





THE NORWEGIAN ELKHOUND - NATIONAL DOG OF NORW AY

History of the Breed

The Norwegian Elkhound has existed in Scandinavia for centuries. Well preserved bodies of the breed have been found throughout the country, some estimated to be 5000 years old.

They were buried with Viking leaders along with other possessions. Today in his native country of Norway, the Elkhound is used to hunt Elk (Moose).

Characteristics

The Elkhound is a Nordic Spitz breed of dog of medium size. He is compact, square, strong, loyal, friendly and intelligent. He has a double coat of grey, white and black shades.

As a house dog the breed has the advantage of complete lack of doggy smell even when the coat is wet.

Care and Grooming

Arctic dogs amongst which the Elkhound is included, need occasional grooming with a strong brush or comb. He sheds his coat twice a year.

Exercise

The Elkhound loves exercise and requires a regular amount but may be kept quite happily in a normal size suburban back yard.


Training

A very intelligent breed who will readily learn anything he can see a purpose for particularly if it involves some sort of work. However, he dislikes learning and performing tricks. It is a good idea if you can take your puppy to an Obedience Club to socialize him with people and other dogs.

Common Ailments

None, as this dog was bred to have a very hardy physique.



THE AFGHAN HOUND/2

On the other hand, the Afghan if started early in life is generally, without any complicated training, and normally without the use of the "choke" collar so beloved in many breeds, a pleasure to walk on his lead, and there are very few breeds of his size in which one could out walk four adults, and this is quite common in many Afghan kennels, admitted the sight of a cat in such cases does tend to complicate matters, but we survive.

Another point in favour of the Afghan as an indoor town dog is his complete absence of "doggy" smell, and providing he is kept well groomed, very few hairs are obvious in the Afghan household. Any smell at all is extremely pleasant, in some cases quite pronounced, leading to discussion in the past in the canine periodicals about "perfumed" Afghans.

Although not a quarrelsome dog, in fact few dogs are better mixers and certainly none is better with children or small dogs, the Afghan is possessed of great courage, said to be the only dog willing to tackle the leopard. Indeed, as mentioned elsewhere in this book, Khan of Ghazni was noted for having killed three in his native country before being imported here.

(This information has been taken from a most informative booklet compiled by the Afghan Hound Club of Victoria Inc. The history is one of the most interesting and well researched I have come across since doing these breed articles. This can be run at a latter date.)

"THE AFGHAN HOUND

Most people have an immediate response to the Afghan, repulsive or fascinating, a thing of beauty or a monstrosity, there are no half measures which is as it should be, love him or leave him.

As with his appearance the above applies equally to the Afghan's character. If you desire a servile creature, obedient to your every whim then the Afghan is not for you, but, if you are prepared to treat him as an equal, willing to let him display his keen sense of humour, a lovable clown one minute, an elegant aristocrat the next, then the Afghan can be a fascinating companion.

The Afghan is most certainly not a breed to give unlimited freedom, his great sense of independence makes it difficult for him to understand that he must respond immediately to a recall to heel.

All the "sit, stay" etc. instructions so beloved of the Canine Obedience Schools are lost on our eastern friend and any attempt at obedience normally ends in the owner feeling foolish and the session ending up in a friendly truce.

The reason for the Afghan's independence of character is not hard to find when one considers the life of the breed in its native country, where, apparently, all restrictions were unknowns. All his guarding, shepherding and most of his hunting was carried out with the minimum of interference from his owner. Travellers returning from abroad have written of the Hounds of Kabul, maintaining that they kept their own rota system of patrolling the ancient wall of the city working in pairs at regular intervals, entirely without human guidance.

Dogs reared for many generations in this manner know instinctively what to do and what not to do, to chase domestic livestock in their case would just not occur to them and be below their dignity.

For the majority of Afghan's kept under domestic conditions the sight of livestock, particularly frightened livestock running at their approach, the temptation is too great, the old instincts re turn and the dog is out of control, and whether or not the dog intends to harm them the farmer with his shot gun is not prepared to find out.

A dog living in town as one of the family has a far more interesting life with regular exercise being necessary the majority of country people on the other hand are not used to walking dogs on a lead and keeping them in the living rooms, and being kept outside in a pen however hygenic it may be, is a very boring existence for a breed with such intelligence.

