


Extracts from "Rules for the conduct of Obedience Trials" Effective from the 1st January 2000

1. Introduction

The idea of Obedience Trials is to demonstrate the usefulness of the dog as the companion and guardian of man and not the ability of the dog to acquire facility in the performance of mere tricks. The classification which has been adopted is progressive with the thought in mind that a dog which has been granted the title of OBEDIENCE CHAMPION has demonstrated its fitness for a place in our modern scheme of living.

2. Titles

Class Titles

All dogs eligible to be entered in Obedience Trials in accordance with these Rules shall be eligible to receive Class Title Certificates upon qualification and application.

The Canine Control will receive applications for the use of the letters "CD" signifying Companion Dog, "CDX" signifying Companion Dog Excellent and "UD" signifying Utility Dog in connection with, and after the name of each dog, which shall be certified by Judges to have received three (3) qualifying scores of 170 or more points in Novice, Open and Utility Classes respectively.

7. Exhibitors and Handlers

Additional Commands

If a Judge considers that, but for an additional command the dog would not have performed the Principal Feature of the exercise, it will receive a non-qualifying score.

Change of Speed

The dog will show three distinct speeds. During the heeling routine the dog will show a slow, normal and fast speed. The sped will be in proportion to the size and build of the dog.

Commands

Where the word 'command' appears in specific exercises. It will mean 'command and/or signal' unless otherwise specified.

All verbal commands must be in the English language unless approved otherwise by the Judge.

One command only is given to the dog for a specific action on the part of the dog. The verbal command must be a single word.

The command may be given by the use of the Handlers voice and/or specific action of the Handler in the form of a signal.

A voice command and a signal may be given, but must be used simultaneously. A signal should be a single gesture of the arms and/or hands only, which must be promptly returned to their normal postion. Signals must be inaudible and must not touch the dog.

Any unusual noise or movement of the Handler may be considered by the Judge as a 'signal' or extra command.

Where the dog's name is used to attract its attention, a distinct pause between the name of the dog and command is required.

Dog Sitting in Front of the Handler in the Recalls, Retrieves or Jumping Exercises

If a dog fails to sit in front of its Handler in any of the above exercises, the penalty for this error must be a Substantial Deduction.

Extracts from 'Rules for the conduct of Obedience Trials

Dress Code

Adequate sensible dress with appropriate footwear (no thongs, scuffs or bare feet) is required to be worn by the Handler in the ring.

Entering the Ring

On the Steward's call of the dog's catalogue number, the Handler will enter the Ring with the dog on lead and stand near the "Starting Peg" on whichever side preferred.

Failure to Leave the Starting Peg

Should the dog require more than two commands to leave the Starting Peg in any one exercise, it must be declared unmanageable and receive a Zero score for that exercise or part exercise, whichever is applicable.

Finish or Going to Heel

The dog must go briskly to the Heel position either directly from the front or around the back of the handler and sit without further command immediately it reaches that position. At no time should the Handler be crowded by the dog. (The Flip or Continental Finishes are acceptable).

Food, etc.

No food or visible or audible aids carried or worn by the Handler or Training Aids (ball, 'bumbags', toys, dummies, etc will be taken into the Ring by the Handler. Penalty – disqualification.

Handler receiving Orders

The Handler must wait for the Judge to give the various orders. Failure to comply with this Rule must incur a penalty.

The Judge must inform the Handler before the start of the exercise if he intends using a signal in lieu of a verbal order for any specific exercises.

Handler Returning to the Dog

When the Handler returns to the dog he must walk around the back of the dog to the Heel position.

Heeling

During heeling exercises the Judge's orders – 'Halt', 'Stand (Stand your Dog)', and 'Down (Down your Dog') – must be followed by the order 'Forward' or 'Exercise Finished'.

Heel Position

The dog is at the Handler's left side as close as practicable to the Handler.

Praise

Praise (both verbal and physical) is allowed and to be encouraged, where stipulated in Description of Exercise, and between exercises after the Judge has ordered 'Exercise Finished' or 'Part Exercise Finished'.


Turns

All turns toher han about turns will be of 90 degrees and be shrply executed. Both left and right about-turns will be 180 degrees and may be either sharp U-turns or Handler pivot turns. The Handler must not become stationary during a turn.

About Turns

Handler to execute about turns, ie pivot and or U turns, as they see fit during the heeling routine without penalty.

ENDURANCE TEST

For the Handler

CONTENTS

- · Requirements
- The Test
- Judging
- Terrain
- · On the day of the Endurance Test.
- · General Rules
- Title

REQUIREMENTS

- · Vet check in the fortnight prior to the test.
- · Fixed collar for the dog.
- · Leash approximately 2 metres long.
- · Dogs to be aged between 2 and 7 years.

