
CANTEEN MANAGER'S REPORT

I do hope everyone has a safe and happy Christmas season and that you all return next year with a firm resolution to succeed. Please everyone, watch out for snakes and also check your dogs for


grass seeds regularly and don't feed them rich foods or chocolates even when you over-indulge during the festive season.



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How we got our CDX

Craig Walter and "Riana"

Feeling frustrated, annoyed, had enough of that dog not doing what it should be doing. Don't give up on your dog or yourself. Its amazing how well dogs can cope with whatever is put in front of them.

Our Open training started at the end of 1999, we started Trialling in the year 2001 and we got our first pass on the 11/11/01 with a score of 171, things were looking good. My thought was she could only get better, I was thinking CDX by mid 2002, or so I thought. How wrong I was! We went the whole year without a pass, Trial after Trial she thought it would be fun to fail on different things. One Trial she decided to drop on her Sit Stays. At 2 other Trials she must have been very lonely, on her Drop Stay she came looking for me. The funny thing was she stayed in her Drop position and crawled to the edge of the ring before the Judge stopped her. Other Trials she just heeled badly or wouldn't go over the High Jump or Broad Jump. Come to think of it, it was something different at each Trial. For the last 12 months she was failing on her heelwork, it was getting very frustrating.

In June/July this year we got come very bad news. One Sunday morning Lisa went to let Riana in and found her left eye red and yucky so I took her to the Vet. We both thought she had scratched her eye. For the next 2 days I kept taking her back to the Vet so he could put drops in and to see if it was getting better.

On Wednesday the Eye Specialist saw her. One look and he said the eye was dead. She went blind in 3 days. The cause was Glaucoma and the other eye has it too. He said the eye would be painful and should come out. Her eye was removed at the end of June.

Two weeks after the operation we entered Geelong Trial (12/7/03). I couldn't get the Saturday off work so Helen Read worked her for me. Although she failed to get a pass, Helen was pleased with the way she worked. I worked her on the Sunday and she got 181 points, 2nd in the ring and Highest Scoring Geelong Member. So we entered Altona's back-to-back Trial (19/10/03). She failed in the morning, my fault, a crooked throw over the High Jump and after picking up the dumbbell the jump was on her blind side and she ran around it. Pass and Title in the afternoon with 185 and 2nd in the ring.

We had already entered Werribee (25/10/03, so we went along to see some friends and to tell them that Riana had her Title. I went into the ring with not a care if I passed or not, it turned out that it was the best we worked together, she got 192, 1st in the ring and Highest Scoring Geelong Member

So, since her little mishap she got 3 passes in 3 months and she is still doing the things she loves. I am looking forward to our new challenges ahead in the UD ring.

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The secret of a happy recall

What every owner would like to see. Jackie Krieger & Cacky Vincent of Dew Drop Inn Dog Training

Every dog owner would like to have a happy, tongue-lolling, speedy recall. However, you don't see a great recall often because the secret of teaching a great recall seems elusive. But the truth is that there is no secret – it simply takes hard work, dedication, love, and mutual respect to create a great recall.

I say "create" because I consider a recall a work of living art. To get a dog to stop doing anything and everything it is doing and run back to you as if it can't get there fast enough will make your heart skip a beat. Once you get a recall like this, you will never again have a dog that isn't trained to that level.

We're not going to teach "come" from a sit-stay or teach perfect square sit-in-front. Obedience competition recalls are set-ups and have nothing to do with real life.

When do you really want your dog to come to you? In my mind, he should come to save his life. How do you feel when all you see are rear legs flying towards the street to get to the bunny on the other side? Pretty sick, huh? This is the time you pray that training time has been effective and shout out a very controlled "Come!" Or you panic. This is the time you want your dog to slide to a stop, wheel around to look at you and willingly leave whatever she was thinking about doing to run back to you – to see what Mom or Dad wants to do!

Sound impossible? It's not, but don't lie to yourself about how well you trained your dog to come. It's your dog's life you are gambling with. Be safe – be honest with yourself. If you haven't put in daily time teaching your dog "come" from the first day you brought him home, you haven't trained enough.

Now that I've burst your bubble and depressed you, let's start with The Bare Necessities of a recall

Relationship

You must have a good relationship with your dog so he enjoys being with you. It's not what you think is enjoyable, but what your dog thinks is enjoyable. He should feel completely safe and at ease when you are around. After all, you are the supreme bearer of all good doggie things. So be honest; don't get your hackles up, just answer the questions.

