EFFECTS OF DESEXING MALE DOGS

Behaviour Benefits

Castrated dogs are less likely to roam (90% stop), mount people (60% stop), fight other male dogs (60% stop) or urinate within the property (50% stop). It might take 6 months for these effects to be shown.

The male hormone testosterone, which is produced in the testicles, slightly increases the chances of aggression in general. The loss of that hormone sometimes reduces aggressivity.

Castration does not always stop the sex drive or ability to copulate. Dogs have been known to continue sex activities for at least 2 years after the operation. His brain was exposed to his own testosterone before he was born and his adult behaviour is not necessarily dependent on it.

Some people say that their dogs have generally quietened down after the operation and others have said there has been no change. There has been no survey to see if dogs are less activated after castration. Testosterone is an activating hormone and its lose could account for the quietening effect in some dogs.

There is no evidence that male dogs become lazy, disobedient or less inclined to work after castration. There is no change to the basic temperament of a dog after castration, although he may be generally slightly less activated. As bitches show, it is not necessary to have testicles for a dog to be active, protective, working and playful with plenty of spirit.

The behavioural effects of castration vary between individuals. This is because there are so many factors of breeding, experience and present environment that differ between individuals.

Health Benefits

A castrated dog cannot have a tumour in the testicles and is less likely to have prostate problems, tumours around the anus or a perineal hernia. There is also less chance of the dog getting injured whilst roaming or fighting another un-castrated male and of having a continuous discharge from his prepuce.

Disadvantages

The disadvantages of castration are that the dog cannot be used for breeding, he will not develop the secondary sexual musculo-skeletal characteristics if castrated before puberty and he has an increased tendency to put on weight. Any tendency to fatness can easily be controlled by diet.

Chemical Castration

It is possible to chemically castrate some dogs by using hormones. There are tablets and injections of hormones, which may reduce the chances of aggression for limited periods. The hormones act

against the male hormone, which increases the chances of aggression. Side effects have been found in a minority of dogs. The evidence is conflicting about whether or not temporary chemical castration can predict the effects of surgical removal of the testicles. In chemical castration an extra hormone is added to the body, in surgical castration the source of testosterone is removed. Therefore, the effects may not be the same. I believe it wiser to assume that chemical castration will not predict the results of surgical castration.



SUMMARY OF MAJOR ANKC RULE CHANGES FOR OBEDIENCE AND TRACKING

A lot of changes relate to refining the wording of the rules and there are changes specifying deductions in some exercises, which were not actually specified before. There will be separate rulebooks for Tracking and Obedience. Titles, eg Australian Obedience Champion and Australian Tracking Champion will appear as a prefix in front of the dog's name. Australian Obedience Champion will be as it appears in the rulebook now, as proposed.

These Rules come into effect in 2000.

NB: New titles will come into force at this stage. Dogs who are part way through the old OC will not be able to continue using passed towards that title. They will have to work towards one or both of the new titles.

Corridors between rings - Note that it is desirable to have corridors between Obedience rings, especially UD rings, if space permits.

Measurement of dog's height - To nearest 10 mm

Re barking - Now "barks or vocalises"

Protective clothing - May be put on or removed from the dog in the interval between the individual and the group exercises depending on prevailing weather conditions at the discretion of the Judge.

Entry numbers - Current words replaced with "only one number to be visible whilst in the ring".

Withdrawal of a dog - A dog may be withdrawn before or during judging with the consent of the Judge, but must not take any further part in the class.

Fouling the ring - Extended to "while under control of the Judge".

Use of rings - Dogs can't use Trial rings, except while trialing or with permission of the affiliate.

Change of speed (pace) - Dogs must show three distinct speeds.

Alternative finish - As now, current and the "flip" finish. Sometimes called the European finish.

Return to phrase commands - Instead of one-word commands from the Judge.

About turns - Handlers may do Pivot or U-turns as they see fit

Order of exercises - All exercises to be performed in the order printed in the rulebook

Judge's commands - When Judge asks, "are you ready" the handler must clearly acknowledge the Judge's request.

Directed Jumping - Handlers not permitted to send or place their dogs in the box until sent by Judge. If they dog must be penalised under misbehaviour

Dog must preferably sit in prescribed area with out further command. If it has to be told to sit, it will be a substantial deduction. Prescribed area should be white in colour and be 25 mm to 50 mm high and 25 mm to 50 mm wide.

