

Dear Editor,

The other night, having nothing better to do, I was thinking back over the last few years and the following doggerel is the result:-

When "Wellington" was six months old I bought a lead and chain. I joined a Dog Obedience Club, which taught me how to 'train', And it was:-

"Left turn, right turn, right about turn and halt If 'Fido' doesn't do it, it isn't 'Fido's' fault.
You haven't done your homework - ten minutes every day
Now drop your dog and sit your dog and tell your dog to stay."

We practised hard and often, I rewarded him with praise. We must have done a thousand 'sits' and several hundred 'stays'. But it was:"Left turn, right turn, and let your lead go loose."

"Left turn, right turn, and let your lead go loose."

If you don't correct him properly, it isn't any use."

It was "Forward slow and drop him", it was "sit him, forward fast."

Then, after many weary weeks, he was off the lead at last.

We entered an obedience trial, a hopeful pair were we - But we needed several entries to get "Wellington's" C.D. Then it was:-

"Left turn, right turn, forward, halt and throw - Send him, take it, finish - he's better than you know!"

It was "leave him, call him, drop him, call again and praise.

Send him over, but remember, it's the tone of voice that pays."

Our C.D.X. behind us, we worked for our U.D. His 'scent discrimination' was a pretty sight to see! There it was:"Left turn, right turn, and signals only please.
He must learn to do a 'seek back' up the hill and in the

trees.'
It was "send him to the solid jump, now back and do the bar.
He'll have to watch your signals or he won't go very far!"


And now, each Sunday morning, without fail in cold or heat I am teaching new arrivals and the cycle is complete Because it is:"Left turn, right turn, right about turn and halt If 'Fido' doesn't do it, it isn't 'Fido's' fault.
You haven't done your homework - ten minutes every day Now drop your dog and sit your dog and tell your dog to stay."

PUT DOG'S ON EQUAL FOOTING by Dr. David Hill

A Werribee couple with a large dog are worried about potential troubles when their new baby arrives. Families with dogs that are well trained will have few problems.

Untrained dogs, on the other hand, are going to be difficult to handle and keep happy alongside an infant.

It's best to ensure your dog has been through conventional obedience training exercises. This establishes owners as the one in charge.

Big dogs need to understand that boisterous activity belongs outdoors. They will then soon realise that the home is a place of calm, sedentary behaviour. Ideally the dog should be trained to drop and stay in the same spot for at least half an hour.

This is long enough for it to placidly watch a baby being fed, bathed or changed.

When the baby comes home nothing good should happen in the dog's life unless the baby is involved as well.

Whenever the dog is walked, fed or patted the baby should be there, either being carried or in the stroller.

The worst thing to do is to shut the dog outside when dealing with the baby and to shut the baby in the nursery when attending to the dog.

This tells the dog that the baby is competition and life would be better if there was no baby.

I am a firm believer that young dogs and young people are good for each other.

No dog, regardless of how well trained it is, should be left unattended with a tiny baby on the floor.

To do so is asking the dog to display more responsibility and common sense than the child's parents have just done.

DOG INTUITION SAVES OWNER by Simon Wright (London) The Daily Telegraph
Ltd London, 1996

"An English dog owner is grateful that her pet has a life-saving "sixth sense".

Tony Brown-Griffin is an epileptic and Rupert, her three-year-old Collie, can predict the onset of a fit and communicate the danger up to 40 minutes before the illness strikes.

"Without Rupert, I would not have the time and would not know that a fit was approaching until it was too late," Mrs Brown-Griffin, 26, of Tunbridge Wells, said.

"He enables me to seek a safe place and prepared for a fit.

The medical experts hate it being attributed to a sixth sense but Rupert hasn't failed me yet."

British Epilepsy Association researchers have identified a unique smell present in sufferers during a fit. They believe this odour and the detection of electrical impulses from Mrs Brown-Griffin's brain may be what alert the dog to an impending seizure.

Support Dogs, a charity based in the city of Sheffield has helped develop Rupert's ability. It specialises in training dogs belonging to the disabled.

Training manager Val Strong said she was hopeful the skill could be duplicated in other dogs.

"Knowing that barked warnings result in a reward - a biscuit or a cuddle - the dog becomes acutely sensitive to the signs and symptoms exhibited by the sufferer immediately prior to the seizure," she said.

Mrs Brown-Griffin said Rupert went with her everywhere.

"I've learned to distinguish between his epileptic barking and what is simply playtful," she said.

"He has undoubtedly saved my life on numerous occasions." "

OWNER'S KITCHEN DUTIES -

FANG CAKE:

A variation on the classical pancake, this recipe contains rice.

Slightly beat the eggs, sift in flour, then add the rice and milk. Stir well before pouring into a well oiled frying pan. Cook gently, and keep turning sections of the pancake until it is light brown in colour. Makes a good breakfast, but can be served as evening meal with your own fillings, i.e. chopped meat either raw or cooked; chicken, grated carrot and a small amount of grated cheese.

POODLE PIZZA

1 piece stewing steak (chopped)
3/4 cup rolled oats
2 rashers bacon

1 egg water

Slightly moisten rolled oats in a little water. Line an ovenproof dish with oats, then cover with beaten egg. Add meat and finally criss-cross with the bacon, which needs to be cut to size. Bake in a moderate oven for 30 minutes. Cool, and serve. Depending on the size of the piece of steak (and your dog!) this dish could suffice for two meals.