I know quite well that what I have written will be condemned by the few "obedience" enthusiasts in our breed and I do admit that there are exceptions. I have owned **Afghans** that would walk along a 'jsy street off the lead but they are certainly exceptions to the general rule.

Many Afghans respond at first to training but unless one is prepared to keep him very subdued and lose the charm of his independence of character, sooner or later, in common with the majority of the hound breed, the Afghan decides that pleasing himself is much mor fun.

ENCOURAGING ENJOYMENT ACCORDING TO THE RULES (Cont.)

When judging emphasises technical correctness and when enjoyment and willingness count for little or nothing, trial competitors are naturally inclined to follow suit.

"Enjoyment and willingness is best measured by evaluating not just the technical correctness of the exercises but also the quality of the performance as a whole."

Of course, technical correctness must be evaluated, but not to the exclusion of everything else. What value is there in a technical perfection if there is no joy in the performance?

It could be argued that evaluating the quality of the whole performance is too difficult. This is simply not true. some time a dog trainer, and every trainer can sense when a dog is Every judge was at enjoying its work. Even if this eludes them, they can at least detect the opposite for a dog that dislikes its work is painfully ob-

A dog should give the impression of cheerfully doing exactly what the handler requires. Such a dog does not need exaggerated signals, excessively loud or threatening commands and other additional aids. Indeed the whole performance should proceed without any apparent effort from the handler to coerce the dog's co-operation.

The quality and thus the final score of any trial performance should reflect both the technical correctness of the movements and the dog's enjoyment and willingness to work.

There is no doubt that unless we all strive to observe the spirit of part 9A of the rules, trial dogs will get technically better and better whilst the total quality of dog training generally and trial performances specifically, will decline to a highly undesirable lev-

The Book of "Rules for the Conduct of Obedience Tests" is an excellent guide to those who participate in the sport.

It does however, have one serious deficiency. Of the 48 pages devoted to the subject, there is only one sentence to indicate precisely that this is an activity involving animals capable of enjoying their lives and prepared to willingly co-operate with their human partners.

The sole reference to this matter is contained in part 9A Guide to Judges which states: "Enjoyment and willingness to work is to be desired; fear and dislike of work shall be penalised."

I can appreciate the problems of defining objectively, such highly subjective matters. To correct the omission and in the absence of any other written guide, I shall take the liberty of providing my own thought for judges and competitors to consider.

"Enjoyment and willingness to work are of the greatest significance, for without these features the dog becomes little more than a machine and the much vaunted relationship between human and dog becomes irrelevant.'

If in the training and judging of obedience dogs we concern ourselves only with technical correctness, machine-like or robotic performances will inevitably result. Taken to an extreme, we might as well exclude dogs from the sport altogether and use mechanical devices instead! Foolish as this suggestion may seem, the technology exists to produce a Digitally Operated Gismo (DOG).

The vast majority of competitors and judges do, however, enjoy a highly valued relationship with their dogs. Loyalty, devotion and desire to please are proudly extolled. Yet at the highest level of dog-person interaction (as represented by obedience trials), we choose to largely ignore these qualities in favour of technicalities.

"A dog's enjoyment and willingness to work determines the image of obedience training and trialling."

An interested observer generally cannot distinguish between a minor or substantial error, an average or excellent performance. Their opinion of the sport is based entirely on what they see as a whole.

The show handler who watches a dog from which all enthusiasm has been removed cannot be blamed for thinking that intensive training should be avoided.


Perhaps this is the basis of the erroneous myth that showing and obedience cannot be combined.

Confident, joyful dogs displaying enjoyment and willingness, are our best advertisements.

"Obedience judges are the custodians of the art of dog training and should heavily penalise those performances in which the desire enjoyment and willingness to work is not evident."

Whilst the leading trainers set the trends in techniques and attitudes, they are influenced by what judges will or will not accept and by what style of work produces the highest scores.



AS ALL TRIALLERS (REGISTERED AND ASSOCIATE) ARE ELIGIBLE TO COMPETE FOR THE TOP TRIALLING DOG OF THE YEAR, THE ONUS IS ON YOU TO HAND IN YOUR RESULTS. ALL YOUR SCORES ARE AVERAGED AND FIVE POINTS IS THEN ADDED FOR EACH TRIAL ATTENDED. RECORD SHEETS CAN BE OBTAINED
