




"Plants poisonous to Dogs"

Please note that this list of poisonous plants is not a complete list. The plants listed are the more common plants that are poisonous to dogs. While some of these plants only give dogs symptoms of irritation, please be aware that the size of the dog and the amount of the plant that is ingested effects how toxic the particular plant can be. Always take your dog to the vet immediately if you believe your dog has ingested a plant that might be poisonous.

<u>Plant</u>	Toxic portion of Plant	Symptoms of poisoning
Amaryllis	Bulbs	Upset stomach, hyperactivity lethargy, coma, shock, death
Apple	seeds, most parts	Varied toxic effects; rapid breathing, shock, dilated pupils, diarrhoea gum inflammation
Apricot, almond	seeds	Vomiting, abdominal pain diarrhoea
Asparagus fern	All parts	Vomiting, abdominal pain cramps, tremors, heart respiratory, and kidney failure
Azalea	All parts	Weakness, upset stomach drooling, coma, heart failure depression
Bird of Paradise	Fruit, seeds, most parts	Varied toxic effects
Chrysanthemum	All parts	Skin irritation
Creeping fig, Weeping fig	All parts	Upset stomach, skin irritation
Delphinium	All parts	Varied toxic effects
Daffodil	Bulbs	nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, death
Elephant ears	All parts	Varied toxic effects
Heart leaf (Philodendron)	Leaves, stems, stalks	Upset stomach, mouth irritation, tremors, seizures, loss of balance, asphyxiation, death
Jasmine	All parts	laboured breathing, seizures, weakness, respiratory failure, death
Larkspur	All parts	upset stomach, excitement, depression, death
Mushrooms	All parts	Varied toxic effects
Nutmeg	All parts	Varied toxic effects
Oak tree	Acorns	Varied toxic effects
Poinsettia	All parts especially seeds	Upset stomach, oral irritation, death

Peach	All parts	Vomiting, abdominal pain, diarrhoea
Rhubarb	Leaf blade	convulsions, coma, death
Saddle leaf and Split leaf Philodendron	Leaves, stems, stalks	upset stomach, mouth irritation, tremors, seizures, loss of balance, asphyxiation, death
Spinach	All parts	Varied toxic effects
Sunburned potatoes	Green growth, sprouts	Varied toxic effects, death
Tomato and tomato vine	Green growth, sprouts, most parts	Varied toxic effects
Umbrella plant	All parts	Vomiting, abdominal pains, cramps, tremors, heart, respiratory, kidney failure, death
Wisteria	seeds	Varied toxic effects

PETS DIE IN HOT CARS!

Reprinted from Bendizo Obedience Dos Club - "Recall" - September 2002

The RSPCA advises pet owners not to leave their pets in a car even on a moderately warm day as pets can die in as few as 4-6 minutes.

RSPCA State President, Dr Hugh Wirth said "When a car is stationary, in full sun, on a 25 degree Celsius day (in the shade) the cabin temperature will rise to 46 degrees Celsius in just six (6) minutes and that if the core temperature of a dog or cat reaches 46 degrees Celsius it suffers from a fatal heatstroke. Unlike humans, dogs don't sweat, they relay on radiating heat to stay cool.

Never leave your pet in a car unattended, even just for a few minutes. The inside of a car can heat up quickly and cause the pet great suffering.

If you do see a pet left unattended in a car on a warm day and it appears to be suffering, do not interfere yourself; call the local Police or the RSPCA.

Here are some facts regarding animals and heat. Please take the time to read this information and consider sharing it with others. It could mean life or death for an animal this summer.

- The temperature inside a parked vehicle can double in a matter of minutes. A dog left inside a vehicle can die within minutes, as they are not able to sweat to cool themselves. A dog panting inside a car will raise the temperature even more quickly.
- RSPCA Inspectors and Police Officers will take appropriate action if the animal inside is clearly distressed or might become.
- The effect of heat stress from being left inside a vehicle begins with the animal in distress and perhaps clawing at the doors or windows. As the temperature rises the animal begins to experience confusion then muscle meltdown, which can lead to collapse and finally death.
- Leaving the windows down does little to slow this process.
- The RSPCA believes that whatever the weather, animals should never be left alone in vehicles. In the addition to the risks from heat, cars can be stolen, damaged or even catch fire leaving no one present to rescue the animal from inside the vehicle.
- If ever a situation occurs where an animal must be left in a vehicle for a short time then the driver should leave a note on the vehicle giving their time of return. This would save unnecessary action by concerned passers by.

