

THE PLAYFUL RETRIEVE

Rebecca K Whitmeyer

All obedience trial exercises, indeed all aspects of dog training, can be divided into three categories: restrictive routines, active ones, and those, which are a combination. The sit-stay, down-stay, and stand for examination are wholly restrictive, jumps and retrieves are active, while heel and recalls are a combination. One problem with the usual sequence of exercises in obedience training is that we typically start and concentrate almost exclusively on restrictive or combination routines in that most active period of a dog's life, the first year. This practice has two disadvantages; it fails to take into account the puppy's natural tendencies – to be active, to be playful, to have a very limited attention span – and, it introduces a puppy to training with exercises which he finds unpleasant, thus hindering our attempts to build a positive attitude toward work with his handler.

By contract, I feel that the most appropriate "first" in training, as well as one of the most valuable exercises throughout a dog's life, is the retrieve. Introducing a puppy to playful retrieving of a tennis ball can be done effectively as soon as he is introduced to his new home. In contrast to the restrictive routines, nearly all puppies accept retrieving readily. It plays upon puppy's natural tendencies. This play is the beginning of a strong human/canine bond, thus developing the positive attitude so desirable for future training.

Teaching retrieving first also has benefit for a beginning trainer. I have found that the typical first-time trainer is too demanding, too harsh and too formal. To many people "training" means correcting, punishing, or hollering, and they entirely neglect playing, praising, and rewarding. By beginning with a play exercise the trainer learns to be happy and encouraging to his puppy, thus developing an attitude, which is so necessary later when praise is needed.

In addition to its use as a first exercise, retrieving is invaluable throughout a dog's life. It is an excellent form of both play and exercise for the dog and can be done in a controlled or restricted area, such as a yard or park. After a formal session of heeling, etc you can end on a happy note by throwing a ball for your dog, somewhat as a reward.

I have found ball retrieving invaluable also when travelling. After dogs have been confined to a car for several hours, I take them out at a rest area, field or whatever is available, and throw a ball (sometimes for several dogs together). After this period of fun and exercise they are satisfied to return to the confines of the car for more driving.

For those who plan to do advanced obedience, this early training will be an asset in several ways. Not only has retrieving correlation with the dumbbell exercises in Open and Scent Discrimination and Directed Retrieve in Utility, but it also has a less apparent benefit in these classes. The entire Novice routine is restrictive to a greater or lesser extent. At no time is the dog called upon to leave his handler, go out and do something on his own, or even show much liveliness or activity. Then, when you begin Open, this pattern changes and many dogs (and handlers) never do adapt to the change.

On the other hand, dogs that have learned to love playing ball seem to make the transition to the more formal retrieving exercises very easily and, in addition, have acquired attitudes and habits, which can help in learning jumping and the Go Away. In general, they have a great advantage when they approach the active routines of Open and Utility.

<u>The Playful Retrieve – Rebecca K Whitmeyer (continued)</u> <u>How to begin</u>

I like to begin with a tennis ball (if the puppy is large enough to hold one in his mouth) when the pup is first brought home at seven or eight weeks old. This can be done even earlier if this is a pup of your own breeding. Nearly all puppies will chase a moving object such as a ball. Being in the house and roll it only as far as your puppy can follow with his eyes. Resist the temptation to bounce the ball or throw it a long distance. He will probably chase it eagerly and maybe pounce on it. If not, try to interest him in it some more, and then roll it again. Remember that puppy's attention span is very short so only play a very few minutes at this time.

Once puppy has learned to enjoy this game of chasing the rolling ball, while you are sitting on the floor clap your hands and encourage puppy to bring it back. By sitting rather than standing you are at the puppy's level, in a perfect position to welcome him and fuss over him if he does return, and also you are curbing your own impulse to go toward him. If he comes back, praise him and act as if the ball he brought you is solid gold. If not, do not scold or act displeased, and don't chase him. Keep encouraging him to bring it, and, if he doesn't, nonchalantly move toward him to get it and try again.