- Have you ever called your dog to discipline, bath, or do toenails?
- Have you said, "come" in a cranky, embarrassed tone of voice because she was flaunting your underwear on the front lawn for the neighbours to see?

If you can answer yes to any similar question, you have lots of work to do. On the positive side, your dog thinks you are the supreme bearer of all great doggie things! You have everything at your disposal to create a great relationship with your dog – food, water, treats, petting, games, toys, playing with other dogs or people, shade, warmth, swimming, being silly, etc., etc. Use them all to show your dog she is wonderful, she is right, and she needs to depend on you for everything.

A strong bond of communication can be created with these tools – not just a one-way person-to-dog bond, but a dog-to-person bond as well.

"Come"

Your dog should love the word "come." When she hears the word, she should think "I can check out that squirrel later because I surely don't want to miss what Mom's doing!"

If "come" has already soured, you can always change the word and the attitude. I know an Old English Sheepdog who turned into a bounding bundle of fun when he heard "free beer"!

HOW TO SCORE OFF YOUR OWNER AT OBEDIENCE TRAINING

Reprint from previous Newsletter-sent in by Val Moeller

If your owner does not already take you to Obedience Training, get your "Dog Appeal" working, or one of those things that make your owner think that you might be better if you were more obedient. If you haven't been to an Obedience Class you haven't lived. You meet girls, or if you are one, boys meet you!!

Your owner comes to learn to be a "Handler" (i.e. the stooge that you have on the end of the lead or just standing around with you). The first thing your handler does learn is that if you run away, it doesn't matter what you do as long as you come back, eventually, and sit down by him. You mustn't be punished because if you are punished you won't come back, see? Remember this AND YOU CAN GET AWAY WITH MURDER. Always go back to your handler when you are ready, sit by his side, look up innocently and just watch his blood pressure.

The tests, as you handler thinks they should be done, will bore you to death, but with your own variations you can play forever and score your own way.

EXERCISE 1 – Heel on lead – a bit of a grind. Hang your head and walk as slowly as you can, then without warning spring forward with all your might. If your handler falls flat on his face you score 25 points.

How to score off your owner at Obedience Training (continued)

EXERCISE 2 – Heel Free – anything goes, AND SO DO YOU, usually at least one other dog will run with you. You will be able to run faster so you will never be caught, but YOU CAN CATCH, if you please. If you are outdoors break off and attend to the wants of nature. This gives you an unbreakable alibi and will show your handler up as a cad who forgot to look after you before the training started. In your own time return to your handler, sit at his side with maddening precision and smile at him. You score 5 points for each minute of freedom.

EXERCISE 3 – Recall – handler walks off. Let him go, but when he turns and shouts at you, assume rock deafness, or show him how perfectly you can stay. Look anywhere you like but not at him. Later, if you see anything worth investigating go and investigate. In your own time go to your handler PREFERABLY CRINGING, with your ears laid back. This will convince the others that yours is a secret dog beater and he will loose face. On no account sit in front of your handler, as he will only make you move around him. Assume the heel position right away and look with indifference. If the handler looses his voice you score 25 points.

EXERCISE 4 – Retrieve the Dumbell – watch handler throw away a wooden dumbell with respectful interest. On no account fetch it back; he'll only throw it away again. If the silly so-and-so wants his bit of wood, let him fetch it back, you will be helping to train him not to throw things away that he really wants. Variations – run after the dumbell with enthusiasm, sniff it, smile at your handler and return smartly to base without it, he can't hit you. Repeat as often as handler wishes. You score 5 points every time handler retrieves dumbell.

EXERCISE 5 – Sit – on no account really sit. They always try to train you on wet, cold ground. The "Shepherd Squat" is quite good enough, you stay one inch from the ground at the back end. From this position you can spring away into your fastest speed with no hesitation. (See hints on "heel free") 5 points for each successful squat.

EXERCISE 6 – Down – here you have to lie down. With PRACTICE you can travel yards on your stomach to reach other competitors. If they move, pretend to think the exercise is over and leave too. (See hints on "heel free"). If you can remain out of handler's sight for 5 minutes you score 30 points.

<u>CONCLUSION</u> — without warning, do any exercise you choose, PERFECTLY. This will leave your handler thinking that earlier mistakes were his fault and the sucker will take you to training week after week. HAPPY SCORING.