Heat stress or heat stroke occurs when animals are confined in hot environments.

When suffering from heat stroke, a dog will initially show an increase in activity associated with panting and vocalisation – usually whining or barking. The dog will become agitated, often with a worried or furrowed expression.

All animals are affected by heat stress, however dogs with short noses such as the Bull Dog, Pekingese, Pug and Boxer are particularly at risk.

Pets Die in Hot Cars (continued)



As the heat stroke progresses, the panting becomes excessive and laboured with the dog showing an inability to breathe properly. The dog usually drools excessively and may vomit. If the suffering continues, the dog will suffer circulatory collapse, its gums will appear blue and it will convulse or become unconscious.

WHAT YOU CAN DO TO HELP

It is vital the dog's body is cooled as quickly as possible, especially the head.

- 1. Place the dog in a tap water bath or hose the dog down. Make sure the head and airways are not blocked. If available apply ice to the dog's head.
- 2. Contact a veterinarian as a matter of urgency
- 3. Transport the dog to the nearest Veterinarian wrapped in soaking towels and keep ice packs on its head.

Environmental Enrichment

With our busy lifestyles many dogs can spend hours each day left to their own devices sometimes leading to social and behavioural problems. As we learn more about animals it is increasingly apparent that mental health is of enormous importance to an animals well being and lifestyle. The following are a list of suggestions to provide Environmental Enrichment for those times when your dog is left home alone.

These ideas should be used in addition to your normal family interaction and an appropriate exercise regime and great care should be taken to ensure that there is no danger to your pet or others in any of these activities.

A BIRD FEEDER

The height and location needs to be so that the birds do not get caught or injured, I can live without my dog being that enriched! I generally put the breakfast scraps on the feeder before going out and it can be fascinating to watch the dog's behaviours.

The cavalier sits waiting patiently at a non-threatening distance for birds so they will feed and drop food after which he vacuums underneath to find the dropped scraps. If things are a bit slow he will do an occasional rush forward timed so that the birds fly off startled and drop the food. The Heeler x guards the feeder and won't let a bird near it all day and the Terrier x tries to figure out ways to climb across or jump up to the feeder itself, all dogs receiving mental stimulation. Note that my dog is the one who seems to get the most food from this system

AN ICE BLOCK

Place some suitable scraps of food into an ice-cream container, fill with water and freeze. You could even freeze a knotted rope into it so it could be hung somewhere or maybe bury it, the ice melts the interest is renewed as treats come to the surface.

A cool idea for the hot weather! I saw a similar system being used in a sanctuary for a Tasmanian Devil, ice-block trays were frozen with water and blood in them and placed at the top of the waterfall so the scent travelled down, they also threw them around the enclosure so there was plenty of scent to check out as they melted. Often zoos and sanctuaries do environmental enrichment activities with their animals so it is a good idea to ask them for some new ideas if you visit.

A DIGGING PIT


Some dogs love to dig so provide an area where they can dig and reinforce their behaviour in that area. A sandpit where you bury bones or a compost where you can dig in the vegetable scraps and the dog will help you turn it over. My brother had a shorthaired Border Collie who buried everything and every night they would come home from work to find shoes and other articles were missing and buried, even the food bowl was buried on a daily basis. At one stage he tied the food bowl to a post to prevent the dog from moving it, came home and found it still tied, but under a pile of dirt. The garden was in dire straights. He then built a compost area and encouraged the dog to dig there and then left around things that he was allowed to bury and it worked like a treat.

A WADING POOL

Some dogs adore water so why not encourage it. You can purchase shallow moulded plastic children's pools quite cheaply or alternatively make your own pond. Ensure that the dog can easily get out of the

pond and that it is just paddling depth, then drop some toys or treats even vegetables such as carrot pieces which will float and encourage the dog to play. An alternative would be to drop the same floating goodies or toys in the dogs water bucket. In hot weather I often drop apples in the horses trough so they can bob for them and the Welsh Mountain pony has figured out to push them to the side of the trough so he can bite them.



THE KONG

Many of you would be very familiar with the Kong, a marvellous piece of equipment available from good pet product suppliers which can be stuffed with food and left for the dog to work on during the day. Be aware though with multiple dogs that using food games may cause some problems

THE BUSTER CUBE

The Buster Cube is another great invention available from good pet product suppliers, you can place dry food into the opening and the dog has to roll it around to get them out again. Some dogs take all day and some take five minutes! Suitable for most breeds, but there are a very few that have the jaw strength and capacity to destroy these. (I have no doubt you already know if you own one of these dogs!) Some dogs need to learn how to use a Buster Cube so a smear of peanut butter or cheese near the opening as well as a cheer squad often gets them going.