Calculation of jump – High jump maximum 700 mm (was 900 mm). Distance between first and last hurdle (of broad jump) must be twice the height of the dog at the withers. Maximum distance to be 1400 mm (was 1800 mm).

Use of Lead - Lead allowed to be held in either hand

Bar Jump - Two uprights, 1200 mm high. Bar approximately 35 mm in diameter. Bar to be painted black and white alternating sections of about 100 mm and be 2 m in length (to make the bar easier to see).

Number of Broad Jumps - The formula in the book has to be used. 2 boards for dogs jumping up to and including 700 mm; 3 boards for dogs jumping over 700 mm and up to and including 1200 mm; 4 boards for dogs jumping more than 1200 mm.

Scent Discrimination - Handler will supply full set of articles. Metal articles may vary in diameter between 15 and 25 mm. Other articles remain the same.

Seek Back and Scent Discrimination - Judge or Steward must not touch article/s.

Signal Exercise – Judge to order "normal pace" prior to ordering the individual "stand". Move forward approximately 5 metres (was at least 5 metres).

Food Refusal - Food to be kept in sealed containers on Judges table. To be offered only once in each of the 3 positions. If any word other than "stay" is used, deduction is zero.

Directed Retrieve - All gloves to be equally and clearly visible, handler may look over shoulder to see where the gloves are placed before turning to face articles. Gloves to be dropped not placed. Each glove to be used approximately the same number of times.

Changes to ANKC Tracking Rules

As in Obedience there are some "tidying up" changes, which won't affect handlers, I have not included them.

Test 6 Tracking Champion Test – (to be reviewed in 3 years, if required). Track 6 is similar to current Test 5 in most aspects.

Unknown Tracklayer
Start to be between 2 flags, 20 meters apart.
Handler will be given tracklayer's article in clean bag 20 meters from the start.
Length of track – 1100 meters.
Number of turns – 6 (2 to be acute).

Articles 3 – (2 to be found).

First turn - minimum 100 meters from start.

Two diversion tracks to be laid by 1 or 2 unknown people (see Test 5).

Time lapse – 90 to 180 minutes.

Entry Requirement - Obedience requirement deleted. Tracking completely separate from Obedience. Tracking Qualification test is the entry requirement. Thirty day rule requirements deleted.

Handlers - Handler may not carry food, visible or audible aids or training aids on the track. Water only may be offered to dog, with Judges permission.

Tracklayers – Unknown tracklayer definition changed from 12 to 6 months. Tracklayer need not remain at end of track but MUST be in position to be found. Articles to be place on the track, but not on a turn or less than 25 meters from a turn.

Tracks - Markers or dowels not to be left in the ground. No part of track may continuously follow a boundary. Minimum distance between any part of any 2 separate tracks must be 100 meters.

Administrative changes - Changes to ballot for order of tracks and to points system for Judges. Judges must supply a copy of the maps to the affiliate, to be forwarded to control.

Additional grade of pass - eg, Pass, Good, Very Good, Excellent.

DOG BREEDS FROM A TO Z


ANATOLIAN SHEPHERD DOG (Anatolian Karabash Dog)

Height - 27 - 31 in (68.5 - 79 cm) Weight - 85 - 1501b (39 - 69.5 kg).

Originally a working sheep dog, this powerful animal now usually serves as an excellent guard dog.

The Anatolian Shepherd Dog undoubtedly originated from the ancient Mastiff. Large working dogs have certainly been around central Asia for hundreds of years. In Roman times this dog was used as a hunter of large game and even as a gladiator. The Anatolian Shepherd Dog has emerged as perhaps the most successful, and certainly the most famous, of Turkey's working dogs.

The Anatolian Shepherd Dog is a large and sturdy working dog. Although it is quite muscular it



remains well proportioned and moves with a stylish grace. Muscular jaws complement the broad head. The well-set eyes look over a medium-length muzzle. This dog has a straight back and a well-defined waist. The mid-length tail has a slight upward curve.

This large and powerful dog is very confident and has a most determined character. Its alert manner and strong sense of territory make the Anatolian Shepherd Dog an excellent watchdog. Its large size and formidable presence acts as a real deterrent and means that this dog also makes a wonderful guard dog.