"HOT DOGS"

Summertime... and the living is easy. Lounging around in singlets, shorts and thongs, sipping an icy cold drink and heading to the local pool for a refreshing dip.... it all sounds fine, unless you're a dog. Trapped in a long coat, left out in the sun and besieged by pesky little critters, summer can be hell for dogs, if their owners don't look out for them.

BACK TO BASICS

While some lucky dogs get to spend summer days flopped inside an air-conditioned house, most are confined to the backyard. Two things are absolutely vital for every dog left in this situation - shade and water!

In direct sunlight dogs are at risk of heatstroke. There must be shade in the yard throughout the day, whether under a verandah or a tree. And dogs should never be tied up on a hot day, as they may not be able to move to get out of the sun.

A constant supply of clean, fresh water is necessary for dogs all year round, but it's more important than ever in the summer. If your dog is the energetic type who has been known to tip over bowls, try buying a solid, heavyweight water bowl or one of the non-skid variety with a rubber base. To make doubly sure your dog will have water all day, leave two bowls out, so even if one is tipped

over, there's still one left. Self-waterers are another idea. The Mister Dew Drop pet fountain, sold at Pet World Stores, is a bowl that connects to the garden hose so the water supply won't run out.

Dogs tend to eat less in hot weather because they're exercising less. If the food you give your dog is likely to go off in the heat, try to make sure it doesn't sit around for too long.

PLAYING IT SAFE

Some dogs love to play so much that they would be begging you to throw the ball for them if the mercury was bubbling out of the top of the thermometer. But even if your dog seems keen, you should be careful not to exercise it too much in hot weather. This doesn't mean hanging up the leash for three months, but the timing and the type of exercise are important.

Try to avoid exercising your dog in the heat of the day, as this is a common cause of heatstroke. As well, dogs being walked over hot surfaces such as footpaths and sand can burn the pads of their paws. If the surface is too hot for you to touch, it's probably too hot for your dog to walk on.



Early morning and early evening are the best times of day to take your dog for a walk during hot weather. It's also good to give your dog a drink along the way and the fold-up bowls you can carry in your pocket (available by mail order through Mikmac and Canine Company) make this simple.

IN THE SWIM

Swimming is a great way to exercise you dog and help to keep cool in summer. People assume that all dogs are natural swimmers – or dogpaddlers – but supervision is still needed. Some breeds, such as Labradors and Golden Retrievers will take to the water more easily than others.

If your dog is swimming for the first time, make it a gradual introduction. Get into the shallow water your self and encourage your dog to join you. You might like to have another dog there that has swum before, so your dog can follow its example.

Remember, dogs can drown. More dogs drown in private swimming pools than children. Puppies and older dogs are especially at risk, but even dogs that are strong swimmers can drown if they can't get out of the water. This is a particular danger in irrigation channels as well as pools.

Check that the water your dog is swimming in is safe. Beware of strong tides and currents, and watch out for pollution such as blue-green algae, which can be toxic for dogs.

Rinse off your dog after swimming in the sea or in any type of water, if it has sensitive skin. And don't let your dog drink too much seawater – it can be poisonous in large quantities.

If you want your dog to swim in complete safety, you may want to visit one of the swimming pools for dogs. You could also buy a small plastic paddling pool for your yard. Turning the sprinkler on for your dog is another cool idea

PARKING PROBLEMS

The image from the RSPCA's TV commercial is difficult to forget, the dog dazed and suffering after its owner leaves it in a parked car on a warm day. The campaign has done a lot to raise awareness of the dangers of this practice, which is the number one cause of heatstroke in dogs.

Temperatures rise rapidly in parked cars. Even on mild days, when the outside temperature is in the low twenties, the sun beating down on a car can lift the inside temperature to above 50 degrees in a short time.

Leaving the windows slightly open isn't enough, and if the windows are wound down completely the dog could jump out and get run over or lost. Try to avoid taking your dog with you in the car if you're planning to go anywhere dogs aren't welcome.

SHORT CUTS

Short for the summer is the preferred style for many longhaired, woolly and curly-coated breeds of dog. having their coats clipped short means they will deal with the heat better and can be more active over the summer months. The added bonus is that it will help reduce problems with burrs and fleas.

Shorter doesn't always mean cooler. For breeds such as the Siberian Husky the double coat has an insulating effect and protects the dog from heat as well as cold. But these breeds can shed a lot and you will need to brush regularly to remove dead hair.