A TREASURE HUNT

Can be lots of fun, leave the dog in the house (somewhere he can't cheat by peeking) and hide food and treats around the yard, digging some in, placing some under other articles so he can discover things all during the day.

THE OLD SWINGING TYRE

It amazes me when people hang up a tyre from a tree and expect the dog to play with it, it amazes me even more when they do! Not being one to leave things to chance I place toys or treats in the tire to ensure the dog is interested and gets some reward for the game. Make sure that what you hang it from can take the weight of the dog as well as the abuse and also that the dog cannot get caught up in it and become injured.

THE TERMINATOR

Give the dog something to destroy, a soft toy can be purchased cheaply from a fete or op shop (beware of plastic eyes and stuffing contents), a cardboard box can be great fun to destroy and has the bonus of providing you with exercise picking up the pieces afterwards. Be careful though with dogs which may ingest foreign materials.

THE BUSYBODY

There are dogs in this world as with people that just love knowing what's going on - so help them out. Peepholes in the fence or a raised viewing platform may be just what the doctor has ordered.

Training your dog to be socially acceptable opens a whole new world of environmental enrichment as it allows him to join in your family and social activities.

"Safety Tips (Kids & Pets)"

Teaching your children basic safety tips around pets can protect them in many ways. A child that is growled at, or bitten at a young age will usually develop and retain a fear of animals. Without the proper basic instruction, children may become injured and afraid of pets for the rest of their lives. The first step in helping protect your children is to get obedience training for your dog, which will help you, control your pet around children. Then teach your children the tips below that experts suggest all children be taught at a young age. These tips will help your child enjoy, respect, and understand your pet's behaviour.

- Let your dog or cat eat without being disturbed. Explain to your children that cats and especially dogs can become defensive around the food dish. Do not sneak up on, or put your hand near the bowl when the pet is eating.
- Some dogs are very attached to their balls and toys. Never take a toy or bone from a dog's mouth unless the dog is willing to drop it. If the dog is unwilling to drop the toy tell your children to have an adult get the toy.
- Show your children how to pet an animal nicely. Do not pull the animal's tail, ears, poke their eyes or throw things at them. Teach them animals are not toys.
- Never sneak up on a pet. If frightened, dogs and cats can become defensive, and pet birds can injure themselves. Approach the cat, dog, or pet from the front with your hands visible and speak in a low soothing voice. Don't allow children to play any "hide and seek" or "sneak up on the pet" games.
- Show your children how to observe body language. Tell your children that since dogs and cats can't talk, they communicate by using body language. Dogs that have their tail up, ears back, hair standing, are barking, growling, or showing teeth, are all signs that the dog is being bothered and should not be confronted. Cats that have their hair standing, tail stiff, ears back, are hissing, and have dilated eyes are signs that they are being bothered, and should not be confronted. Tell your children if they are ever face to face with a dog showing these signs to not scream, run or stare into the animal's eyes. Tell them if they run, the dog will usually chase and may attack. Always walk away slowly with no fast movements while avoiding any eye contact with the dog. Be sure your
- **Do not invade a dog's space.** Tell your children to never stick their hand in a car window, pickup truck bed, or dog pen. The dog might bite to defend his territory or snap at your child after being awakened suddenly.

children know to immediately tell an adult if a dog, cat or other type of animal ever bites them.


- Do not get near or try to stop two dogs from fighting. They might become more excited if they are yelled at or separated. Tell them to get an adult to help.
- Teach your children to wash their hands after playing with any animal or pet. Children can pick up worms from dogs and cats. The eggs of the worms are transferred when a child puts his hand his mouth. Turtles and reptiles are carriers of salmonella and other bacteria.

Safety Tips (Kids & Pets) continued

Try to discourage your children from letting pets lick their face. While children are more likely to become infected with worms or some type of bacteria by putting their hands in their mouth, it is still wise to tell your children to not let animals lick their face.

• Tell your children to always ask for the owner's permission to pet an unknown dog or cat. Some dogs and cats are afraid of children, some might be sick or injured, and some dogs might be working dogs for the handicapped. There may be a number of reasons the pet should not be approached. Once they have permission from the dog's owner, they should then approach the pet slowly, allowing the dog or cat to smell their scent, and then pet the animal.