Generally the Anatolian Shepherd Dog gets along very well with other dogs, but it is important that it should be well socialised as a puppy. Its sheer size can provoke fear and aggression in other dogs. Wise owners will not allow their dog to run at others, even in play, until the dogs are better acquainted. Initially, owners of the Anatolian Shepherd Dog should be very assertive and continue until the dog clearly understands its position in the owner's family. Its large size makes this dog unsuitable for small children, but with firm handling the Anatolian Shepherd Dog can become a very loyal companion.

Given sufficient exercise, this former working dog will thrive. If allowed to become bored it may become snappy. The Anatolian Shepherd Dog has few common ailments but its ears should be checked regularly, particularly during hot weather.

AUSTRALIAN CATTLE DOG

Height - 18 - 20 in (46 - 51 cm) for the male and 17 - 19 in (43 - 48 cm) for the female Weight - about 33 - 51 lb (15 - 23 kg).

Also known as the Blue Heeler, Queensland Heeler, and the Australian Heeler, the Australian Cattle Dog was especially bred to move cattle over long distances in the rugged Australian Outback. The Australian Cattle Dog has been selectively bred for its bravery and to have a strong biting instinct. These characteristics were necessary for snapping at the legs of the cattle it was driving. The Australian Cattle Dog is now very popular as a companion animal. Australian bush cattle had rarely, or never, seen people and dogs, so the early Australian stockmen needed a really brave dog

to move their cattle. Also, it was necessary to drive these wild cattle over long distances in the extremely hot and dry conditions of the Australian Outback.

The Australian Cattle Dog was therefore custom-bred. A stockman called Timmins is credited with starting the breed by taking a tough breed of working dog called a Smithfield and crossing it with a Dingo. This dog, known as the Timmins Biter, was very useful in some ways but difficult to control and very vocal. The breed was improved for control, by crossing with Collies, but this overemphasised barking, so it was necessary to cross the breed again with Dingoes. To further modify behaviour, the breed was said to have then been crossed with the Dalmatian, and more recently the Australian Kelpie. This especially bred dog was originally called the Queensland Blue Heeler, then later renamed the Australian Cattle Dog.

The Australian Cattle Dog has a rugged and sturdy appearance with a symmetrical body. The head is wedge-shaped and can be very broad in some dogs. The brown, oval eyes are of medium size and are matched with upright, medium-sized ears. The body is muscular but proportionate with a straight back and legs. The coat is short, straight, and quite dense. It is coloured either blue or red and may have tan colouring and white speckled markings.

The Australian Cattle Dog is only a medium-sized dog but it behaves, as though it is very large. This breed is tough and very determined. Generally speaking, the Australian Cattle Dog are slow to excite, well balanced, and often very independent.

The Australian Cattle Dog makes an excellent watchdog as it has a strong sense of territory. This dog will readily bark at any potential territorial incursion from another dog, a person or even a teasing cat, so it should be encouraged to bark at the sounds and events that you consider important, such as burglars. From the beginning, you should reprimand your dog for barking when you are sure the disturbance is not important.



As the Australian Cattle Dog is only of medium size it is not generally used as a guard dog, as it has a limited deterrent value. However, in reality its strong sense of territory can make it a formidable guard dog.

Care must be taken to adequately socialise the Australian Cattle Dog with other dogs. Allowing it to freely mix with other puppies and older dogs dramatically reduces the potential for later problems. The characteristics of chasing and biting have been bred into this dog, so poorly socialised Australian Cattle Dogs that are fearful of other dogs will sometimes attack first.

In the majority of cases the Australian Cattle Dog gets along with people of all ages. However, these dogs are not for the faint-hearted. Both the bitch as well as the dog can be very dominant animals. If people are assertive towards their

Australian Cattle Dog from the start, they will get on really well.

As long as the Australian Cattle Dog are not allowed to regularly win all the games it plays with people, it can make an excellent family dog. Tug-of-war and chasing are games to be avoided. The dog's powerful jaws and excellent manoeuvrability mean it will usually win. Such play is similar to arm wrestling in people and is taken very seriously by the dog.

DOG ATTENTION IS FUNDAMENTAL TO ALL TRAINING By PETER KENNON

All good educators possess the ability to capture and maintain the attention of their pupils. As teachers (trainers) of dogs we would be well advised to follow their example

Dog attention is fundamental to all training. When we have it, everything is so much easier. Despite this, many of us launch into our lessons with inattentive dogs and wonder why we encounter problems. Our difficulties are not necessarily due to inexperience, poor methods or lack of effort but rather to our failure to teach our pupils to pay attention.