SUN SMART

Just as we have leant to apply the slip-slop-slap rule to ourselves, some of us also need to apply it to our dogs. Dogs can get sunburnt and develop skin cancer. Most at risk are those with white skin, especially Bull Terriers and Dalmatians.

Owners of these dogs should take the same precautions as parents would with children – use sunscreen on them (Filtabac is a zinc-based cream developed for animals) and limit the time they spend in the sun. Baseball caps as well as looking cute, offer extra protection, while all-over Lycra body suits, manufactured by Sydney Company Hotdogs, may be the best solution for dogs that are most at risk.

GETTING AWAY

Holidaying with dogs can be fun for both you and them, but to avoid any unpleasant confrontations, it's best to check ahead to find out which places allow dogs. An increasing number of accommodation venues are providing for dogs as well as their owners, and several publications, including the "Life be in it" Holidaying with Dogs Guide will help you with this. Local councils are a good source of information about which beaches and parks allow dogs.

When driving long distances, make plenty of stops so your dog can stretch its legs and have a drink of water. Take everything your dog might need with you, such as bedding and towels, and make sure there are appropriate contact details attached to its collar. Find out where the nearest vet is so you're prepared in emergencies.

New products on the market could help make your trip even better. Dog shoes such as those made by Sydney's *Animate* and distributed through pet stores, could protect paws from being cut while hiking over rough ground, while dog carriers (sold by mail order through *Canine Company*) make it possible for your pet to go with you, even if it is too frail to walk far.

If out camping, be careful of where you tie up you dog. Make sure it can't get tangled in branches, run over or trapped in the heat of the sun as the shade moves.

LITTLE CRITTERS

Summer means flea season, as the warm weather and humidity trigger the hatching of flea pupae which may have been lurking around your house for months or even years. New treatments are now available which are highly effective in attacking all stages of the flea life cycle and making it possible for your dog to be flea-free. You will also need to treat your dog's bedding and perhaps the whole house. Your vet will be able to help you out with advice on which products to use.

HOT DOGS by Helen Vnuk (continued)



Ticks are also more of a danger in warmer weather, especially with people traveling to areas where ticks are widespread. These include bushland areas along the eastern seaboard (Paralysis Tick) and Western Australia (Brown Dog Tick). You'll need to check your dog daily and use preventatives available from your vet.

And don't forget the life-threatening heartworm, which is transmitted by mosquitoes. Dogs should be on monthly or daily preventatives for this.

Summer can be a great time of year for dogs, with the chance to spend more time with their owners and go on holidays or to the beach. But it's up to owners whether summer means fun in the sun or just plain misery.





ou've imagined what Christmas will be like with your dogs. They'll be perfectly behaved, greet your friends and family with a gently paw shake and a smile, and will sit quietly while Christmas dinner feeds the clan. But in reality, Christmas can be a chaotic times for your dogs and before you know it, they will have chomped their way through the ornaments, eaten the entire Christmas pudding and brought up their Christmas dinner all over the pressies.

Instead of enjoying the holidays, you could be left cleaning up a lot of mess - or worse, heading for the nearest vet clinic to remove your mother-in-law's perfect gift from the inside of your dog's bloated

Christmas Hazards

Problem: Fairy Lights

Dogs can tangle themselves in the lights, eat them (the lights often contain moderately toxic ingredients), or chew through the cords and electrocute themselves.

Solution:

The best way to keep lights away from your pooch is to wrap them through the interior of the tree, high enough so your dog can't reach. The cords are best run underneath the skirt of the tree, hidden from the dog.

Problem: Baubles and Tinsel

Vets report an increase in emergency surgery around Christmas time because dogs attempt to eat the enticing looking tinsel from the Christmas tree. Ingestion of tinsel can cause bowel blockages and make your dog sick. Ornaments are also a danger as eating them can cause choking and blockages. Solution:

Make sure you hang ornaments high in the tree out of reach of your dog, along with the tinsel. Supervise you dog around tinsel or ribbon.

Problem: Artificial Snow

This is toxic to dogs

Solution:

Spray in areas inaccessible to dogs, like on the tops of windows and the higher parts of the Christmas tree. Remove the spray can immediately and place out of reach of canine paws.

Problem: Candles

These make wonderful decorative pieces but make sure you keep them out of reach of dogs. Not only is there the danger of your dog being burnt, but it could

accidentally knock them over in Yuletide excitement and start a fire in the house.

Solution:

Try using hanging candles, which can be placed out of reach of your dog and only light the candles when the guests have arrived and are settled.