If, after several days, the pup hasn't gotten the idea of bring the ball to you, try playing in a hallway with all doorways closed. Roll the ball down the hallway and as soon as puppy gets it, clap; you hands and encourage him to return. Here, if he runs at all, he has no choice but to come to you. Then, when he gets to you, you can hug him and fuss over him so that he gets the idea that this is what you want. Don't be in a hurry to leave the hallway, thus giving puppy a chance to go elsewhere than to you. Also, be sure to do only a few retrieves at a time. Stop while puppy is still eager rather than bore him.

The next step, after puppy is enjoying retrieving in the hallway, eagerly running after the ball and bringing it back to you waiting arms, is that of returning to a less confined room of the house. Hopefully, here puppy will go after the ball and return to you as he did in the hallway. However, he may not! If, despite your calling and clapping your hands he does not return, you have two choices: 1) you can return to the hallway for a few days and then try the room again or 2) attach a very light rope or thick string to his collar and let him drag it. Once he has the ball in his mouth, call and encourage as above but also give short GENTLE tugs on the rope to get him back. I emphasize "gentle" because if your tugs are too strong, he may drop the ball or, what is worse, lose interest altogether. Remember, that it is suppose to be fun for both of you — no corrections, no punishment, only gentle, playful encouragement for puppy to do what you want.

Stay indoors until puppy eagerly runs after the ball and returns to you with it WITHOUT the rope. Don't be in a hurry to go outdoors as that is a big transition. You want your puppy to really enjoy this gam, but also to know the rules of the game before you add further distractions.

Now you are ready to move outside, but ONLY ADD THAT ONE VARIABLE. For the first day outside put the dragline back onto puppy's collar (or put one on now if you didn't before) so he will do the routine correctly the first time. Throw the ball NO FARTHER THAN YOU DID IN THE HOUSE, and assume a familiar sitting position.

From here on you can gradually proceed to longer retrieves without a dragline and to a standing position. You are now also ready to begin further obedience training but with these advantages: You have learned how to play with and praise your puppy. Your puppy has learned that doing things with you is enjoyable, he has learned to keep his attention on you, and he has learned to play your way. Yes, it is a game, but a controlled game. He now has a better readiness for formal obedience routines.

I think that you will find retrieving a most appropriate exercise to teach first, as well as a fun and useful bit of knowledge for your dog throughout his life.

DAILY CANINE ROUTINE - FROM A DOG'S PERSPECTIVE

The day is divided into two important sections: Mealtime. And everything else.

Mealtime

- 1. Just because there does not seem to be anything visible around to eat certainly does not mean there is nothing around to eat. The act of staring at the underside of a table or chair on which someone else is eating sets in motion a chain of events that eventually results in food.
- 2. When you actually receive a meal, submerge your head into it as you would a shower. Never, never look up again until a minimum of at least fifteen minutes after the obvious food is gone. This is important. Just because your dish is empty does not mean that it is time to stop eating.
- 3. Remember that all food is potentially yours up until the time that it is actually swallowed by another. The lengthy path a piece of food will take from a plate to a mouth via a hand is as good a time as any to stake your claim to it.
- 4. If you really see something you want, and all your other attempts at getting it have failed, it is only right to grovel shamelessly. As a second tactic, stare intently at the object of your desire, allowing long gelatinous drools to leak like icicles from your lower lip.

Everything Else

- 5. There are really only two important facial expressions to bother with: complete and overwhelming joy and nothing at all.
- 6. Any time that is not mealtime is potentially naptime. The best time to take a nap is when you hear your name being called repeatedly. The most relaxing position is on your side, all four limbs parallel.
- 7. The most practical way to get dry is to shake violently near a fully clothed person. A second effective method is to stand on a light-colour piece of furniture.

Dogs make us human

By Heidi De Wald - Autumn 2002 edition of Nature Australia - published by the Australian Museum.

About 48% of Australian households own dogs. But can you imagine a world without dogs. And would we be the same if they were not here? Would human beings have developed in very different ways had our best friends not been by our sides?

A recent study suggests that the domestication of dogs mutually led to profound changes in the biological and behavioural evolution of both species. It has long been known that the first species domesticated by humans was the wolf. In essence, we made wolves into dogs. But did wolves also make us, beginning over 100,000 years ago? This is the key question explored in this study.

