

TRAINING SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

Hi everyone, we have been back a month and the main issue has been the weather with the extreme hot days. Again there have been reports of dogs left in cars. Heat stress in dogs is not nice and often leads to collapse and death. If it is not necessary for you to take your dog then leave them at home with plenty of water and shade.

Each month I will be adding a few tips on dog management, this month the topic is heat stress. Signs to look for- Heavy panting (mouth wide open, tongue fully exposed)

- dog will trying to get maximum intake of fresh air
- unstable on feet
- wet print from sweating out of pads
- Collapse, eyes unfocussed. (this is extreme stress)

If your dog shows any of these signs on a warm day, be sure to only let them drink small amounts of water, if they take it. Place dog in cool water up to their belly or get them to lay down on a cool towel in the shade or inside and of course if you are concerned call you Vet.

Over the next couple of months we will be having weekends where there is no training due to Labour Day and Easter. Take note of what your Instructor tells you and keep practicing. April's Promotion Day will appear in no time.

In June we will be having a Workshop with Steve Austin. Keep an eye out for the flyer with all details.

Finally, Good Luck to everyone entering trials over the next month.



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

- 9. Heat Policy was discussed. VCA has NOT set rules. Common sense should prevail. The Training Supervisor can curtail training or it can be done on the day.


As there was no further business the Meeting closed 9.02pm.

LIBRARY NEWS

Our generous donor of fifty breed and training books has replied to the personal thankyou card I sent him. Because of his enormous knowledge of dogs I think he would be a marvellous keynote speaker at an Instructor's Inservice Day.

He is currently researching pit bulls, staffords and bulldogs. David Archer is a canine researcher who spends - in his own words - "a lot of time (and money) researching". He is a valuable human resource and we need to sequester his involvement with our Club.

Yes, I have read all of his books - and gained an enormous knowledge of dogs I had vaguely heard of but had never bothered to pursue their genetics, their history or temperament.

The collection on the Spitz breeds is absolutely brilliant reading. When you tie this into books about Wolves and Wild Dogs, the connection is so clear.

Why ever did I not think of this before.

The Geographical range of the Spitz/wolf breeds is incredible. Across the northern regions - America/China/Japan, the People of the Deer in Alaska, and then it spreads southwards and as the dogs move into warmer climates they become smaller but are still recognised as Spitz breeds. Call them if you like - mini wolves. Altered by the need to welcome a small Spitz into a family home while retaining the guarding temperament.

Their coats were altered for cosmetic concerns - for colour and texture. Their bodies became shorter coupled - because they were fed by humans they no longer needed the length of loin and strongly angulated hindquarters to hunt or pull a sled.

They retained the depth of chest. A dense double coat BUT a skull that was short haired. Over time the angulation of the eyes was altered to become more forward looking and that breeding changed the structure of the skull to accommodate the new eye position.



All members should be aware of the need for canine social skills before, during and after Class. Your dogs are your responsibility and canine etiquette and lifestyle skills are just another part of the learning process.

Don't make the mistake of assuming that because in your eyes, your canine companion is the most sociable creature going, that all dogs are the same. Or, that your sweet social companion is really the angel you imagine. By observing the social skills below your four-legged friend will become the welcome visitor, instead of the one you wish to avoid.

CAMME ETIQUETTE

- Not all dogs like the "in your face" attitude of other dogs. Having another dog bound at them face on and putting paws on the back are considered very bad manners in dog terms and usually result in an angry response, particularly from a more mature dog. Sadly, it is often the mature dog that is labeled an angry dog and one to be avoided, when all he/she is really saying is "where are your manners?"
- Not all dogs like their space invaded and some don't like the space of their handler invaded either, as they often feel the need to be protective, again resulting in an angry response.
- "Eye-balling: (the fixed stare) is also unacceptable behaviour, as this is seen as a challenge in dog terms and particularly if one or both dogs tense their body, rise up on their toes and generally make themselves look more threatening. Unless you are constantly aware of your dog's

behaviour these early signals can go unnoticed, resulting in two dogs lunging at each other. By being vigilant you can avoid these situations by turning your dog away, breaking the eye contact and giving him/her something to do like a sit, drop or stand and then rewarding for the attention he/she has paid to you.

• If you would like your dog to meet another dog, sit your dog beside you and ask the handler if it is okay, BEFORE releasing your dog to play. If the answer is "No" please respect the owners decision as there is probably a very good reason, which may not be obvious.

