as to the original breeds used in the making of the Manchester. None have been substantiated except that it is known that the Old English White Terrier, the rough coated Black and Tan Terrier with a dash of some smaller breed might well have been the breeds ancestry.

The breed has been known to be mentioned however, slightly in books as early as the fifteenth century. The first stud book listed them as Black and Tan Terriers (excepting toys) in 1859 - 1874.

The name Manchester was taken when the breed divided into two sizes. The larger was given the name Manchester perhaps as a compliment to the place where the best ones were thought to have been bred. Though many people believe that the Manchester was originally bred in the Manchester-Liverpool area. Liverpool however, seems to have been left out when it came to giving the dog a name.

Manchesters were a popular breed in England until the late 1800's when the cropping of ears was abolished by Parliament in 1898. Cropping was originally applied to the breed to prevent ears from being bitten by the rats when terriers were competing in the pit. But like all things that begin with good reason, it ended up fashion. It is thought that the Manchester fell from favour as people no longer liked their looks with uncropped ears.

Many people believe the Manchester to be a Miniature Dobermann. In fact it was Herr Dobermann who used the Manchester to introduce the colour points into his breed as well as a bit of tenacity.

THE GREAT DANE

HISTORY

Unbroken links in a chain from the days of the early Romans, the Assyrian huntsmen of 500BC - maybe even earlier - through to the present day is a daunting thought, yet history shows us many examples of the Great Dane's ancestors. A Greek coin from Panamus dating from the fifth century BC is a recognised early "German Dogge" (Great Dane). Thought to be one of the earliest of the European breeds, it is most certainly agreed by historians to have been known by more names over the centuries than any other breed.

The early hunting dogs were known as Bullenbeissers or Boar-hounds. Around the late 1500's the Royal Courts of Germany bred these hounds in great numbers (the Duke Henry of Braunschweig appeared at the 1592 Oberwaser Hunt with a pack of some 600 male dogs). The mind boggles!

PRIZED POSSESIONS - The largest and best of these hounds were known as Kammerhundes. "Chamber Dogs'. They were much prized possessions. No kennels for this elite group; they lived within the palaces guarding the princesses and the Court and were adorned with gilded, bejewelled collars. The second best were known as Leibhunde, "Life Dogs". They were distinguished from the pack by the wearing of silver, velvet padded collars. The working dogs, the hunters were certainly not neglected, having special kennels and servants whose sole duty was to care for and feed them.

Through to the 1800's the names given these dogs changed often. Ulmer Doggen, Tiger Dogge, Saupacker, Hatzruden, Danish Doggen, Grand danois, German Mastiff. All these came and went until the name Deutsche Dogge became official in 1880 and the breed was adopted as the national dog of Germany. The name remains the same to this day in that country.

At about this time the wealthy German industrialists and businessman took up the challenge to develop and promote worldwide interest in their new national canine. This they did very successfully and the breed became known the world over as the 'Apollo of the Breeds'.

These dedicated men in the 1870-80 period, looking to improve the breed even further, arranged a number of shows where they could compare their stock and exchange ideas on future breeding programs. The north German breeder Herr Messter had tremendous success and at the Berlin show of 1880 exhibited 32 dogs. In 1881-83-84 he took his team to London and in 1887 to the St Petersburg show in Russia where he exhibited 22 animals. Considering the huge distances to be traversed, the arrangements for staff to care for such large numbers, the logistics to be met and dealt with in arranging the feeding, bedding and transportation of such an operation, not to mention the cost, the undertaking must have been enormous. One wonders at the determination and dedication of these men.

The breed flourished in spite of the very high morbidity rate caused by diseases such as distemper. The early 1900s became known as the Golden Years. Germany was the undisputed leader in the world for both quality and quantity but gradually many of the top bloodlines found their way to England and to America, making these three nations the best places in the world from which to obtain stock.

THE GREAT DANE (Cont..)

One of the most influential bloodlines of the day was vd Saalburg owned by Herr Karl Farber who sent to America Ch Efta vd Saalburg This bitch won BOG at the 1929 Madison Square Garden show (the Crufts of America). Her influence can still be seen to this day. In 1969 Ch Honey Amber von Overcup, who carried 19 direct lines to Efta, won the same award at Westminster.

GENERAL

There are a few misconceptions about the Great Dane, and Dane owners get them quite frequently! One of these is "he must cost you a fortune to feed". Although they are a very large dog, they do not have an enormous stomach or appetite. The individuals may vary, however he would cost little more than - say a Dobermann, German Shepherd or Labrador.

Huge meals will do him more harm than good when he is growing. The idea that one should feed the likes of a side of lamb is totally ludicrous. As for eating two postmen a day well we've had no complaints from Australia Post yet!

"Great Danes are hard to train".... These dogs are very intelligent, and are not any harder to train than most. They are sometimes slower to respond, but this is due to their lay back nature. The fact that they are very large dogs means that their training is of prime importance. Quite often dogs are returned to breeders because they are "too big, boisterous and unruly". It is the owners responsibility to ensure that their dog is socially acceptable and well mannered. A Dane is too big a dog to be running amok. A puppies training should start as soon as you get him home. It's never too early to start! If you want your Great Dane to be well mannered and a good example of his breed, they you must contribute to this end. Obedient dogs don't just happen.

Raising a Dane puppy is not a hit and miss affair. He has a lot of growing to do. He will have large bones that can be damaged in the wrong environment, i.e. slippery floors, flights of steps etc., this is a time when he must be carefully reared if he is to achieve adulthood in good health. The breeder should help with his dietary needs, because these puppies need calcium and vitamins in varying amounts,

There are five colours in the Great Dane breed standard, these being Fawn (beige colour) Brindle (Fawn coat with black striping) Black (... is black) Blue (from silver colour to deep slate) Harlequin (white coat colour with irregular torn black (or blue) patches). All these colours are acceptable in the show ring.

The Great Dane, whilst the loyal protector of you and your family, is not known for his ferocity or viciousness. The mere look of one is quite often enough to deter.


Bad breeding or ill treatment may produce a savage Dane, however, this is the exception, not the rule.

If you are prepared to rear and care for a Dane in a way that will give you a big beautiful companion and protector, ensure that he has suitable space in which to dwell, adequate exercise to keep him fit and healthy, a good fence to keep him from wandering and the hazards he could meet with, and the devotion to him that he will most surely lavish upon you - then perhaps you are ready to include a Great Dane, the Apollo of Dogs in your life.


