
TEACHING SELF CONTROL *by Suzanne Clothier*

Does your dog pull on lead when someone approaches? when he sees another dog? if joggers run by? if children are playing? if a cat or squirrel dash through the yard? Is he hard to control at the vet's or groomer's? when people come into your house?

If the answer to any of these questions is yes, chances are your dog needs to learn **self control**. Just as children must learn to control their impulses before they can mature into responsible adults, dogs must learn self control before they can become well mannered canine citizens. Self control must be taught, just as you teach him to sit or speak or come when called.

Every owner can teach his dog self control by following these guidelines:



- ❖ Train, don't restrain. Taking a firm grip on the leash and collar teaches the dog nothing except that you can restrain him. Instead, give a simple command, such as sit, reminding with the lead if needed, then loosen the lead so there is no tension at all. If the dog breaks position, quietly and slowly reposition him, and loosen the lead again.
- Ask for compliance, not submission. View working with your dog as you would working with any friend. Avoid creating a struggle by asking the dog for more than he can do at the time. For example, if your dog is really excited, he may be unable or unwilling to lay down, but agreeable to sitting quietly with a few reminders from you. Compromise and be reasonable most struggles between dog and owner are created when the owner attempts to dominate the dog, instead of finding a solution acceptable to both

owner and dog.

- ❖ Remember the dog does not know what his options are. A dog who is lacking self control simply does not know that it is possible to sit quietly in the face of distractions. It is the owner's responsibility to show the dog that he has options other than lunging, pulling or leaping around.
- ❖ Move slowly and talk quietly. A dog who is highly excited needs calm, slow handling. A common mistake owners make is to move quickly, grabbing at the leash and collar, raising their voice and speaking in short, sharp tones. From the dog's point of view, the owner appears as Teaching Self Control (continued)

excited as they are, and short sharp tones often sound like barking. Instead of calming the dog, this *reinforces* his excitement. By moving slowly and talking quietly, the owner sends a clear message to the dog that he is not excited and is in control of the situation.

- * Remind and ask, don't demand. A dog who is already excited is likely to resist a harsh correction or respond by becoming more excited. "Ask" by using the lightest possible touch on the leash and collar, and remind the dog what he's doing each time he forgets and shifts position.
- Work on teaching self control in all situations. Begin by working in distraction free areas, and ask your dog to sit on a loose leash for five minutes. Gradually move on to more exciting situations, and practice often. Work at home, at friends' homes, in parks, shopping centers, at dog shows, training classes and the veterinarian's. As your dog's self control and respect for you increases, you can add laying down quietly for up to 30 minutes to his skills.

A reminder to Members - If you would like to try something new, why not join in with Peter Baker and his

Below is a **CHOICE** roadtest of 12 retractable dog leads - done after a particular retractable dog lead caused a very serious eye injury to a young girl. Action is now being taken to ban that particular brand of lead. If you know of anyone using the offending lead below, it may be worth passing on this information. The recommendation from **CHOICE** is to throw it out if you already have one.



Retractable Dog Leads

Some dog leads can be downright dangerous. Online 11/06

Nothing out of the ordinary had led up to the terrible, life-changing injury nine-year-old Louise Hiatt of Caravonica, Queensland, suffered last January. She'd been walking the family's dachshund when the dog responded to another dog's barking with a pull on the lead — a very typical reaction, as any dog owner would confirm.

But what happened next shouldn't have happened. The **metal clasp** of the retractable dog lead **snapped in half** and, with its jagged edge, went flying back **straight into her eye**, causing major damage.


"I'd just hate this to happen to someone else," Louise's mother, Michelle Hiatt, told us later. "It's not like a cut that'll leave her with a scar on the leg — she's still in danger of losing her eye; she has no sight in that eye; she's lost all her iris; the lens is gone; there's scarring across the cornea. Nothing our daughter did contributed to the accident. The lead had hardly been used and was in good condition. She

was using it properly and wasn't doing anything silly."


How much danger?

Concerned about the **strength** and **durability** of

retractable dog







leads, we checked out various shops in Sydney and bought a selection for testing. We wanted to find out whether there's an inherent danger in this type of leash or whether it was this particular brand's design or manufacturing quality that led to its metal clasp failing.

We bought 12 different retractable dog leads, including the WOOFAZ PA0087B, whose clasp had snapped in half, injuring Louise. Nine months after the incident, it was still available for sale. We tested the dog leads to a maximum force of **500 N**, which is equivalent to an average-size (20 kg) dog pulling two-and-a-half times its weight, a force that smaller, weaker people would have problems resisting.

Most of the brands that passed our strength test cost around \$20-\$50; they're listed below. The \$4 PET HAVEN Dog Lead Retractable 21657054 broke just under our maximum force at 469 N (the

stitching gave way). But the \$2 WOOFAZ Retractable Dog Leash PA0087B again failed miserably. Its metal clasp broke at 135 N and a second lead's clasp also failed at 156 N.

Our advice

Don't buy a WOOFAZ retractable dog lead. Throw it out if you're already using one. We've brought the matter to the attention of the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC), which has taken action to ban the product. See our <u>media release</u>

If you want to use a retractable dog lead, the brands that passed our test should withstand the steady pull of an average-size dog. We didn't test every dog lead on the market, but we did test a wide selection from several shops.

Choose one with a **sturdy**, **heavy clasp**, but be aware of the damage it can do if it should ever break and fly back at your face. So use it with utmost care, especially if your dog is jerking at the other end. Never use one that's rated lower than the **weight of your dog** or that has **no size or weight rating** at all.





