


On a bag of Fritos - YOU COULD BE A WINNER! NO PURCHASE NECESSARY DETAILS INSIDE. (The shoplifter special!)


On Tesco's Tiramisu dessert (printed on bottom of the box) - DO NOT TURN UPSIDE DOWN. (Too late!)

THE DOG IN THE HUMAN PACK

Dogs are such a part of all our lives today that little thought is given to dogs as a separate species to man.

For 15,000 years, man and dog have been associated to the benefit of both species. The dog obtains his food; a place to sleep and serves a useful purpose in his adopted family unit as an early warning system, protector and companion.

From the earliest ancestor of today's dog – THE WOLF, all dogs inherited the instincts and social behavior that they use in their everyday life.

Over the years man has adapted the shape and size of dogs but the basic behaviour remains the same, with only the fear of man removed.

However, leave a litter without contact with man for the first 16 weeks of their lives and those dogs seldom form a satisfactory bond with man, and are nervous and unreliable. This indicates that the empathy with man is not hereditary but the result of early contact.

Over the years man has adapted the shape and size of dogs to his own purposes, but the basic hehaviour remains the same. The domestic dog mated to any wild dog will produce fertile offspring. Dogs all behave as dogs. They will hunt and kill, chase and BITE.

EVERY DOMESTIC DOG IS A PACK ANIMAL.

A pack works because there is one leader and a strict social order to ensure harmony and an effective working unit. This pecking order is strictly adhered too and the higher the rank held in the pack the more privileges that dog is granted.

A dog thinks like a dog and uses its knowledge of the dog pack to find its position in the human pack that it joins as a puppy.

To live safely with out canine companions we need to have a basic understanding of how a dog uses this inherited knowledge to assess its position. When the pup joins our human family, his place is after ALL the other family members. As the lowest member he is then of lower social standing to all the family. As the lowest member he then behaves as subservient and loyal pet and will take directions from all the family.

Many dogs today are child substitutes and for a number of years, allowed privileges that elevates him as a dog of high social standing

So we must learn to THINK DOG.

Most dog bites occur in the family home involving the family dog or a dog known to the person. By learning to THINK DOG these situations need never occur.

There are five main areas that dogs use to evaluate their position in their new pack - YOUR FAMILY.

SLEEPING

If he sleeps in the most comfortable place for as long as he likes and no one is permitted to sleep on his bed, he will consider that he is clearly of high social standing.

MANNERS

If he enters the den (house) first, he must have high social standing. If he is groomed for as long as he wishes and when he wishes he must be a leader.

STRENGTH GAMES

If he wins all strength games, he must be the strongest and therefore the leader.

EATING

If he eats first, he is the most important and therefore the leader.

YOUR MAJESTY GAMES

If he places himself on a higher level and the other family members glance down as they climb stairs, he must be the leader as a downward glance indicates submission.

SEE HOW EASY IT IS TO GIVE YOUR DOG THE WRONG IMPRESSION OF HIS SOCIAL STANDING.


SLEEPING RIGHTS

This is one of the most common causes of dogs biting their owners or other members of the extended family. The leader sleeps in the most comfortable place in the den, away from draughts and he sleeps as long as he wishes and he is disturbed only at risk. DOGS BITE.


If your dog is allowed to occupy your bed, there may come a time when he may not allow you back into it.




THE LEADER IS THE ONE WHO ENTERS DOORWAYS FIRST.

THE LEADER IS THE ONE WHO ALLOWS GROOMING ONLY FOR AS LONG AS HE DESIRES TO BE GROOMED.




THE LEADER IS THE ONE WHO LEADS THE PACK.

STRENGTH GAMES

In a pack it is the dog that wins the games and is therefore stronger and more agile that is a potential leader.

By playing games of strength with your dog and allowing him to win and run off with the toy, YOU are teaching him that he is stronger and smarter than you are. If he is stronger and smarter he must conclude he is the leader.



