

TEACHING SELF CONTROL

Does your dog pull on lead when someone approaches? When he sees another dog? If joggers run by? If children are playing? If a cat or squirrel dashes through the yard? Is he hard to control at the vet or groomer's? When people come into your house?

If the answer to any of these questions is yes, chances are your dog needs to learn **self-control**. Just as children must learn to control their impulses before they can mature into responsible adults, dogs must learn self-control before they can become well-mannered canine citizens. Self-control must be taught, just as you teach him to sit or speak or come when called.

Every owner can teach his dog self control by following these guidelines:

Train, don't restrain. Taking a firm grip on the leash and collar teaches the dog nothing except that you can restrain him. Instead, give a simple command, such as sit, reminding with the lead if needed, then loosen the lead so there is no tension at all. If the dog breaks position, quietly and slowly reposition him, and loosen the lead again.

Ask for compliance, not submission. View working with your dog as you would working with any friend. Avoid creating a struggle by asking the dog for more than he can do at the time. For example, if your dog is really excited, he may be unable or unwilling to lay down, but agreeable to sitting quietly with a few reminders from you. Compromise and be reasonable - most struggles between dog and owner are created when the owner attempts to dominate the dog, instead of finding a solution acceptable to both owner and dog.

Remember the dog does not know what his options are. A dog that is lacking self-control simply does not know that it is possible to sit quietly in the face of distractions. It is the owner's responsibility to show the dog that he has options other than lunging, pulling or leaping around.

Move slowly and talk quietly. A dog that is highly excited needs calm, slow handling. A common mistake owners make is to move quickly, grabbing at the leash and collar, raising their voice and speaking in short, sharp tones. From the dog's point of view, the owner appears as excited as they are, and short sharp tones often sound like barking. Instead of calming the dog, this reinforces his excitement. By moving slowly and talking quietly, the owner sends a clear message to the dog that he is not excited and is in control of the situation

Remind and ask, don't demand. A dog that is already excited is likely to resist a harsh correction or respond by becoming more excited. "Ask" by using the lightest possible touch on the leash and collar, and remind the dog what he's doing each time he forgets and shifts position.

Work on teaching self-control in all situations. Begin by working in distraction free areas, and ask your dog to sit on a loose leash for five minutes. Gradually move on to more exciting situations, and practice often. Work at home, at friends' homes, in parks, shopping centres, at dog shows, training classes and the Veterinarian's. As your dog's self control and respect for you increase, you can add lying down quietly for up to 30 minutes to his skills.





LETTER TO THE EDITOR

After attending the General Meeting on Tuesday, 6th August I'd like to forward the following comments in regards to the intended extra dog boxes. I believe very little thought and planning was done by the Club Committee before the proposal was put before the rather poorly attended meeting and consequently rushed through. I therefore urge the Committee to examine the issue more closely and in more exact detail, before a lot of material, money and manpower are wasted on a possible white elephant. Several points come to my mind having looked at the proposed site in daylight and those are in regard to number, location and construction.

Point "A" Do we need 12 extra boxes?

<u>Point "B"</u> The proposed site is insufficient for that number. Also as the openings would have to be toward the river in order that members retain safe access to the toilets, the front of the boxes would therefore face N-NE and will cop the full sunshine, this means the roof would have to be extended in order to shade the openings.

<u>Point "C"</u> A row of boxes parallel in front of the existing ones should also be considered as it was intended when the boxes were first completed, as well as three (3) to the left side of the existing ones. Sufficient space between the two (2) rows will be essential. As the opening should face the grounds (South) an extended roof is not necessary but roof and wall must be properly insulated as they are fully exposed to the sun all day. As the proposed areas are also part of the exit area when cleaning out the mud, etc after floods, the ground under the boxes should be concreted and drainage provided.

I hope that the Committee will closely address and consider these points. Other Members might have ideas of their own also

They became really frustrated and one of the blondes said to her companion, "Okay, we'll give him one more try. We'll throw him in the air one more time and if he doesn't fly, we're taking him back to the store!"

KID-PROOF YOUR DOGS, DOG-PROOF YOUR KIDS

High pitched laughter pealing behind her, Nancy ran around the corner of the house smack bang into the dog chained by the garage. Unnerved by the noise and startled by the child, the dog lunged and bit Nancy on the nose. She screamed, and the dog bit again. Nancy ended up with several stiches to her face and nightmares: the dog was euthanised for biting and both families were traumatised.