 Do not allow your dog to approach a dog that is tied up and unattended.

If you are talking, always be aware of what your dog is doing at the end of the lead. Often we become so involved in our own social activity that we forget that our four-legged friend has his or her own social activity going on at the same time at the end of the lead.



And as he trotted down the road 'twas beautiful to see His work at every corner Every post and every tree


He never missed a land mark

The hoop they'd put him through


They showed him all the piddling posts They knew about the town And off they set with many a wink To wear the stranger down

WALKING THE DOG

Do we really need an article on walking the dog I can hear you say. Well, my observations of people indicate that we certainly do. Many, many people do not seem to know how to 'walk' with their dog. We get some over-keen obedience people who will not let their dog relax. We get the other end of the scale, where the dog dictates where, when and how he will walk, and others who just 'walk beside their dog', who would just LOVE a little ATTENTON.

Let us take the first category. I have seen for myself and been told by other people, of obedience handlers, walking their dogs (always to heel), accompanied by such commands as 'watch me', 'pay attention', 'don't sniff', 'leave that', etc. The poor dog is never allowed to be a dog. I have had dogs in for training that have forgotten how to enjoy. They don't know how to play. Charlie Wyant, the greatest, always said, "a dog that doesn't know how to play, won't

work". Some dogs just have never learned to play and seem disinterested. John Rogerson tells us that dogs can be taught to play! Anyway, let's get back to the obedience fanatic who won't let their dog play, but trains all the time, even when going for a walk. This dog may win prizes. This dog may do well in an actual competition where it works like a robot. But has it got any quality of life? Does the Judge take into account the manner of working? Would the dog, perhaps, work better if at times it was allowed to sniff the ground and learn what is going on around him. Or allowed to show an interest in a low flying plane, or allowed to look at a cat, etc?

The other extreme is where the dog takes the handler for a walk. Stopping wherever it wants for as long as it wants, constantly sniffing and peeing, pulling the handler along or lagging so badly that it has to be pulled along. You do see some very sorry sights. The handler stops to talk to a friend, the dog like a spoiled child says 'come on' and the obedient, well-trained owner/parent obliges. Or the dog, no longer being the centre of

attraction, jumps on the other person (and we all know what co-operation we get from our friends. "Oh, that's OK. I've only got my old jeans on"). The dog, not only is allowed to sniff everywhere, it is also allowed to lick, thus putting itself in jeopardy.

The idea of course is somewhere between the Firstly, we can use a walk to be with our dog, to give him some QUALITY TIME. Don't just walk along with the dog at the end of a lead, thinking our own thoughts and the dog thinking his own thoughts. Once in a while stand still and just fondle the dog's head, at the same time lightly passing your hand over his nostrils. Let him take scent Every so often run backwards a from you. couple of paces, calling his name like you did when you trained for the recall. approaches you, run forward again, turning him in towards you in an anti-clockwise circle and run forward a few paces. This will not only motivate and excite him and thus help make the walk more enjoyable, it is also going to make your "left hand finish" faster and more accurate. Another fun thing you can do on your walk is to spin your dog in an anti-clockwise circle. Use the leash, either guiding his head, or on the outside of his left stifle (thigh) to turn him through the circle. I use the command "Left Circle" and the dog quickly responds to the command. Later on you can introduce "Right Circle". attention from you to the dog will increase the attention from dog to you. It will also increase the rapport between you. BUT, also give him time to do his own thing too.

We can use a walk for training purposes. We also have to acknowledge that a dog needs relaxation. The purpose of a walk is not so

(or just so) the dog can relieve itself. If you cannot train your dog to go to the toilet in your garden, then please pick up any solid material that he leaves in the street or elsewhere. We take him for a walk so that he can be a dog and investigate the environment. We, as humans, do this with our eyes. The dog does it with his nose. People look at pretty flowers, bright colours, etc. gets his pleasure by smelling the canine equivalents. He must be allowed to sniff to live a full life. That does not mean he must be allowed to sniff whenever he wants to. We must control it. He must not be allowed to pull on the lead. But – this does not mean he has to walk 'to heel' all the time. He can go out in front. He can go wide. He can lag, provided that he does not make the leash tight. He can look about him; watch the cat lurking on the doorstep, look at low flying helicopters. Don't we? He can observe the flies buzzing around in front of him, greet another friendly dog. And so on.