When I watch some of the better trainers working their dogs, this matter of dog attention becomes so obvious, it's not accidental that the animal's entire mental energy is focused on its handler, nor is it hard to explain why their performance is so pleasing.

There are of course some dogs, which are naturally attentive, although these treasures are relatively rare. Most of our canine mates must be taught to give their undivided attention and whilst I have often stated there is no magic in training, the

difference this can make is quite astounding.

I should note that dog attention on its own is not the sole reason for the superbly trained animals we occasionally see. Affection and trust are also essential elements. Attention can be gained by cruelty and fear but the result is in stark contrast to a happy, willingly obedient dog.

There are two levels of attention to aim for. The first is general attention and consists of creating an awareness in the animal of the need to maintain contact with its human partner. Even if out for relaxed, free exercise, I feel it is my responsibility to remain aware of my dog's movements. I expect the dog to reciprocate.

This is encouraged by a carefree game of hide and seek. When the dog is off in a world of its own, I hide behind the nearest obstacle. Eventually my companion realises it is alone and before it becomes unduly concerned or agitated, I reappear as though nothing had happened. Usually the dog's reaction is one of "Thank goodness I've found you, I thought you were lost." It doesn't take long for them to learn that keeping an eye on the boss is useful.

With more aloof, independent dogs, it may be necessary to remain concealed for a longer period, but never to the points where the animal is frantic with worry. We don't want the dog to think we are deliberately trying to avoid its company. The procedure should be as natural as possible and the dog should be gently praised for 'checking in' so that it's diligence is rewarded. Undue fuss is not necessary.

The second and maximum level of attention is

essential for intensive training. No dog can sustain this level indefinitely so we must be able to turn its attention on and off with verbal cues.

The words used for this purpose are a matter of personal preference. Having selected something appropriate ("watch" and "hey" are often used to gain attention) we need to teach its meaning.

Basically, the idea is for the dog, having received the turn-on cue, to understand it is time for work.

Hopefully, eye contact will have previously become a rewarding experience for both parties because we must have this form of communication for full attention.

With the dog at heel in the sit position, the verbal turn-on cue is issued and the dog encouraged to establish eye contact. The word may be enough to get attention but initially it will probably be necessary to physically raise the dog's head, either by tapping it between the ears or tilting its muzzle. Food can be usefully employed but remember that the objective is have the dog watching the handler (not the food).

In the early stages the dog should be positively reinforced as soon as it offers attention. It is then

immediately turned-off or released. Again, a special word should be chosen and reserved for release of attention – not used for normal praise. Terms such as "Free", "Away" or "Off" are suitable.

The turn-off cue signifies the end of work and can be given with considerable enthusiasm so that the dog clearly understands it is "free", can go "away" or is "off" duty.

With practise, we reach a point where the dog's attention can briefly be turned on and off as we require. This foundation is built upon by gradually extending the period of full attention and ensuring the dog will comply in each position, sit, stand and down. All this is done its stationary. There is no need to make the uson any harder than necessary.

Obviously we want the dog to remain attentive when mobile, so this is the next logical progression.

'Watch' can now be followed by "Heel" and the dog taught to keep looking up and watching the handler. A few paces are sufficient to start with, followed by a halt, sit, praise and release.

UNDERSTANDING

When the dog acknowledges the need to be

attentive, its understanding can be strengthened with simple manoeuvres.

The trainer should wait until the dog is distracted before asking for attention, then rapidly moving forwards, backwards or sideways. If the dog complies immediately, no correction will result. If it doesn't, if quickly discovers that inattention will incur some penalty. Approached in the right spirit, this becomes a game most dogs enjoy, particularly when they are allowed to win regularly.

Eventually the dog that has learnt to be attentive is difficult to distract. Success in all training is assured when the dog considers every distraction to be a stimulus for more attention to its trainer.

There are a couple of traps to avoid. Many dogs, especially smaller ones, find it easier to pay attention by sitting crooked so this should be anticipated and prevented. Others learn to lean against the handler so they are not caught unawares. This should also be discouraged.

It's an inescapable fact that dogs (and people) can't learn effectively until they pay attention to their teachers. Therefore it seems reasonable to conclude that training a dog to be attentive is not optional, it is absolutely essential.