New theories about the origins of modern humans, the earliest dogs and the crucial role of human-dog co-evolution are highlighted in this "ground-pawing" paper by Dr. Paul S.C. Tacon, Australian Museum, Sydney and Dr. Colin Pardoe, Bio-Archaeology consultant, Adelaide. They present fossil evidence recovered by others supporting DNA results of dog domestication over 100,000 years ago and are the first to make the link between the fossil and genetic evidence.

"Our study, along with those of others published this year, shows the origin of modern humans and their behaviour is more complex than either of the popular theories suggests. A more exact picture of who we are and where we came from is only now emerging, one that is richer and more convoluted than the two impressionistic alternative models, "said Dr. Paul Tacon, Principal Research Scientist at the Australian Museum. Drs. Tacon and Pardoe argue that the early canine-sapien relationship ultimately changed the world forever. They not only elaborate on and provide greater time depth for previous studies that focused on implications of the relationship for recent times but also explore the implications of dog domestication close to the time that modern humans are believed to have emerged. These include:

- 1. The origins of human territorial marking and, ultimately, the development of art and a symbolic explosion of land marking.
- 2. The development of big game hunting.
- 3. The origins of 'mateship' and new forms of bonding to negotiate complex situations.
- 4. Implications for the settlement of Australia.

Tacon and Pardoe conclude that, ultimately, dogs were one of a few key forces that led to anatomically and behaviourally modern humans of 100,000 years ago and that this has complicated the recent 'Out of Africa' versus 'Regional Continuity' debate.

MEDICAL RESEARCHERS at the University of Cambridge in England are reportedly testing a theory that dogs can diagnose cancer in human beings. Called "dognosis" by the researchers involved in the project, it refers to the notion that a dog's powerful sense of smell can be used to sniff out a cancerous anomaly in the human body. According to the British medical journal, The Lancet, a dog belonging to a British woman repeatedly sniffed a lesion the woman had on her thigh. The lesion was subsequently diagnosed as malignant melanoma. In another case, a 66-year-old man with a well-established patch of eczema on one leg found his dog pushed its nose again and again against the eczema through the man's trousers. This prompted the man to consult his doctor, who found a cancerous lesion on the man's leg. In a third incident, a young Dalmatian showed persistent interest in a fleck of pigmentation on one leg of the dog's 20-year-old owner. When the owner consulted her doctor about it, malignant melanoma was discovered.

ANZAC DAY REMEMBRANCE

This Anzac Day Denis Ferguson will shed a tear for a mate who served on many dangerous missions during a four-year tour of duty in Vietnam - and was not allowed to come home. Marcus, a black Labrador, was one of 11 tracker dogs who served with the Australian army in Vietnam. Marcus' owner was Victoria Cross winner Roden Cutler, then NSW governor. But he barked at visitors to Government House, so Cutler, who died in February, thought Marcus would be better suited to army life. Marcus was linked up with Private Ferguson and then was sent to Vietnam in 1967. When Mr Ferguson returned to Australia ...another handler took over Marcus. "It was really hard to leave him. We'd built up a special bond. When we slept out in the jungle, I used to use him as a pillow" Mr Ferguson said.

In 1970, then Lance Corporal Ferguson was sent back to Vietnam & reunited with Marcus. Tears filled his eyes & his voice broke when Mr Ferguson described the reunion to The Australian. "He was in his kennel with his back to me when I arrived. I did my whistle, which he knew very well, & he stiffened up. I whistled again, & he turned around, & he was crying. Yes, he was crying & so was I". Mr Ferguson offer, when he returned to Australia the second time, to pay Marcus' quarantine cost to come home was rejected.

Two years ago, Mr Ferguson heard that Marcus was given to the New Zealand embassy in Saigon. He had glaucoma & was put down about 2 years after Mr Ferguson last saw him.

<u>Canine Commandos</u> - The 11 Australian tracker dogs that served in Vietnam from 1966 to 1972 were Cassius, Tiber, Justin, Marcus, Janus, Julian, Caesar, Milo, Trajan, Juno and Marcian. Dogs on peacekeeping & other missions overseas are now brought back to Australia.