EATING RIGHTS

The dog that eats first in the pack is the leader.

By feeding your dog first you are indicating to him that he is the most important member of your family. If he is the most important he has the right to discipline all under him.


In days gone by, this was not a problem because dogs are after the family, as they were fed the scraps from the table.



YOUR MAJESTY GAMES

Dogs do not maintain rank by constant displays of aggression to the lower members of the pack. Except in exceptional circumstances the leadership is maintained by daily displays of deference towards the leader.

Dogs that run upstairs and look down on the family may think that the family is deferring to them, as to climb stairs we look to see where we are placing our feet.



REVIEW THE SITUATION

Without the knowledge of how dogs think we may be creating a potentially dangerous situation that will end with our loved dog put to death for an action that to him was logical and a member of the family injured.

By learning to THINK DOG we can avoid these situations and integrate a dog safely into our family Remember that our dog must be the lowest member of the family unit. Dogs come from a structured family group.

The dog is fed last.

The dog is to allow us through doors first, to move out of the way so that he does not interfere with our passage when walking.

The dog is petted and groomed when we wish and for as long as we wish on our terms.

Make sure that the dog is not permitted to run up stairs and look down on us.

Preparing the dog's food in its presence and then eating ourselves before the dog is fed.

Make sure that we can occupy the dog's bed if and when we wish and that the dog does not occupy our bed


All games played on your terms. You start when you wish and finish when you are ready. Refuse to enter into games of strength and agility.

If YOU are clearly the leader of your pack your dog can be enjoyed in safety by all the family.

Training problems quickly disappear if these simple methods are used to allow the dog to clearly see that it is not a high ranking member of the family unit.

An immediate reply came from the hotel owner, who penned, "I've been operating this hotel for many years. In all that time, I've never had a dog steal towels, bedclothes, silverware or pictures off the walls. I've never had to evict a dog in the middle of the night for being drunk and disorderly. And I've never had a dog run out on a hotel bill. Yes, indeed, your dog is welcome at my hotel and, if your dog will vouch for you, you're welcome to stay here, too!"

OFF LEASH WALKING

FROM "PET DOGS - NOV 1998"

Allowing your dog the freedom of the countryside is becoming more and more difficult. Top trainer Sheila Bailey has some commonsense advice to keep both you and your dog out of trouble.

adly, the number of places, where we can safely walk our dogs off leash is becoming fewer and fewer. There was a time when it was safe to have our dog off leash most of the time - not any more. What with the high volume of traffic, the Dangerous Dogs Act, the scaremongering of the media, and our seeming inability to educate children in the basics of how to behave with dogs, it makes it increasingly difficult to find anywhere where we can safely let our dogs run free.

I do not consider that it is safe to have my dog off leash on any road, which is used by motorised vehicles. No matter how well behaved your dog is, if he is off leash and the unexpected happens - for example, an advertising board could blow down and fall down on top of him - he could be underneath a car before you realise what has happened.

This is probably obvious advice in city streets, but country lanes can lull you into a false sense of security. Few town drivers allow for the unexpected when rounding a bend on a narrow country lane - as witnessed by the appalling number of horses and riders who are run into by motorists.

On footpaths through farms, you have to be especially vigilant in following the Country Code. Your dog should remain on the footpath at all times. It is an offence under the Countryside Act of 1991 to allow a dog to be 'at large in a field where there are sheep'. Few people realise that the dog does not have to be anywhere near the sheep, let alone be chasing them, for an offence to be committed. The dog has to be on a leash or under close control. As close control means walking to heel, there is no point in not using a leash. It makes no difference to your dog if on or off leash when he is walking to heel, so why take the risk of his being suddenly confronted by dozens of wooly 'chaseables' all running away from him. Care must also be exercised if there are any ground nesting birds in the vicinity, pheasants, or wild flowers.