CANINE TRIVIA

ne of the most famous psychic dogs of all time was a bitser named Chris from Rhode Island in the United States. By pawing out words – using one tap for A, two taps for B, and so on – Chris predicted the winning horse at a daily double, and then managed to convince a team of parapsychologists of his ability. He was only one day off predicting his own death in 1950, at the age of 10.

The average lifespan of a dog is still less than 3.5 years, according to the Animal Management Resource Extension programme in Western Australia. AMREX says between 40 and 50 percent of cats and dogs are put down because their behaviour is considered inappropriate, unmanageable or dangerous, often without any attempt to treat the problem.

Ever wondered how much you really spend on your dog's food bills each year? The RSPCA

estimates the basic costs, not including buying and desexing, are small dog, \$3,00 a day: medium dog, \$5.00 a day: large dog, \$7.00 a day. These costs include food, vaccination, worming, flea control, grooming, registration, collar, lead, bowls and a bed. The RSPCA says a good rule of thumb for the annual cost of food is your dog's weight in kilograms, multiplied by 30.

One of the most famous trademarks in the world is that of "Nipper" the Fox Terrier, listening to "his master's voice". It was painted by the dog's owner, Francis Barraud, in 1900. Unfortunately Nipper died before he became famous. His body was wrapped in a blanket and buried under a Mulberry tree in Kingston-upon-Thames. In 1960 his portrait was incorporated into the coat-of-arms of Sir Joseph Lockwood, chairman of the giant EMI group which by then owned His Master's Voice.





TEN COMMON SENSE RULES FOR DOG TRAINING by Kaylan Read

Reprinted from Off-lead magazine - September 1993

1. Make sure you have a happy attentive dog. Use the stimuli necessary to get the best attitude from your dog on that day.

- 2. Make a promise to yourself and your dog that you will not loose YOUR attitude. Take the extreme emotion out of training. Try to make it matter-of-fact and fair. Work on controlling any negative body language or harshness in your voice.
- 3. Prevention is always better than correction. This is especially true in the teaching phase. When the dog makes a mistake, put the dog back on leash, and help the dog be successful for several training sessions. If the dog was on leash, try again, this time get help in correcting your timing, not the dog.
- 4. Make sure your dog understands when he is working and when he is free. If you are unavoidably distracted during training make sure there is a clear release for the dog. Most dogs work best when given active, free time between the teaching of different exercises. Start with a fun, easy task after the break.
- 5. Punishment and fear are not teaching tools. Don't undo all the good creative training you've put in with one training session on a bad day. Don't get caught up in trying to permanently "fix' a problem in one day. Every performance is not a reflection of you as a trainer, or your dog's ability. Find one thing during an "off' session that you can reinforce positively or reward and quit.
- 6. If one training method is not working, do something different! It is unbelievable how people become pattern trained. We will sometimes stick with something for months without seeing any improvement. To hope that drilling and repetition will eventually get results is not realistic.
- 7. Introduce tough or new exercises early in the training session. Having a dog attempt a new or difficult task when he has given his best attention and energy earlier, means that your training session may end with a poor performance. Don't let confusion, negative reinforcement, or absence of reward be the last thing the dog remembers.
 - Always break an exercise down into separate tasks, then put it together, like a puzzle, when all the pieces are as good as they can be. Sometimes trainers add formal turns in heeling before attention and heel position are correct. Another example would be adding distance to the retrieve before a quick grabbing pick-up and a fast spin return are perfected up close. Don't expect a straight sit at the end of a recall until the recall is fast and consistent and the front is perfected up close and separately. Always perfect and proof drops before adding gradual distance or incorporating it in the recall.
- 9. When you think your dog is ready to show, try a test of three fun matches at different locations. If the dog's performance at each match met your expectations, you're probably ready. But you might be more pleased and the dog would suffer less stress, if you took more time to shape a higher level of performance in very unique and unusual situations. By then, the mostly consistent and structural environment of the ring is a piece of cake!
- 10. HAVE FUN! Don't always take yourself or the dog too seriously. Consistent correct practice combined with a spirit of fun and play will produce an outstanding performance. The frustration of poor performance can damage the bond between you and your dog. This bond is necessary to make the training and showing experience fun for the dog and rewarding for you.