HOT SPOTS

Hot spots frustrate dogs and owners alike. Guns n Sashes Magazine - April 2002

Introduction

Poor Dusty! She's been licking and chewing on that spot on her flank for the better part of the day, and it's now a raw, open sore, oozing fluid. Dusty has a superficial pyoderma, a skin infection known to veterinarians as pyotraumatic dermatitis and to dog owners as "hot spots". Hot spots are surface skin infections caused when populations of normal skin bacteria grow and overwhelm normal resistance. They are generally circular patches that lose hair, can be swollen, may exude a smelly puss and can be painfully itchy, causing the dog to scratch, lick or bit to the point of self-mutilation. Untreated hot spots can spread and provoke a normally even-tempered dog to growl or nip when touched.

These troublesome sores can seem to arise in a matter of hours with no warning, but they do tend to follow a pattern that helps in predicting their occurrence.

Dogs most susceptible to hot spots are those with heavy coats and histories of allergies, ear infections, flea infestations, irritated anal sacs, and grooming problems such as hair tangles and mats, but any dog can develop this infection. Dogs in warm, humid climates may develop hot spots when they shed their undercoats if the dead hair is trapped next to the skin, and dogs with behaviour problems may mutilate themselves by licking and thus encourage an infection to be become established.

The most common locations for hot spots are the legs and feet, flanks and rumps – areas that can be reached by licking or biting – but these localized infections can also appear on ears, neck and chest if the dog is continually scratching.

Treatment

Two approaches are necessary for dealing with hot spots – treat the sore and remove the underlying cause to prevent recurrences

Trim the hair around the sore to prevent further spread of the infection and expose the edges of the lesion

Wash the area in a mild water based astringent or antiseptic

Be prepared to used antibiotics or cortisone if the washing does not give results

Hot Spots - (continued)

Ackerman recommends against the use of ointments or creams because they can seal in the infection and hinder recovery. In severe cases, a veterinarian may suggest the use of an Elizabethan collar to prevent mutilation and give the hot spot a chance to heal.

Prevention

If the underlying cause is tangled or matted hair or trapped dead hair, put the dog on a regular grooming schedule either at home or at a grooming salon. Collies, Old English Sheepdogs, Shih-Tzus, and other breeds with long hair that tangles easily should be groomed at least twice a week so that snarls and mats do not form. Never bathe a dog with matted or tangles hair – comb the snarls out first. Clip mats if you cannot easily comb them out, and make an appointment for professional grooming every 4-6 weeks if you cannot keep the dog mat free on your own.

If underlying cause is allergies, begin an aggressive campaign to rid your home and yard of fleas and work with your veterinarian on a plan to reduce allergy triggers for your pet. Household dust, plant pollen, lawn chemicals, and diet can all cause allergies or can build to a crescendo of allergies if the dog's sensitivities cross a threshold. Frequent vacuuming, supplements to keep the skin and cost healthy, air purifiers, and baths in skin-soothing herbal or medicated shampoos with aloe, oatmeal, jojoba or eucalyptus can help. Next step is over the counter antihistamines such as Benadryl or Atarax – with a veterinarian's approval. If these don't work, then steroids to reduce the inflammation and the immune system reaction to the allergen and perhaps antibiotics to cure the infected hot spot are the next course of treatment.

If the underlying cause seems to be behavioural – if your pet doesn't have allergies or fleas or a more serious skin condition, but is so bored, stressed, or lonely that he maims himself with constant licking or scratching, he may need more exercise, playtime, and attention. This can be the easiest or the hardest treatment to implement because there's no pill or ointment for long-term success, the requirements are time, consistency, and perhaps an investment in training books, an obedience school, a dog sitter, or an animal behaviourist.

TRAINEE INSTRUCTORS THE CLUB NEEDS YOU

As always we desperately need people - especially the younger members - to train as future Instructors. Commitment (ongoing) is needed. Training can begin once you are in Merit Class and we give lots of help along the way with theory and practical work.

Think about it people - and also about the continual work that the Instructors give you week after week, often at the cost of training their own dogs. Reach for a new horizon - become a Trainee Instructor. It's time for people to step up and make life easier for the older Instructors.