At one time, when you walked your dog, people where liable to come up talk to you and admire the dog -a sure way of gaining friends. Now, thanks to the hype and a very efficient dog lobby, they are more likely to cross the road and get as far away as possible – especially with certain breeds of dog who have been demonised by the press.

When you eventually find a safe place to let your dog off the leash, it is up to you as a responsible owner to make sure that he does not cause a problem to anyone else. If you see people approaching you when you are walking on a narrow footpath, it makes a lot of sense to sit your dog to one side. By doing this, you will draw attention to your well-behaved dog in a positive manner, and this is one of

the best ways in which we can counteract the anti-dog propaganda – together with poop scooping.

You should also remember that if you are in a public place, your dog only has to be perceived as being dangerous by a member of the public for you and your dog to fall foul of the draconian Dangerous Dog Act, when your dog will be presumed guilty unless you can prove his innocence. It is also well to remember that your dog does not have to bite anyone to fall foul of the

'aggravated offence. It only needs a nervous person to fall and injure themselves when backing off from a friendly dog for you to run the risk of having your dog seized, and your having a criminal conviction for life.

Another pitfall, which you must be wary of when having your dog off leash, is of allowing him to run up to every dog he sees. This is one of the greatest causes of concern shown by the owners who attend my behaviour clinic. Allowing your dog to do this can cause so many problems – not only for the dogs who have to cope with the unsolicited attention, but also for the dog who is allowed to indulge in this antisocial behaviour. Sooner or later, unless he is very lucky, he will get attacked for his bad manners. Sometimes, it only needs one attack to turn a friendly dog, who 'only wanted play', into an aggressive dog who wants to get his bite in first -just in case the other dog attacks him – as happened last time.

Owner of little dogs are often terrified when a large off lead dog is allowed to run up to their dog. Even a large dog who 'only wants to play', can bowl a little dog over and cause severe mental and physical damage and if a large dog does attack a little dog, the damage can all too easily be life threatening.

However, the owners of small dogs should also show consideration for the owners of large dogs. Small dogs should not be allowed to run up to large dogs uninvited. If the large dog warns off the little dog, to put him in his place for his lack of manners, then the owner of the little dog invariably accuses the large dog of being vicious. If, on the other hand, the large dog is frightened and runs away, the owner of the small dog often thinks it is very funny, and is very proud of owning such a 'spunky' little dog. Weeks of painstaking behaviour modification can be destroyed in one careless action, even if the other dog did 'only want to play', as their owners so often insist. What they don't seem to realise is that not all other dogs want to play with their dog. Again, it makes sense to put your dog on a leash and to sit him on the side of the path, whilst the other dog, who should also be on a leash, walks past.

Much is talked about socialising puppies, which is absolutely essential, but this does not mean that you teach your dog to socialise with every dog he meets. You should be teaching him that other dogs are OK but that you are much more fun than they are. When your puppy sees another dog on a walk, call him to you and have a really exciting game with him. If you know the other dog is friendly and the owner is agreeable, then you can let your puppy greet the other dog, and maybe play for a very short time. You should then call your puppy away and have an even more exciting game than you had on the previous occasion.

If you cannot see your dog then he is not under your control so it makes sense to call your dog to you when approaching a corner, if you cannot see what is around the bend. When you are on holiday with your dog, it is doubly important to be aware of what is around the corner, especially if you are walking near cliffs. Dogs do not seem to be able to gauge the height of drops in the landscape, and many seaside veterinary surgeons have to treat an alarming number of dogs who have jumped down horrendous heights and received serious injury. Needless to say, you should not let your dog off leash until you are fairly sure that you have a good recall and preferably, in addition, a recall

from his toy. If you are not one hundred per cent sure, then it is a good idea to trail a long line to begin with, as it will give you confidence, and will also give you the means of retrieving an otherwise disastrous situation should one arise.

Enjoy walking your dog off leash but always make sure that he is a worthy ambassador for the wonderful species – Canis Familiaris.