REQUIREMENTS (continued)

- · Bike Riders
- Bike Helmet which complies with State Traffic Laws.
- · A roadworthy bicycle.
- Joggers
- Appropriate and comfortable shoes and clothing.
- Supply of Staminade or the like.

THE TEST

- Four Vet checks at set times during the test.
- Short Obedience Test prior to the 20 kms and at the conclusion of the final rest period.
- Handler may jog or ride a bike.



THE TEST (continued)

- The 20 kms to be covered in 3 legs.
- Rest period and Vet check at the end of each leg.
- Distance to be covered in 2 hours 35 minutes i.e. 10 kms an hour.



JUDGING

- The judge will judge no more than 20 dogs.
- · He/she will travel with the dogs.
- This will either be by walking, bike riding or jogging.

TERRAIN



- Test to be conducted over 3 varying surfaces.
- Surfaces could include bitumen, unsealed roads, dirt tracks, grass, etc.
- Total distance of the course to be 20 kms.

ON THE DAY

- · Bitches must be vetted.
- Assemble at your exhibit number on the ground with the following:
- Dog
- · Veterinary Certificate
- · Bike if not jogging

ON THE DAY (continued)

- · Dog's water bowl and water.
- · Dog peg.
- · Joggers change of top and socks.
- · Staminade or like for handlers.

GENERAL RULES

- Dogs must be registered with the V.C.A.
- Handlers must be financial members of the , V.C.A.
- If the climatic temperature reaches 24 degrees Celsius the test will be cancelled regardless as to what stage it has reached.

TITLE

- Each qualifying dog will receive a certificate.
- "ET" will become part of the dog's registered name after applying to the V.C.A. and paying the prescribed fee.









markings sometimes found in pups. The name of the Border Terrier was fixed in 1880, first registered by the British Kennel Club in 1913, and recognized as a breed in 1920. The Border Terrier is not very well-known outside of Britain, but is popular in Sweden.

The head shape resembles an otter's - broad skull, short, strong muzzle; black nose and a scissor bite. The eyes are dark hazel, not prominent, and have a keen expression. The ears are small, v-shaped, of medium thickness, and fall forward close to the cheek. The body is fairly long and the ribs are well back, the tail is short, but thick at the base. The topcoat of the Border Terrier is wiry and dense and has a thick undercoat. The skin is also thick. The coat colors are red, wheaten, grizzle and tan, or blue and tan.

The Border Terrier may be small in stature, but it has a huge spirit. The Border Terrier exhibits classic Terrier behavior: it is rugged and fearless. This is one very determined dog. It was bred to keep on with the chase and to bravely pursue its quarry through difficult terrain. The Border Terrier makes an excellent watch-dog, as it has a keen sense of its owner's territory. This dog is most happy to alert you to the presence of potential intruders. However, it must be properly trained to behave exactly as you want. In most cases the Border Terrier gets along well with other dogs. If two females are kept together, one should be allowed to be the boss in order to avoid quarrels.

The Border Terrier can make a good companion dog as long as it is given a lot of tasks to carry out. These dogs thrive on their owner's attention.



The Borzoi is tall, slender, and has an imposing stature. The Borzoi's head is long and lean, with a slightly domed skull. The jaws are long, deep and powerful, with a scissor bite. The nose is fairly large and black. The eyes are almond-shaped, dark, obliquely set and well back.

The ears are small, fine, narrow and pointed, and are set high and back. The body has a gracefully rising arch from near the shoulders, with well-sprung ribs and a muscular croup. The legs are long and straight with well-muscled hindquarters. The tail is long, set low and well-feathered. The coat is short and smooth on the head, ears and front legs, with the neck having profuse curls. Long, silky, and profuse feathering on the body, hindquarters, and tail. The coat colors vary, with white, black, and red markings being the most common.


This large, very elegant dog, is capable of quite gentle behavior. The Borzoi makes an excellent watch-dog, as it quickly becomes very protective of members of its family and their possessions. This dog gets along readily with members of its own kind. However, because it is so big, it is wise to introduce it slowly to smaller dogs so they are not afraid. This dog is readily trainable; although instructions should always be consistent to avoid any frustrations.

During training it is advisable to remove other dogs and any other thing capable of sudden fast movement. Owners of small dogs can become very distressed if your Borzoi takes off after their dogs in hot pursuit.

The Borzoi can make a good family companion as it is normally very tolerant of children. However, this large and powerful dog should not be left alone with small children. It requires a great deal of exercise to keep it fit and content. The feet and lower legs should be regularly checked after high-speed running.






I KNEW WE COULD DO IT!!! "Seduisant Fancy That CD AD"