CANINE COOKERY

LIVER CAKE

This cake is definitely not one to serve to friends for morning tea, but your dog will love it.

Ingredients:

1 Butter Cake Mix 1 Liver Some Garlic A Couple of Eggs



Blend the liver in a blender or food processor. Mix it with the Cake mixture made to directions on the packet. Add the extra eggs and garlic. Cover a baking dish with foil, spray on non-stick cooking spray, pour the mixture into the baking dish. Bake at 180 degrees for approximately 45 minutes.

Remove from the oven and cut slits through the cake to allow air in. Return cake to the oven, which should now be turned off or very low, so cake can dry out slighty. Cooking time will vary depending on size of liver.


The puppies all have gone to bed We've come to end of day I'd like to go to sleep as well But Roger wants to play.

BLASTING THE DOMINANCE AGGRESSION MYTH

By Helen Read

What is DOMINANCE? It is a concept use to describe the animal's ability to maintain and regulate access to desired resources. It is not synonymous with status.

INTERACTION between Dominant and a Subordinate animal involves withdrawal of the submissive animal and not necessarily aggression by the dominant animal.

What is Dominant Behaviour? A dominant animal is self assured, confident and has no need for threats. Dominant people and animals don't have to resort to aggression as their followers WANT to do what they suggest. The same cannot be said for members in the chain of command as they vie for position.



Managing a Dominant Dog

DO NOT – punish, confront, alpha roll or scruff, push out of the way or use aversive training equipment such as the check chain or shock collars.

INSTEAD – control the resources, be in charge of the things that are important to the dog – food, toys, play, touching, company, freedom.

Ask don't order.

Reward compliance with a resource the dog desires.

Be a leader yourself.

Use a head halter in potentially confrontational situations.

WHAT IS THE RESULT OF THESE MANAGEMENT TECHNIQUES?

The dog is still confident, but his confidence is in himself and his owner and he is keen to please the owner because the owner is the source of his FUN!

What is AGGRESSION? The appropriate or inappropriate threat or challenge that is resolved by combat or deference (Overall 1997).

Stages of Aggression

Display – Stand off – Displacement behaviour. It is difficult to categorize aggression as there is often an overlap. Categories do not take into consideration the environmental conditions.

- Fear Aggression
- Protective Aggression
- Inter-dog Aggression
- Territorial Aggression
- Possessive Aggression
- Redirected Aggression
- Play Aggression
- Pain Aggression
- Idiopathic Aggression we don't know what causes it
- Maternal Aggression

Predatory Behaviour

Behaviour is not aggression? Why?

- it is an instinctive behaviour
- no warning
- intensity is often breed specific

What is **DOMINANCE AGGRESSION?** Dominance Aggression is an abnormal inappropriate, out of context aggression that is

manifested by dogs towards people when the "resource" is access to control (Overall 1997).

Blasting the Dominance Aggression Myth (continued)

Many trainers ascribe any aggressive display towards an owner as dominance aggression. Dogs displaying dominance aggression are not necessarily dominant dogs.

Control of Aggression.

Work out what you want to achieve and if this is feasible.

Options with Aggression

- Tolerate
- Train
- Manage
- Rehome
- Euthanise

Training to Reduce Aggression

Find out the triggers for the aggression and isolate the dog from the trigger initially and remember that every aggressive event increases the chance of a repeat.

Train an alternative behaviour, starting in an environment free of distractions. Gradually add low level distraction. If the owner cannot keep the dog's attention he is pushing on too fast.

Return to the original situation where the aggression is likely to occur and starting far away; practice the alternative behaviour and keep the dog's attention. Gradually get closer as you succeed in focusing the dog on yourself and rewarding non reactive behaviour.

INSPITE of training and management, the probability of an aggressive response has been reduced but NEVER eliminated.

AGGRESSION is natural in all dogs. Owners need to control the context and the motivation.



Monlaird Poseidon HT (Sebastian)



HEATSTRESS

Oxford Everydog – E Allen and R Blogg, 1998

If a dog becomes overheated he will

become extremely uncomfortable and the condition can progress to the point where the dog collapses and may die.

Dogs loose heat by panting. Panting has the same cooling effect that humans achieve through sweating. (Dogs cannot sweat except through their foot pads.) If the build up of heat is faster than the rate at which the dog can control himself by panting, then his body temperature rises and heat stress begins. Dogs that have been bred for short noses, such as the English Bulldog, Pekingese and Pug have a seriously reduced ability to pant. A dog of a short-nosed breed is more likely to die if kept in a car in the hot summer sun. Old and very young dogs are also especially susceptible to heat stress.

The first sign of heat stress is panting. This panting becomes very rapid and the dog will appear to be in a stupor. The heart rate (or pulse) will become very rapid and the gums will turn bright red. The legs and head become hot to the touch and there may be watery or blood-stained diarrhea. Eventually the dog collapses and may loose consciousness. Death may follow.

Treatment:

First get the dog into fresh, cooler air, then cool him further by submerging him in a cold bath, or by playing a cold stream of water over his head and body for a few minutes. If necessary, repeat. Get the dog to a vet for treatment to stop swelling of the brain (cerebral oedema).

To prevent heat stress:

- Avoid confinement in a hot place, such as a car. A dog left in a closed car on a hot day is in great danger of developing heat stress. It is not enough to leave the window open a little dogs simply must *not* be left for more than a short time in a hot, closed car or small shed.
- See that inside ventilation is good, especially on days of high humidity.
- In very hot climates, it is wise to select a breed with normal length of mouth and face as dogs with flat faces are more prone to heat stress.

Confinement and lack of water are the two major factors in heat stress.