Yes, we can use the walk for training purposes. We can also help our ring work by showing the dog the difference between work and walk. When he is walking he can do anything he wants, within reason, other than pull on the lead. When he is working, he has to be attentive to the task in hand. It is when we take him for a walk that we can make him aware of the difference. Now when we go into a training class, or an obedience competition, he knows where he stands. This is all he really needs, TO KNOW WHERE HE STANDS. This requires consistency on our part.

As part of our walk, a small part, we can train. We can have the dog walk 'at heel' formally for thirty or forty yards at a time, say twice,





on a mile walk. We can practice turns. We can do short recalls on the lead. We can do We can get eye contact with the finishes. I suggest that while doing the dog sitting. training part of the walk, you do not do 'downs'. Too many downs, associated with can cause a lagging dog. However, 'downs' can be practiced during the walking part of the outing. We can use the relaxation of the dog to suddenly put in a 'down'. There is no need to shout but make your commands crisp. In this way, we can train for instant 'downs' and 'drops' on recall without affecting our heelwork. can also be practiced as part of the going for a When the dog is concentrating on walk. give suddenly something else. command, and if there is not a response within one second, he gets jerked towards Don't forget to praise or give other vou. rewards.

We do not have to stand about for hours while the dog sniffs at what to him must be something really fascinating. You know the scene. The dog literally pushes his nose into the ground at a certain place and would be happy to stay there all day. I have said that the dog must be allowed to sniff. I also said that although we allow him freedom on a walk, we CONTROL it. With every dog I have come in for training, we quickly develop an understanding that when I say "enough", he has to pack up whatever he is doing and continue moving. I am consistent with my timing and he gets 10 seconds to enjoy his I then command smell or whatever. "enough" and he gets one second; to join me before getting a jerk on the leash. Most dogs, when they have been with me for one day, get to know for how long they can sniff, etc. Of course I do not interrupt them when urinating, etc.

We know we are using the walk, partly for the enjoyment of the dog and partly for his education. It is, of course, also good for us. We are getting exercise. We are getting fresh air. Would you go for a walk in all climatic conditions if you didn't have a dog to take out?



FLEA CONTROL

Pet owners don't like to admit that their dogs

have fleas. In fact, fleas can be very hard to see, particularly in dark coated animals. Here is an easy method of detecting fleas that doesn't cost anything and can be done at home. Wet an A4 sheet of white paper. Hold the paper next to your pet's rump (where fleas love to congregate). Ruffle the fur so that bits of dirt from the coat fall onto the wet paper. Streaks of red (wet flea poo) are tell-tale signs that fleas are present.

Control Methods.

Flea control requires a two-pronged approach: both the pet and its environment must be treated. Only 5% of a flea population is on the animal, the rest is in the environment (10% pupae, 35% larvae, 50% eggs).

Non Chemical

There has been very little credible research done on herbal treatments. Their only potential use is as a deterrent to fleas on a flea-free animal. They may be the safest for humans to use, but their effectiveness at this point in time is doubtful.

The most effective "non-chemical" flea control is daily vacuuming of all the hard to reach places, including sofas, beds, mattresses, cushions, curtains and doormats. Used in conjunction with proper topical controls, vacuuming will help to reduce fleas and eggs in the environment. Special attention should also be paid to the animal's

bedding, which should be washed in bleach and aired to dry regularly.

Chemical

The older generation of topical flea control products (especially organophosphate baths and powders) is now completely obsolete. The latest treatments are top-spots, which are much safer for both pets and humans. These are topically applied chemicals that disperse through the skin's oils. They are applied monthly. They include Advantage, Frontline and Revolution. They all kill fleas around 24 hours after a flea has bitten a treated animal. Frontline also sterilizes any eggs that may be laid in the 24 hour period after drug contact, so it may provide more efficient environment control. Frontline also controls ticks when used every two weeks.

Use a flea bomb to treat the pet's These may be very effective environment. means of control, but prolonged exposure or ingestion can be harmful so it is important to Cover fish follow the directions closely. tanks, remove pets, close cupboards, don't leave food out and wipe down food preparation surfaces after application. Stav out of the house for at least two hours after using the bomb, and air the rooms after returning. Exposure to particulate matter in the bombs is a health risk, so allow the dust to settle. It is also important nto to leave any pilot lights on or naked flames burning.