Problem: Guests

When all the family and friends arrive for Christmas dinner, your dog may be overwhelmed by all the sudden noise and activity.

Solution:

Introduce your dog to the guests and ensure young children know how to correctly approach and pat it. Ask your guests not to feed the dog because even if each person only gives the dog a titbit, by the end of the night it may have consumed an extraordinary amount of food. You should also make sure there is a quiet "time out" spot where your dog can go to escape the crowds.

Problem: Food

Christmas fare will be too rich for dogs and can add to problems like hyperactivity and stomach upsets, not to mention obesity.

Solution:

Make sure food is not left unattended when it's out of the fridge. And remember, chocolate can be seriously toxic to dogs. Dogs don't digest it well and it's bad for their teeth. We could also be "treating" our dog to a rare but deadly condition called chocolate toxicosis, cause by the substance theobromine. Although rare this condition is fatal.

Problem: The Presents

Some kids' toys with small parts can be dangerous if ingested by your dog. And presents containing food can easily be sniffed out by Fido's sensitive snout.

If your dog is sniffing around the tree, remove the presents to a safe area.

Problem: Alcohol

Alcohol can be toxic – especially for small dogs – and can cause poisoning and can even lead to a dog falling into a coma.

Solution:

Lay down a few house rules with the guests, and when things get a little rowdy, put your dog in the quiet part of the house.



Christmas Canine Cookies

Christmas Dog Biscuits

Ingredients:

1 3/4 cups wholemeal flour

2 tablespoons freshly chopped garlic

½ cup cornflour

2 rashers bacon, chopped

1 teaspoon stock

8 tablespoons sunflower oil ³/₄ cup water

Method:

Mix ingredients together well and roll out the mixture until it is about two centimetres thick. Cut out designs with Christmas cookie cutters and place in oven. Baste with a small amount of oil or bacon fat and cook for 35 to 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Allow to cool. Garnish with desiccated coconut or fresh parsley then place in Christmas bags or boxes lined with foil. Seal bags to keep in freshness. Give them to friends with dogs or store them away ready for your own pooch to enjoy as a delightful Christmas morning treat

WEEKEND TASK FOR THE HANDYPERSON - DOG'S BED

Mainly suitable for small and medium dogs Reprinted courtesy of Tonia Todman, "Healthy, Wealthy and Wise"

Dogs and cats have a habit of finding various places, such as the good lounge suite, to doze off and get away with it. However, we all know it is best for our pampered pets to have a specific bed which is designed with their comfort and health in mind. As Tonia Todman showed, it is remarkably easy to build a bed that does just that.

The Frame:

By using PVC plumpers' pipe, you can build a bed that keeps your pet warm, dry and off the ground. The pipe, cogether with the variety of fittings, can be bought from any plumbing supply shop.

Cut 4 main frame pieces (the length is up to you), 8 leg pieces approximately 12cm long and 8 connecting pieces which are 3cm long. These can all be cut with a fret saw, hen using a steel brush smooth the cut ends. As for the ittings, you'll need 4 "L" shaped corner pieces and 8 "T" shaped leg holders.

Begin constructing the frame by inserting the small connecting pieces into the "L" corners which will in turn allow the "T" pieces to connect to the corners. (Diagram 1). Yext insert the 8 leg pieces vertically into the "T" pieces. Then set all your corners upside down on a large surface the legs pointing skyward) and insert the four main pieces o complete the frame.

f your pet is considered large and heavy, you simply einforce the frame with extra piping and fittings. You will equire 8 extra of both the leg pieces and connecting pieces and also buy 8 extra "T" shaped leg holders. Attach the extra connecting and "T" pieces to the original "T" piece and you will have 4 legs on each side of the bed, making 16 n total. (Diagram 2)

he Fabric Bed:

Inder the complete and still upside down frame, place a trge piece of paper to draw and cut the bed pattern. Diagram 3). The pipe casing which covers the main apport pieces equals the circumference of the pipe, plus cm to accommodate for the slack.

onia chose a strong cotton corduroy fabric which has no retch to it and then cut out 2 pieces of fabric from around 1e paper design. Stitch them together inside out, making 1re to leave an opening to turn out the right way, then itch it closed






The gift of a dog is not just for a season. We had gotten the pup for all the wrong reasons.


In our haste to think of the kids a gift There was one important thing that we missed.

And I heard him exclaim as he rode out of sight,