The tragedy could have been avoided if Nancy's parents and the dog's owners had been prepared.

- 1. First of all, the dog should never be chained outside unattended. Most dogs of guard or working heritage suffer personality quirks when tied and many become downright aggressive. Dogs are better off in fenced areas, where they can see the barrier between them and the world, where they can feel somewhat safe from noisy, frolicking children.
- 2. In addition, many dogs instinctively equate the high-pitched sounds of children with the distress sounds of prey animals and they react by biting the child, as they would have bitten the prey animal in the wild.

Secondly, children should be taught how to behave around dogs, even if their own family does not own a dog. For example -

- 1. A child should never approach a strange dog without asking the owner if it's OK to pat the dog.
- 2. If a child sees a loose dog on the street, he should not approach it even if he knows the dog belongs to his friend. He should tell someone that he saw the dog, but should make no attempt to pat or grab it.
- 3. Nor should he scream or run away, for these actions can result in an attack by the dog. A running being frequently says 'prey' to the dog and triggers the chase response in his brain. Once triggered, this response is almost impossible to interrupt. The dog is reacting to chemical stimulus, not rational thought, and is extremely difficult to sidetrack.
- 4. Most dogs, even those that are well trained, do not consider children as figures of authority.
- 5. Furthermore, since children frequently stare intently at animals, a dog may feel threatened by this short person who is trying to catch him. Even the best natured dog may bite to protect himself in these circumstances, especially if he feels cornered.
- 6. Once a child is given permission to approach a dog, she should present her closed fist for the dog to sniff. This protects the fingers in case the dog is frightened and tries to nip.
- 7. Children should never hug a dog that is not their own, and should only hug their own dog very gently if the dog can tolerate the hug.
- 8. Children should be taught to never hit dogs with their hand or an object.
- 9. To lower their voices when playing with the dog.
- 10. To leave the dog alone when he's sleeping, eating or ill
- 11. To never tease a dog in any fashion. Many dog bites occur because the child teases the pet beyond endurance.

Dog owners share the responsibility for bite prevention as well. They should socialise their puppies to small children at an early age. It helps to buy from a breeder who has started this socialisation prior to puppy purchase, for the younger the puppy is exposed to gentle children, the more tolerant of children it will become.

HOW SMART IS FIDO?

A new study by researchers at the University of California Davis seems to have found that our pet dogs are even smarter than we may think. While animal behaviourists used to think a dog's bark was simply a way of getting attention, the new study suggests that individual dogs have specific barks with a range of meanings.

It seems that dogs usually use high-pitched single barks when they are separated from their owners and a lower, harsher super bark when a stranger approaches or the doorbell rings. Additionally, playful woofs are high-pitched and unevenly spaced.

Fido also appears to know when he's being short-changed on treats because he may have a basic mathematical ability enabling him to tell when one pile of objects is bigger than another. Of course, to count, an animal has to recognise that each object in a set corresponds to a single number and that the last number in a sequence represents the total number of objects.

Robert Young of Brazil's Pontifical Catholic University of Minas Gerais in Belo Horizonte tested the theory on eleven dogs using dog treats. They were shown the treats and then a screen was lowered and the goodies were left as they were or some were added or taken away. If a treat was added or taken away the dogs looked at the treats much longer than they did when they were not disturbed, presumably because they had done their sums and the numbers did not meet their expectations.

Young believes that, since dogs are descended from wolves, which not only have a large neocortex (the brain's centre of reasoning) but also live in large social groups, the mathematical ability could have been used to work out how many allies and enemies they had in a pack.



1st Working Bee


- 1. Clear all overhanging branches in rings, etc to well above 7-8 feet
- 2. Cut and trim grass as set out above
- 3. Air out UD mats (in cupboard in storeroom), check UD squares
- 4. Check septic

2nd Working Bee

- 1. Rope off all rings
- 2. Place all hurdles
- 3. Set out rubbish bins (in little shed)
- 4. Prepare poo buckets and water buckets. Scrub poo shovels
- 5. Judges name boards, Ring score boards and Stay markers
- 6. Mark out car park with rope and witches hats
- 7. Set up hides
- 8. Flag poles to be taken down from store room

TRIAL DAY

- 1. 1 x Poo bucket between 2 rings, place remainder strategically over ground
- 2. Organise minimum of 2 parking attendants each gate (vests in cupboard)

DUTIES OF THE RAFFLE STEWARD


- 1. Organise weekly or fornightly Club raffle and arrange ticket sales


